Moved as an amendment by Mr. Scott and Seconded by Mr. Foley that John Redmonds tender for building the new Fever Hospital at Gorry Union for the sum of £837.19.11 be accepted, to complete the work in 12 months,

I have to report that one case of Fever of a bad type was sent by me from Mount Howard to Valer's Fever Hospital within the last few days, and as Fever is very prevalent in other parts of the County and likely, I fear to spread in my own District, I beg to suggest to you the propriety of having a few Printed Notices posted through the country containing some plain sanitary rules for the guidance of the Poor, such as the White washing of their houses, the removal of all Cess-pools and stagnant water from before their doors, and avoiding as much as possible intercourse with those towns or localities where Fever is known to exist such measures if fully carried out would be well calculated to check the spread of an Epidemic and the notification of them through the district would not be attended by more than a trifling expense.

In the Boys' School the general progress appears to me satisfactory, I am much pleased with the pains taken by the Schoolmaster and the successful commencement made by the smaller boys in writing. The Schoolmistress also is, I believe, using her best efforts in advancing the education of the Girls. The answering in Catechism has not been satisfactory. It is with reluctance I make a report on this subject, as such must be almost uniformly unfavorable, arising from the system rather than the fault of the person instructed with the teaching of the Catechism. The instructing the children in the rudiments as well as accompanying them in their daily devotional practices. To fulfil these duties towards the females under her charge at present, is as much as could be required of an ordinary Schoolmistress: to discharge these obligations towards the boys also, is more than can be expected. But even though such could be effected, there still remain the inevitable evil results, obvious at least to all Catholics, of bringing those of different sexes so frequently together, of these details I will not speak, but I would wish the Guardians to make enquiry.

Woodroffe for preparing the Contract for building the Fever Hospital at the Workhouse and the Bond and Warrant of the Contractor and his Sureties, and returning the bill of costs. Messrs Gale and Wyer the Commissioners Solicitors state that in the absence of a specific agreement as to the payment for preparing the Contract the Board of Guardians should pay for it; and that with respect to the bill in question there is one item in it which they think admits of considerable abatement and that is the charge for engrossing the contract and specification &c, And that they cannot think it was necessary to engross the latter on either part, it would have been sufficient to have referred to it in the body of the Contract and signed it at the same time.

Wm. Gorey January 21/1865.

My Lord & Gentlemen,

In reply to entries in the Porters Book Viz.

1864  
January 15<sup>th</sup>

"Innocence received from the master and that everyday, a tyrant, fit to be amongst savages," — The pen has been drawn over this entry, therefore needs no reply.

April 28<sup>th</sup>

"The masters insult to me at 1/4 7, before I had time to offer my soul to God for the day," — I always treated the Porter with particular respect.

December 16<sup>th</sup>

"Young Christy Peters gone out with the Sennet, a large bundle of candles conveyed in a basket by the masters' orders," — reply, 3 lb of candles for the fever hospital Nurse, in a small basket and given to her.

" 18<sup>th</sup>

"Came in very drunk," — On this day I went on Mr. Keetho's car to my brothers at Sarahill, a distance of about 4 miles, to see my son, who is laid on the bed of death, whom I had not seen for upwards of a fortnight, which grieved him very much, in the course of the evening there fell a very great fall of snow, and we left about 8<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> O'clock, and had to walk part of the road, in consequence of the depth of the snow, I parted him in Gorey and he is here to-day to tell you the state I was in, I walked to the Workhouse, climbed over the rails, and after waiting about 10 minutes, the Porter came out of his bed in the dark, and opened the door, and went to bed again, I never spoke to him, nor he to me, I went to my parlour, unlocked the door lit my candle, and went to bed, and I never saw this remark, and it was then brought before the Board on the following Saturday, I consider at times that the Porter does not be in his right mind, as he does be taking aloud to himself.

### The Roman Catholic Chaplain's Report.

3<sup>d</sup> March 1863,

I must again in the most emphatic manner, represent to the Guardians, the serious disadvantages under which the children, the boys particularly, labor, from not having a schoolmaster of their own Religion, who could teach them their Catechism, instruct them in the rudiments of their Faith, assist in enforcing its requirements and be capable of giving out the public morning and evening prayers, or (not the less necessary in a house like this,) of being present at them to secure regularity and order.

The general duties of the Schoolmaster in this respect, and all his exclusive duties of this kind with regard to the boys, have been thrown on the Schoolmistress in addition to her own. They have not been discharged nor was it in her power to discharge them.

