

The Business of the day having been disposed, of the Board adjourned, —

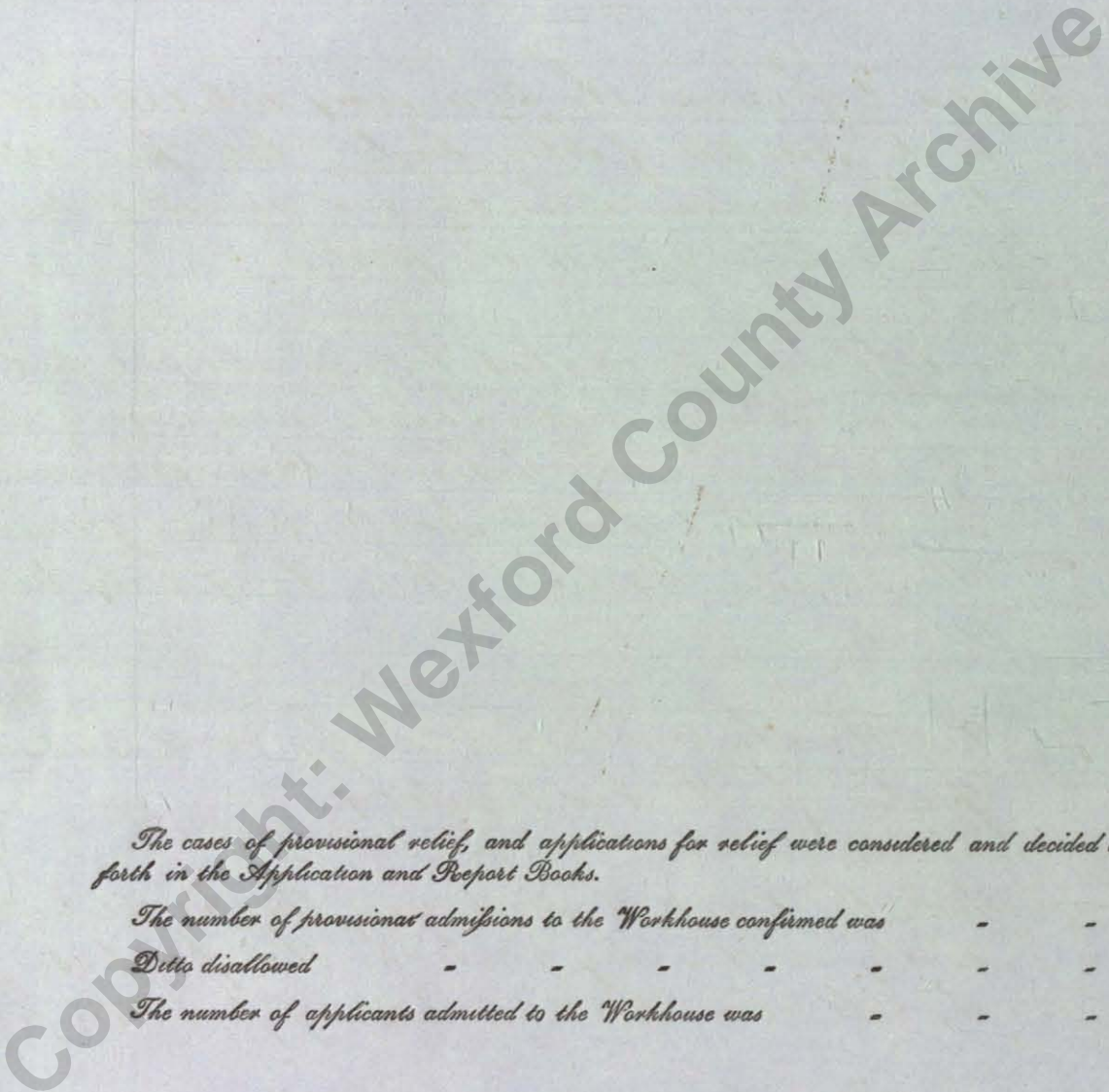

The Committee have inspected the grounds of the Workhouse with a view to ascertaining the most eligible approach to the place at present proposed to be appropriated for a burial ground and they have unanimously agreed, that both as regards the great inconvenience and highly objectionable modes of approach to the present intended burial ground that locality is highly inappropriate for the proposed object, and the Committee are equally unanimous in recommending to the Board as a most highly eligible site for the proposed object, that a portion of ground situate to the town of Bury and bounded on two sides by the new Palace, to the appropriation of this ground for such purpose no possible objection can be reasonably made, it lies quite contiguous to the dead house and requiring a few perches of road to approach it, and this without passing through or by any place which could at all be deemed objectionable. This portion of ground seems to be naturally marked out for a burial ground, and can be converted into one at a most trifling cost far less than it would take to complete the present intended burial ground, to say nothing of the difference in the expenses of making a road to the present intended site. The Committee at the same time have to express their decided disapprobation to making any road to the present intended burial ground which would pass through the Workhouse land recently taken



"And now appropriated to agricultural  
 "Purposes, besides the expense of making  
 "Such it would occupy a very large portion  
 "of the lands and thus seriously diminish  
 "the amount of crops — They therefore advise
