

The master reports that John Hunk the meat contractor refused on last Saturday to supply the officers with their meat because he said "he did not get an order for the whole". The weekly allowance of meat to all the officers is 40 lbs. orders were drawn for and given to each for his or her allowance making a total of 40 lbs. and these orders Hunk refused to honor. The master supposes what he meant by an order for the whole was one order for 40 lbs. which he would send up and let each officer cut off his or her portion from it. This is no part of the duties of any officer of the house each is entitled to a certain quantity to be delivered by the contractor and up to last Saturday Hunk at all times supplied to each officer his or her allowance when applied for. It is quite evident the reason he refuses to do so at present is to try if he can give any petty annoyance to the officers, in consequence of the Assistant Masters reporting that his meat of last week was of an inferior quality. The master respectfully hopes the Board will express their strongest disapproval of such conduct by it he has left himself open to a prosecution the Workhouse Contractor is allowed by law any option as to where or how he will supply goods ordered. He is bound to supply at such times and in such quantities as the Board of Guardians or their authorized officers may direct. He refused to supply first on the order of the Board and again on that of the Master — Meat was subsequently

The report of the Emigration Committee was read as follows -

"Long View Workhouse 27th Sept 1857
"The Committee in the first instance felt it their duty to enquire into the provisions under which pauper emigration can be carried out, and they find that by the 192 vic. c. 56. s. 57. Poor & Commissioners on application of Guardians of E. Divisions may direct meeting of ratepayers and if majority in value of ratepayers apply to Commissioners to raise rate for emigration by sealed order, Commissioners & Board may direct Guardians to raise a rate of 4/- of £ (or loan payable in 5 years) to assist emigration to British Colonies of poor resident in Division
"to 69 of the Chap 42 s. 8. of Guardians subject to Commissioners' regulations, and with consent of Secretary of Colonial Department may assist poor 3 months in Workhouse approved by Commissioners to emigrate to British Colonies, and charge on Board or E. Divisions to which poor are chargeable to in the £ though no meeting of ratepayers. Under 10. vic. c. 31 s. 13 Occupiers rated under £ 5. giving up land &c. approved by Secretary of Colonies, and where lessor forgoes arrears and pays 2/3rd of the expense of emigration of occupiers

The information sought for may
 be comprised under two general heads, the one bearing
 on the effects produced by the measure when it had been
 carried out to any extent, so as to show how far it had
 acted injuriously, or the contrary; the other head being
 intended to afford information as to the expense, Classifi-
 cation and other details. Should the Board at any
 time think proper to adopt such a measure
 partially or on a large scale.

The Committee obtained Replies
 at large from the following Boards viz -
 Athy Union

" The number sent out were 146. to Quebec. in 50-51.
 On the first head of inquiry the Board of Guardians state
 that many paupers have remained in the house in the
 hope of being sent out as Emigrants, that the number
 of ablebodied is greater this year than last, but whether
 in consequence of emigration or not they are not able to say
 that Board have not yet decided whether they will follow
 up emigration or not. The Clerk of that Union in reply
 to the general question of expediency or inexpediency
 states that at the first intimation that emigrants
 would be sent out it caused a very marked increase
 of applications for admission from all the divisions of

the Union and several strangers with the view
intention of being sent out; this increase continued
throughout the Spring and later in the summer than
usual, and even in the ensuing year numbers ap-
plied with a view of remaining in the house until
they would be sent out; two Courses might be adopted
that would probably be a check to the increase
of numbers, first not to send out any who had
not been at least twelve months inmates, and
secondly to act under the act of Parliament which
enables paupers not inmates of the house to be assisted
in emigration under certain conditions.

Dungarvan Union

The number sent out were 250 females in 50-51
The number in the house when the emigration was
adopted (it was confined entirely to females)
were 307 able-bodied women and at the correspon-
ding period this year 260, that the Guardians
of that Union are unanimous not to continue the
scheme of emigration and that the Board have
no intention whatever of sending out any more
emigrants from the House.

