

I think it is time that something would be done to have the matter cleared up. Should an investigation take place. I am authorized by one of my efficient curates, Revd Robert Sinnott, to state, that he will be prepared with some facts which will help to throw much light on this most disagreeable subject. —

Stating that in consequence of his being summoned as a Crown Witness to Enniscorthy this day he could not attend at the Workhouse, and hoped the Board will have no objection to Mr. Sadell performing the duty till Monday week, there being as yet no temporary Medical Officer appointed at famolin — ~~Carried~~, agreed to —

The Clerk was ordered to write to Mr. Samuel Jackaberries (Poor Rate collector) Sureties informing them that if he do not lodge a large portion of the Outstanding Rate in his district, next week and close his accounts immediately after, that the Board will be forced to give the matter into the hands of their Solicitor.

The Clerk was ordered to prepare a List of Guardians to act as a Visiting Committee, by rotation and to give them in pairs, selecting as nearly as possible an Ex-Officio Guardian ^{and an elected Guardian} living in the same locality, to act in unison and to submit such list to the Board at their next meeting.

The Clerk ~~received~~ laid before the Board on this day a Certified List of Elected Guardians for the year, ending 25 March 1864.

A Petition was signed on this day by all the members of the Board, present, on the Subject of Justices ^{not} taking ex. parte affidavits from the mothers of illegitimate Children against the putative fathers of such children.

Resolved that the Chargeability of Anne English and her child Anne be changed from the Union at Large and placed on Ballyneastagh the Electoral Division to which they properly belong — Carried,

Proposed by Mr. Vesey and seconded by Mr. Peter Roe that the Workhouse Inmates get the same proportion of meat, Tea & Sugar as on last Easter on next Easter day. —

The following observation appeared on the Visitors Book,

"Visited all the different wards of the house. and was much delighted with the cleanliness order and comfort of the inmates."
