1. M^r. Miller reports that he inspected all the premises in the Lamolin Dispy district to which he has called @ Bestalls attention, & found that except in the case of Benjⁿ Rigley & Sam^l. Atkinson of Norris Mount the orders of the Board had not been carried out. The thirtyeight cases in Lamolin St. & Limerick Lane are in a most shocking state, many of the yards being nearly covered to the depth of a foot or more with water & filth; at the side of one of the houses he noticed a pool of water deep enough to drown a child six or eight years of age. The women of the place are in continual dread of their children being drowned in this pool or in some of the yards or ver. With respect to the filling up the cess pools referred to in the above report, the attention of the Landlords to be called to Board order of 16th Dec^r last, & they to be informed that proceedings will be taken unless same is at once complied with.
2. With respect to the two cases at Tullabeg, he found that not the slightest attention had been paid to the orders of the Board, or ver. Same order as above to be given to the tenants.
3. In the Killenagh & Wells (Dispensary) District, the nuisances at John Kinsellas Boley, & Pat^l. Murphys Killena are almost abated.



Chaplain's Report

April 23 — The present Board of Guardians has now happily the opportunity of doing an act of justice, long denied to the great majority of the children of the house — A Protestant Schoolmaster has been imposed on the Roman Catholic children in Grey Union alone with the exception of a few other places in, I believe, the North of Ireland, where in consequence, the Guardians there have attained an unenviable notoriety & are looked upon by all, but themselves, as actuated solely by the narrowest feelings of religious bigotry. The Protestant Guardians themselves here as well as elsewhere, when there is a question of the education of their own children, generally take good care to place them under Protestant teachers; & yet they have denied to a School of Catholic children the same privilege or right, so much valued by all. Moreover, the following important fact is sought to be ignored — namely, that one of the duties of a Workhouse teacher, as prescribed by rule is, to instruct regularly

~~The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—~~

the children of the school in the knowledge of the rudiments of their Faith. Now a Protestant as is obvious, can no more discharge this duty towards Catholic children, than a Catholic could towards Protestants. The expedient adopted even on the last occasion of a vacancy, of throwing on the Schoolmistress, in addition to the duties of her own School, those of the Schoolmaster also, resulted as might have been expected, it proved not only barren but injurious — barren — in as much as a mistress, especially not matured by age, could have comparatively little control over boys, if at all grown or unruly & belonging to another school; injurious — as the extra work would naturally operate as a temptation, & might be considered as an excuse, for neglecting the duties of her own. — On behalf of the destitute children of the house, many being orphans, I confidently rely on the justice of the present Board of Guardians.

The Committee appointed by the Board for the purpose of taking stock on the 25th March, had partially finished their business when a Sealed order came from the Local Gov^t Board dismissing the Master M^r Ryan, they then considered it useless to proceed further until a new Master would be appointed as the Stock should be again taken & handed over to him, they accordingly took Stock on the days of the 20th & 22^d of May & beg to state the following results. They refer the Board to the Clerk's report which they consider correct. They would suggest that the Board allow the Master for waste on some articles such as Tea, Bread, Meat, Soap & Coals, viz Bread £1-18-4 Meat £5 Tea £4-0-0 Coals £20-0-0, Soap £2-13-8. Total £33-12-4. This sum when taken from the Total of the Deficiencies leaves a balance against the Master of £61-14-2. The Committee cannot take it on themselves to allow more for waste in provisions, as on referring to the books we find that the deficiencies since the 25th March last are as follows. Bread 472 lb. Tea 8 lb. Sugar 60½ lb. Whiskey 135 Mag; Which proves to us waste was not the cause.