Simenich Union

The number sent out were 103 in 49/50. They
say in their replies that there has been an in-
crease of numbers in the house since the emi-
gration was adopted but that such is not
deemed to be traceable to the emigration, and
that the opinion of the Board is favorable to the
project if funds were at command.

From Ballythony the number
sent out were 84 in 49-50. The greater
number sent out from this Union were not
inmates of the Workhouse but inhabited

Small payments on a Commons but their
emigration enabled the Guardians to remove
the dwellings and prevent strangers from
locating there in future, under ordinary circum-
stances that Board have no disposition to con-
tinue the scheme of emigration.

From Bellingham the total
number sent out in one year and a half
were 541 - The number in the house at the
Corresponding period this year are 54 less than
they were when the last emigration took place.

The Guardians are of opinion that it is expedient
to carry out emigration to a certain extent so as to rid
the Union of such classes as would be likely to con-
tinue a burden on the rates, and to give such an
opportunity of improving their condition -

They ^{say} further that no longer had the emigrants
left, than their places were supplied by a class of
persons who in nine cases out of ten would not seek
Workhouse relief, but in expectation of going to America;
to prevent this abuse the Guardians within one month
after the emigrants leaving, published notices that
no more emigration would take place and by that
means as well as by a system of taskwork in
stonebreaking got rid of all but the really destitute.

They have now only 566 inmates in the Workhouse
so that the good effects of the Emigrations is now
felt - the account from the emigrants themselves
are generally most favorable and not a few of the class
sent from the Workhouse have sent home money
to their friends and in some 4 or 5 instances have
enabled pauper inmates of the house to join them
in America free of any expense to the Union.

St. Paul Union

This Board sent out 305 in 1845-50. The number in the
House at the period of the Emigrations were 1500 the
emigration stopped the Out Door Relief and the
numbers in the house have decreased - They do
not now require further emigration but the Board
all agree that the measure has very much benefited
their Union and conferred incalculable benefit

on the paupers themselves: taking them out of prison it may be said and putting them in a position to raise themselves in the world, at the same time giving permanent relief to the Union.

Under the head of the question relating to expense Classification &c. it appears from the replies of the different boards that the expense per head including a sufficient sum for each pauper on landing will not ~~exceed~~ cost the Union more than £5. 10. 0 and may probably be done for £5.

It appears that the Classes sent out were not limited to one description of pauper except in Dungarvan where they selected only unmarried women of whom they sent out 200, that in the other Boards they sent out families and single persons of both sexes. None of the Boards appear to have confined their emigration either to those chargeable to the Union at large or to S. (Provisions) - And these Boards generally only limited the time of residence in the Union to one year, one Board placed no such limit and another (Wass) required 3 years residence and it may be worthy of remark that this Board takes the most favorable view of the question of any of the Boards that have sent replies to our queries.

The Committee made the best inquiry in their power on the subject of apprenticing boys to the mercantile marine, and received from Captain Crosby shipping master of the Port of Dublin the following reply "since the mercantile marine act came into operation we have not one application made for apprentices, that part of the navigation act which obliged ships of certain tonnage to take so many boys in proportion has been repealed and since then there is hardly such a thing as youths being apprenticed" it would therefore appear to this Committee that getting rid of any emigration by this mode is entirely hopeless.

With reference to the question generally it appears from the majority of the Replies from the Unions, that the direct effect of the adoption of Emigration in these unions has been to attract paupers to the house with a view to being sent abroad by the Board, but that this tendency may be checked by a distinct declaration that the measure is adopted solely with reference to those now in the house, and limited to those who have been a certain number of years (say 3, 4, or 5) in the house a period precluding the possibility that these paupers could have come in and remained in the house with a view to Emigration: and further that this tendency on the part of the public may be to come into the house for the purpose of being sent out at the expense of the Union may be stopped by a severer system of labor such as stonebreaking by hard work being adopted.

