Mr. Chairman & Gentlemen.

(55)

Since the permanent Visiting Committee was appointed by this Board. on behalf of same & in compliance with your Resolutions, we have three times visited the House within the past 10 days. And now beg to report as follows.

In going through the Infirmary, which is solely in charge of the Nuns, we found every thing apparently very carefully looked after, and the place as neat-clean & comfortable as could be desired, and also the poor sick patients seemed to be both kindly & carefully attended to in every way by the good Nuns under whose care they are.

In passing through the Infirmary wards, & examining the Convent, in reference to same, we consider there should be a door at the women's side as well as the men's; as it must be very inconvenient to have the men's classification door locked, when there is ~~an~~ access the other way. And especially as patients very often must be admitted during the time set apart by the Nuns for their own private devotions - therefore we recommend a door to be open at the women's side, so that the men's door could be left unlocked, to admit patients during the times the Nuns would be engaged at prayers.

We visited the Female School & have great pleasure in testifying to the zeal & industry of the teachers. we found the little children very neat clean comfortable looking & mannerly, which shows the great exertions the good Nuns in charge of them, must be incessantly making for their spiritual & temporal welfare.

In going through the apartments belonging to the Female children, our attention was called to the beds & when examining them, we found the bed covering not at all sufficient for this extremely cold & sickly time, and we recommend that a pair of good blankets, be at once sent to the Nuns in charge of the Female School.



In passing through the wash house we observed the woodwork of the window in a wretchedly bad state - the windows in fact ready to fall out: and also, we saw that the <sup>bath</sup> was leaking heavily, this should not be, and we recommend both window & bath, to be thoroughly repaired at once.

Spring through the yard belonging to the female school on the different occasions we visited the house, we observed ashes & other very objectionable things, thrown in a receptacle (apparently, recently, built for that purpose, this we strongly object to. & request that the Master shall not allow the smallest particle of ashes, or any thing else, of that kind, to be thrown there again; it is most objectionable. there are plenty of idle men in the house & barrows in the place and they should be compelled, to remove such stuff to the land every morning early, as was done heretofore.

We visited the Male school, and from the log in which we found that department. we consider there is a great deal of credit due to the Master (Mr. Maguire) for the care he takes of it; and also for the care he (apparently, takes of the children who are left in his charge.

We hope to visit the house again at an early date & we trust again, our recommendations shall be fully carried out.

the chair was occupied by Mr Robert King, there being also present Messrs James Moffatt, J.P., Richard Forristal, Peter Tobin, and Jas Johnson, P.L.G's. The committee were unanimous in giving as reasons for the increase that they had found it very difficult to get and retain a medical-officer whose skill, attention, and steadiness would satisfy them. For many years the duties of the district were very ill performed, and though the committee individually had some knowledge of the state of matters they had no evidence on which they could act. Such a position was most unsatisfactory, and they considered it their duty and for the advantage of the district to retain a medical-officer such as they at present possessed, one with whose skill, attention, steadiness, and kindly readiness they and to their knowledge the residents of the locality are well pleased. The district was a large one and there was no comfortable residence for the doctor, and no attractive amount of paying practice. These facts had been thought by the committee sufficient to justify and necessitate the step they took in recommending an advance of salary, the propriety of which the Local Government Board call into question. The committee urged these statements on the consideration of the Local Government Board, and trust that they might sanction the recommendation. They might also add that a great part of the district is mountainous, and could only be travelled on foot. The district had been a healthy one formerly, but there was now an epidemic raging, and the medical officer found it hard to perform his duties.

## MASTER'S REPORT.

The Master reported—"I beg to say I have got window repaired, and have given instructions to have leaks in bath stopped with white lead. As to the blankets in female children's dormitory, I request to know what is to be done with the worn ~~ones~~ ones, as they are too good to be cast. As to removal of ashes every morning the report is misleading, as it stated that heretofore they had ~~not~~ been removed every morning. Such never was the case since the house was first opened. Said removal would involve extra duties on me, which were never required of any of my predecessors. Otherwise, the side-gates should be left open, allowing inmates to go where they liked. As to nuisance complained of in ashpit, this was due to repairs which were being done to closets, and the school-teachers are in no way to blame for it, but if the like occurs again I shall report the officers in charge of that department, the closet being now repaired. #### ENNISCORTHY DISPENSARY COMMITTEE.

A special meeting of the above was called for Tuesday last for the purpose of appointing a doctor to act *pro tem* during the illness of Dr Kelly. Mr John Cullen in the chair. Also present—Messrs Albert Davis, A Harpur, P W Casey, hon sec. Resolved—“That the appointment of Dr Dowse by the guardians for two weeks be confirmed, and that he be continued during the illness of Dr Kelly.” The Secretary reported that Dr Dowse waited on him last night after ten o'clock to say that it would be physically impossible for him to continue to act for Dr Kelly through his entire district, and that unless he got assistance he should be obliged to resign his duties, that however anxious he may be to oblige Dr Kelly and the dispensary committee, it would be utterly impossible for him to do the duty. He was out all day yesterday and only got home at ten o'clock to find a large number of red tickets waiting for him to attend to, enough to employ him this whole day, without mentioning his own private patients at all. He suggested that the committee would ask Dr Roberts to attend to the town duty, and he would attend to the dispensaries and the country. Otherwise, he has no alternative but to resign his duties. Proposed by Mr Davis, seconded by Mr Harpur, and passed—That Dr Roberts be asked to assist Dr Dowse in doing the town duty during the illness of Dr Kelly. Messrs John Cullen and A. Davis waited on Dr Roberts, who consented to act at the usual remuneration of three guineas. *a week R.*
