Gentlemen / On ~~Monday~~ ^{Saturday} the 27th Inst. I was called to visit a woman named Lynnett, residing at Courtown Harbour, saw her about 2 o'clock P.M. - She was in a state of Collapse - cold with cramps - thighs, legs, hands and arms blue, with other symptoms of cholera of a formidable type - Applied remedies, procured flannel and blankets, employed a nurse to attend her.

Reported the case at a public meeting at the Hotel same day, where several of the Guardians were present - visited patient same day again, accompanied by Dr. Boxwell, whom I wished to see the case.

Disinfected the room, clothes, bed &c.

Her child aged three years, was suffering for some days from diarrhoea - cold surface, almost pulseless. - On Sunday the 28th, repeated remedies &c, twice same day, attended patient.

Monday 29th visited and found the patient had been some minutes dead. - and that her second child was in great distress - the child is a few months old - found the family in extreme destitution.

I list witness.

Peter Kavanagh being duly sworn saith - I live at Donceyle, and the deceased Mary Kavanagh was my wife - She was about 48 years of age - She had three sons and a daughter living - She was an unwell woman for several years - She was subject to fits. They came on frequently and she would be half an hour or longer in a fit - On the 26th day of Sep. last I left home at an early hour as usual for the purpose of going to work - I am a mason by trade, I left my wife in bed that morning when leaving home - My son Patrick came home on that day - the 26th of Sep. where I was working, some time after dinner hour and told me his mother was burned I came home then immediately and found my wife sitting on a stool on the kitchen floor with a sheet over her, she was very much burned. I then went to Ballycanew for oil to put on the burns, the same day I went to Camolin for the Dispensary Doctor - Camolin is about 3 miles from my house. It was evening when I got to Camolin. I saw the Dr. I told him my case. I did not give him the usual visiting ticket. The Dr. asked me had I a ticket. I said not, that Father Power said that in such a case he would come without one, he said I should get a ticket, he then told me it was not in his district at all. I then came home. I went next

morning to Ballycanew to get a ticket from Mr. Porter for Dr. Allen. I first went to Mr. Purney for a ticket whilst waiting for Mr. Porter. Mr. Purney told me he could not give a ticket for Dr. Allen as the place was not in his district. I then spoke to Mr. Porter. I next asked the constable at Ballycanew in whose district the house was, but he c^d not tell me in particular. On the day following I went to Camolin to get a ticket from Mr. Roche to see Dr. Bestall. Mr. Roche said he did not think the place was in Dr. Bestall's district. but if a ticket would send the doctor he would send him out, but I did not see him again or the doctor. Mr. William Holan then advised me to go to the Relieving Officer Mr. Miller and he w^d tell me all about it. I went on Friday and near Mr. Miller's house I met with Dr. Allen. I did not see Mr. Miller. Dr. Allen gave me some wash for my wife & some raw cotton. I did not ask Dr. Allen to see my wife. Dr. Bestall saw my wife on Saturday and attended her until she died. we used the means Dr. Bestall ordered until about a week before her death, when she lost her mind, and we c^d not apply the wash. She died on Sunday last the 21st Inst.

2nd Witness,

Mary Kenny being duly sworn saith she is in Clonmore which is about fifty perches from this house. I knew the deceased woman Mary Kavanagh. On the 26th of Sep. last after 12 o'clock in the day Mr. Week called me and told me to go down and stay with Mrs. Kavanagh until she would go for her son. I came down immediately and I got Mr. Kavanagh standing outside the gate on the road side. She had nothing on her but her stockings and an old shawl round her neck, and a sheet over her. I then brought her into the house, and when I came in I saw part of her clothes on fire on the hearth, they appeared to me as if they had been burnt off her. She was nearly out of her mind with pain. She was very much burned. She was burned on the shoulders back and side, arm and hands. She did not tell me how she took fire, there was no person in the house when I went in. I saw the deceased once when she was recovering from a fit, she appeared sleepy. I remained with the deceased until her husband returned.