It appears further, ^{that} there are a number of persons in the house eligible for emigration, and whom it is hopeless to remove by any other means, who can be got rid of permanently by an outlay of one year's support which must in every case be included in the next year's estimate.

In conclusion the Committee would beg to lay before the Board the result of inquiries made as to the Classes that might be selected for emigration should the Board think it prudent to adopt it. It appears by returns taken from the Register that 10 families with 19 children making a total of 31 chargeable on the Union who have been inmates for periods varying from 9 to 3 years, and upon the different E. Divisions 13 families and 24 children making a total of 47, who have been inmates for the same period.

That there are male adults from 15 to 18 years, 12 chargeable on the Union and 16 on E. Divisions their residence in the house varying from 9 to 2 years, and lastly that there are female adults varying from 15 to 25 years of age 19 chargeable on the Union and 32 on


The Committee to whom it was referred to select paupers for emigration pursuant to their report of the 27th Sept. beg to report that they have applied to the Poor Law Commissioners for information as to the classes of pauper emigrants who would be sanctioned by them and that by their reply of the 2nd October 1857 to which the Committee refer it appears that none but able-bodied emigrants can be sent out by the board, and further that the period to the BM for emigration to the British Colonies is now past. And that any such measure should be deferred till Spring that in the United States of America bodies of emigrants from Workhouses will not be allowed to land without some security against their becoming chargeable.

Under these circumstances your Committee are of opinion that no further steps should be at present be taken to wit on their last report signed by order John George, Ch^r.

This motion was put to the poll when there appeared for the motion 13 against 15 when the motion was declared lost when the following resolutions moved by Mr. Kinn and seconded by Mr. Estlin were passed with only two dissenting voices and ordered to be inserted on the minutes.

1st That while we are prepared to obey the law in reference to the repayment of government advances under the Act 13 Vic. c. 14 we protest in the strongest manner against the unfairness of the duties imposed on us so far as relates to the labor rate advances and the extent and period of liquidation of all the advances claimed under this Act. We conceive it is of the last importance that the functions of Poor Law Guardians should be strictly limited to the administration of the laws for the relief of the poor for the time being, and we believe our ordinary action will be unimpeached and the collection of the rate necessary to meet our present existing engagements prospectively, maintain the poor will be secured, if we are made the instruments of collecting, not only rates necessary in their values and connected with our proper office but rates not sanctioned or contracted by us and pressing with severity if not with injustice on the ratepayers at large.

That as to the nature and position of these respective claims we admit our liability to the sums advanced for Workhouse loans although we conceive that the expenses of public buildings connected with the establishment of a new system imposing in itself new and serious burdens on the ratepayers should be defrayed out of the consolidated funds, and borne not by individuals but by



The Union Advances under the temporary Relief Act. to alleviate extraordinary distress were perhaps inevitably (from the suddenness of the emergency) lavishly expended and went far to demoralize the peasantry and small farmers of the Country. We conceive that in any event one moiety of these sums as well as one half of the labor rate advances should be remitted and the propriety of this appeared to be admitted by Lord John Russell in his letter to Lord Lucan of the 10th Sept: 1851

As to the labor rate advances they are admitted to have been an unsuccessful experiment so by the substitution of the temporary Relief advances for them at the time, as by the subsequent remission of one half of this amount and the attempt to collect them under the machinery of the Grand Jury Act has failed. Under these circumstances we protest against the unfairness of these charges as well as against their collection being thrown upon this Board

I ^{note} that if these claims are persevered in we call upon the treasury and the Commissioners of Poor Law to extend their repayment over the full period of 40 years allowed by the Act and not to 20 years as stated in the letter of the Commissioners of the 1st day of August 1851. We deny the fairness of imposing upon Unions this money because they are still solvent and struggling to meet their engagements, burdens, which are remitted to Unions insolvent or unwilling to pay. The result of this leveling system must be to make all Unions alike and to drive from this once flourishing Country the remnant of those who are still anxious to stay in it.






