Mr. Burke made an inspection of the Work House to day which he found in good order  
The Master Complainings he

that he has much trouble with the girls school the discipline of which <sup>has</sup> is not properly attended to after school hours the Schoolmistress since her appointment now about four months has been three times on leave of absence a week each time. The Boys School appears to be going on well.

There were ~~nearly~~ a dozen young men sitting about the fire, to the exclusion of the old men in the mens day room. Mr. Burke has directed these young men to be brought before the Board with a view of making some arrangement for their being kept employed.

The Schoolmistress was called before the Board and ordered to be more attentive to her duties in future and in reply to an application from her to be allowed to sleep out of the Work House, she was informed that she could not be permitted to do so. That the Master be directed to keep the able bodied paupers above referred to constantly employed. Ordered that a sick dietary Book be provided and that the Medical Officers attention be called to the 4<sup>th</sup> paragraph of Article 68 of Work House rules and that he be directed to keep such book in future.

It appearing that the Master of the Workhouse is in the habit of making a change of Diet for individual paupers on the ~~verbal~~ verbal directions of the Medical Officers.

Ordered that in future the Master makes no change in the Dietary of individual paupers except on the written directions of the Medical Officer entered in the sick dietary Book.

Ordered that the sick dietary Book be filled up and laid before this Board <sup>at</sup> its next and every future meeting.

The Business of the day having been disposed of the Board Adjourned.

Your Lordship is aware that for some months past, my character, as Master of this house, has been subjected to weekly & scurrilous attacks in the columns of the People's Newspaper from the pen of an anonymous Correspondent.

Being in my own mind perfectly satisfied with the conduct of my conduct, and not being able till last Thursday week to ascertain who was the writer who was thus morally assassinating me I took no notice of the Calumnies. My means, as mentioned to the Board at their last meeting, of some papers taken from off the table in the Assistant Schoolmaster's room on that evening I found that he in conjunction with some other evilly disposed persons, was my weekly Calumniator.

Since then I have found out that previously to any of these letters being published, a deeply laid conspiracy was formed to damage, and blacken my character & eventually deprive me of my situation.

I am now able to prove that before any of them appeared, the Assistant Schoolmaster applied, more than once for what to an Under Officer of this house for what he was pleased to call "information" in order that he might be able to put the Master out. On last Saturday he stated to a gentleman that he was commissioned to offer him £20 if he would join their party against the Master, that in bringing any charges against him (the Master), he would or could procure the oath of any papers in the house for 5/- & that he was himself perfectly willing

to damn his soul to all eternity to put the Master out.

Letter from the Assistant Master 29<sup>th</sup> July 1853

My Lords & Gentlemen

In consequence of the Copy of a letter from the Assistant Schoolmaster to your Board, ordered to be inserted on Saturday's Minutes, and containing certain Charges against me. I most respectfully take the liberty of addressing you, and of stating the facts that gave rise to his letter

For some months past in the Columns of a newspaper called the People and published in Wexford there have been violent attacks on the Board of Guardians, the Clerk, the Master & Matron and myself. It was well known from the spirit and substance of those attacks that they must have emanated from a person connected with the house.

From private information received by me I was quite satisfied that Patrick Nowlan the Assistant Schoolmaster was the Author



The Report of the Roman Catholic Chaplain was read as follows  
Sept. 24<sup>th</sup>. As the Board of Guardians will probably soon determine regarding the Boys' School it might assist them in doing so, by my remarking that unless they decide on keeping the School in the same state as it was before the appointment of the late Ass<sup>t</sup>. Schoolmaster, it will be absolutely necessary to secure the services of one, equally at least as active and qualified as he was, the head master so far as secular instruction is concerned

being from want of competency or want of Method, but I believe without any fault of his own almost totally inefficient.

Such a person I conceive will scarcely be procured for the same small amount of salary, as the late Assistant had. His duties too, if faithfully discharged, are very laborious in a house like this where there is such a large number of Catholic boys to be educated for, besides fulfilling the ordinary duties of every Catholic Schoolmaster, in daily teaching their prayers & Catechisms to the Catholic children under his charge, the person here is under the necessity of likewise supplying, in Moral and Religious training, the office of parent to those children who have none. All the Guardians may not be aware that it is the duty as well as the practice, of all conscientious parents in the Catholic Church, to commence from the moment their children begin to creep, to teach them Morning and Night their prayers to instil, by degrees, into their youthful minds.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Prayers made thereon, as follows:

a Knowledge of their Creator and of the primary Mysteries of their faith, and as they grow up, while they never omit to instruct them at home in their Catechisms, take care, in selecting a School to choose a Master who is considered careful & conscientious in this respect, and who likewise will accompany his pupils to the Church on Sundays, where the Catechism is again taught its doctrines expounded by the priest, the Children examined in their progress and ultimately prepared for the Sacraments,

Such is the care bestowed on the Moral and Religious training of Children out of the house by parents and Schoolmasters; and with regard to the Children in the house, such twofold duty is admirably discharged by Miss Pollard towards the female Children, and towards the boys was also well discharged by the late Assistant Schoolmaster.