 I am Medical Officer of the Camolin Dispensary District, I
 recollect Peter Kavanagh requesting me to visit his wife on the 26th
 Sep. last. about 6 or 7 o'clock in the evening. he told me she was burned,
 I asked him where he lived, he told me in Downcoyle, I asked
 him had he a ticket, he said not, I told him I did not think
 it was in my district. but to go down to Mr. Burke and if he gave
 him a ticket I would go. I never got a list of the Dispensary
 Divisional. I never got a ticket from this place before, I
 would have visited the woman without a ticket if I had known
 the place was in my district. I went in to Gorey on the following
 Saturday and went to the Workhouse where I got a list of the
 Divisions in the District, I saw then that the house was in my
 District, I came off from Gorey and visited the woman that
 night, and prescribed what I in my judgment considered best
 for her. I never got a ticket to see Mary Kavanagh, I
 found the woman very much burned on the back and arm,
 and I had a bad opinion of her recovery from the first. I
 brought her husband back to Camolin with me on the day of my
 first visit, to send the medicine as soon as I could. There
 was great discharge lately from the burns. this discharge
 was very exhausting, and in my opinion her death was caused
 by exhaustion from the great discharge there was from the burns.
 I am three years Medical Officer of Camolin Dispensary
 District. I never was in this place before my appointment
 to Camolin Dispensary
 Abraham Bestall.



Has reference to some complaints made by Captain Hamilton, Poor Law Inspector, on his recent inspection of the Workhouse, to the effect that

the healthy adults were only going to breakfast at 9.40 A.M.

that the able-bodied males and the infants were not clean in their persons.

That at the hour of 10 o'clock A.M. the Infirmary females had not received their tea for breakfast.

That there was a boy aged 14 years in girl's clothes, in the female Ward in the Fever Hospital, and that he found 2 school boys washing themselves in the men's yard.

That the Master still keeps poultry even though he was told not to do so on a former occasion — and he states "that he had on a former occasion to caution the Master about speaking to an inmate in an overhearing a violent manner," but he regretted to find on his recent visit that the Master was about to do so again.

Mr. Hamilton observes "that the Master has a good staff of officers under him, and that the departments are in good order, but he cannot say that he is satisfied with the manner in which he discharges his duties". It is also stated "that a good deal of the painting which has recently been done at the Workhouse, appears to have been done imperfectly, the woodwork not having been properly prepared.

The Commissioners observe "that it is desirable that the Master in his intercourse with the pauper inmates should exhibit a firm and conciliatory, and that he should avoid as far as possible, everything savouring of harshness, and they request to have the necessary order made on the subject.

Ordered —

The Guardians consider that 9.30 is as early as would be convenient to have the adults' breakfast, especially in winter, and they have directed the Master to have it punctually at that hour. — They have specially cautioned the Master to enforce the cleanliness of the inmates by punishing neglect in this particular, on the part of the adults, and of the persons in charge of the Infants.

With regard to the tea for the infirm females, the Master explains that they get their breakfast about 9 o'clock of bread and milk, and the tea is an extra, allowed to their class, and delivered by the Infirmary Nurse, who happened on the occasion in question to be detained longer than usual in the

hospital Wards. The boy in female clothes, in the Fever Hospital (who is registered as 10 years old) was kept in the female convalescent ward, by the directions of the Medical Officer who considered that it was desirable that he should remain with the rest of his family who were in the same ward, and the other wards are not yet furnished - The Nurse dressed him in female clothes because he came in in petticoats - his dress has since been changed - the nurse said he was 14 years old in mistake.

The Guardians have cautioned the Master against keeping any poultry in the Workhouse yards or houses.

The Master is informed that the Guardians agree with the Poor Law Commissioners, as to the impropriety of harsh demeanour towards the inmates of the Workhouse, though it has not come under their notice that he has been in the habit of speaking harshly to them.

The Collectors applied to have their rate of poundage raised from 4^d to 6^d.
