Auditor's Report

I have struck out of this account & hereby disallow as illegal expenditure of the funds of the Union, the sum of £2-6-0 (portion of the sum of £4-12-0) paid to Jas. Brennan late Schoolmaster of the W. house as salary for four weeks after the date of the order under seal of the L. G. Board removing him from office. Such payment being at variance with Art^c 38 of the Gen^l Reg^s, & I hereby debit the said sum of £2-6-0 to William Millar Kirk - Thos. Cranwell & Patrick Stafford Esq^s the Gd^{ms} who by their signatures to the cheque, authorized the illegal payment.

In reference to the surcharge of £2-6-0 made by the Auditor on 13th Jan 776 - the Guard^{ms} of the Forey Union respectfully request the L. G. B. to ask the Auditor not to press this claim - in as much as the Guard^{ms} made a new appointment of School Master as soon as it was possible, they could not obtain the services of

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

another Schoolmaster sooner - & owing to the dismissal at that time of other officers of the house by the L. G. B. the Guard^{ms} could find no temporary substitute; - & we beg to refer the L. G. B. to their own letter N^o 8774 - 23rd Apl 1875 from the latter part of which the Guard^{ms} inferred that they could keep Mr Brennan till they could make other arrangements.
 "The Master & Schoolmaster must leave the Workhouse premises as required by the orders as soon as other arrangements can be adopted for the management of the Estab^t."

I have carefully considered the Report of the Com^{tee} appointed to take stock at the period of Mr Ryan's (late Master) departure from the Workhouse consequent on his dismissal, & the resolution of the Guard^{ms} in reference to that report as also the evidence taken before Mr O'Brien L. G. Insp^r at the Inquiry held by him at the W. house in the month of April 1875. And I feel it to be my duty to surcharge as I hereby do the said Mr Francis James Ryan with the sum of £50-6-6 being the value of the deficiencies in the stock of Provisions & Necessaries entrusted his charge as such Master, after allowing credit for £46-6-3 the cost of articles assumed to have been lost through waste & errors, & salary (amounting to £10) due to him at the date of his leaving the W. house - I make this surcharge pursuant to the 7th par Art^c 7 of the General accounts order being of opinion that the loss

In reference to the 2^d surcharge ordered by the Auditor as ag^t the Board of Gorey Union Guard^{ns} in regard to deficiencies in the stock taking acct. ag^t the late Master of this Union Mr Ryan - The Guard^{ns} beg to explain to the L. G. B. that a full board was summoned on 5th June last & fully considered the several deficiencies in the late Master's stock & after mature deliberation ~~and~~ they unanimously agreed (including the members of the stock taking committee) to the resolution of that day in his regard = The principle reason the Guard^{ns} had in not requiring a larger sum from the late Master in settlement of the deficiencies was that for four years no allowance had been made by the board to him on the legitimate & usual waste that occurred in weighing out coals & stores of every kind & therefore the board are not desirous to claim any greater sum from him than the £25 then assessed against him.

I have in accordance with an Order of the Board made an inspection of the premises of Denis Byrne & the house of Catherine Rouke in Anne Street Gorey.

The pool of stagnant water "as reported by the Sanitary Officer as existing on the premises of Denis Byrne is a filthy cess pool containing the discharge from a common Privy & has an overflow into the public street which is within a few yards of it - the contents of this pest hole seems to be occasionally (as the water over flows or evaporates) scraped up & stored on the sides of the lane - I have no hesitation in certifying that this is a bad Nuisance & highly prejudicial to the public health & I recommend that a covered sewer be made from the privy across the lane into the adjoining lane field - the manure to be immediately removed - the hole filled even with the lane & that the proprietor be prohibited from keeping manure in this passage -

The Sub Sanitary Officer in my opinion does good service by drawing the attention of the Sanitary Officer to such cases as the above & should be encouraged by the Board to persevere in his duty -

As to the house of Catherine Rouke it is reported that a cow shed communicates directly with the dwelling house by a door way & I find such is the case - but however much I might find fault with the owners good taste - I could not consider this a Nuisance & will not make any recommendation in the case.

I beg to mention, that I have been going over the Counter parts of my Sanitary report book for this time last year & I find that on two occasions I had to report the scanty supply of water to the Town of Gorey. I now have to state that for the last ^{week} in my own case which I am prepared to swear to if necessary & that the supply that comes into my water barrel is not sufficient for the use of the house for the day - I purchased a water barrel some time ago, had it in perfect order, without leak or other damage, from never having a supply to fill it the sun had the effect of opening the staves, & I may say rendering my barrel useless. I hear the supply of water in Carrion Row is good, but that is no advantage to my family when we are left without water except a scant flow for a few minutes in the morning, not sufficient by any means to supply the want of a family for a few hours. I will thank the Sanitary Board to have this case looked into as the want of water to a household in summer is prejudicial.