The Schoolmistress's duties of themselves are most onerous, particularly with respect to the smaller children of both sexes, and this can be easily understood when it is taken into account, that most of these poor children are separated from their parents and many of them have no parents at all. On her devotes the conscientious discharge (for there are none else to do it) of



of the duties of the household officer of parent as well as Schoolmistress, the Catholic Guardians, if necessary, will inform the other members of the Board, that their Church requires children to be trained from the earliest dawn of reason, to the practice of religion, to be imbued as soon as possible with a knowledge of its doctrines and precepts, and that she strictly enjoins on all, who have the immediate care of them, to accustom them to offer themselves while young to God, to walk in His presence, and to ~~sanctify~~ sanctify all their thoughts, words and actions, by devoting them to their Creator. If the virtuous mother finds it difficult enough to instil, by frequent repetition, into the minds of her little ones, (consisting perhaps of only four or five) those important truths, and to train them to such practices of devotion as they are capable of — how is it possible for the Schoolmistress hence to fulfil those same duties, without the most unwearied toil, towards so many, now, to add to her duties, (as has been hitherto attempted in vain) those of this character which appertain to the Boys' School, would be to require a simple impossibility and to leave the destitute Roman Catholic Children of this Workhouse without adequate means of being brought up in accordance with the religion of their parents and their own.

On their part, therefore, I ask the Guardians to appoint a duly qualified Catholic

The Commissioners state that the Guardians have no power to refuse admission under these circumstances, and the Guardians should bear in mind the possibility of a woman not being able in such a case to give the paternity of the child, and if being able, she refuses, she is nevertheless entitled to relief so long as she is destitute,

No. 5599/65, 24<sup>th</sup> March 1865. Enclosing a form to be filled up by the Clerk and Medical Officer, with reference to Andrew Leary and his family whom the Board of Guardians propose assisting to emigrate.



No. 5635/1865, 24<sup>th</sup> March 1866. Referring to the appointment of Mr. Edward Poole to the office of Schoolmaster of the Workhouse, and who is but 19 years of age,

The Commissioners desire to call the Guardians attention to article 32 of the General Regulations which directs that no person shall hold any Union Office who shall not have reached the age of 21 years,

And stating that they have directed their Inspector Mr. Hamilton to report to them whether Mr. Poole's case is one in which the condition in the Regulation above referred to, may be dispensed with, and that they will not object to Mr. Poole entering upon the discharge of his duties.

Margaret Whippo was allowed £1..5 0 worth of clothes to enable her to accept of a situation which she has been offered.

The Board having further considered the draft of the bill for <sup>the</sup> Superannuation of Union Officers,

The Clerk is directed to write to the Commissioners enclosing a copy of objections made by them to the same,

In the opinion of the Board of Guardians of Goray Union, it is unnecessary to provide for the Superannuation of Union Officers by legal enactment as they can by life Insurance or other means provide for themselves and their families in the same way as other members of society, but that should it seem good to Parliament to provide such Superannuation they consider the bill now before the House of Commons open to the following objections,

1. That it does not include Clerks, Medical Officers and Relieving Officers,
2. That no Officer entitled to a Superannuation pension under the bill can look on it as a certainty that he will receive Superannuation at all, or that, having received it, it will not be discontinued or diminished,
3. That until the Committee on Irish taxation has made its report, it is unwise to add to the burdens on Land in Ireland,

The Board of Guardians, I apprehend, would consider that it had cause of complaint against me, if I did not candidly state, that the person already appointed or about to be appointed Assistant Schoolmistress, is one, whom I cannot, according to the rules of our Church, look upon but as a disqualified Schoolmistress for the children, or in anyway employ in imparting to them religious instruction.

I would desire much to be spared the necessity of winning the reason, now especially to those, who for the most part know little of the deep anxiety with which the Catholic Church watches over and guards the sacred "Deposit of Faith" or of her vigilance in adopting precautionary measures, in order that, all those in anyway engaged in communicating its dogmas to youth, shall be themselves above suspicion. Miss Redmond has, unfortunately, rendered herself unfit for the Office, by the well-known fact, that, within the last year, and subsequent to the formal prohibition of our Bishops, she openly embraced a specific course of studies, solemnly condemned by them, and that in defiance of such authority, she persevered in them for months, notwithstanding. That this peculiar disqualifying consequence of such conduct, had been well-known because publicly proclaimed,
