



"September 22nd 1850. — Gentlemen, In reply to the Clerk's report last Board day stating that I consumed 148½ stones of Soap during the year ending the 1st inst., and that the average daily number was 259, which, at the allowance of 1 stone weekly for every 100 inmates, as per minute of 29 January 1853, from which it appears that 13½ stone of Soap have been consumed over said allowance — I beg to state that in 1853 the numbers of infirm and in Hospitals were one fourth, that now the Workhouse has become more an Hospital, and that half the numbers are infirm and sick and consequently will require a larger proportion of Soap. — But with 76 deaths during the year and the very cheapest quality of Soap I have only consumed (weekly) 15½ lbs to every 100 inmates. It requires very great experience to know the quantity of washing done in a Workhouse so as to keep it clean. I have the honor to be
