I have in accordance with an order of the Board inspected two houses let by Mr Greene as Labourers' Dwellings at Gorey Hill & in reference thereto I beg to submit the following report. These houses are ill adapted for the purpose for which they are used - they are very small - the floors are at least two feet under the level of the public road which runs close by, & sufficient attention has not been paid to exclude surface water, & admit air & light. There is a family of 7 persons in one house, but 4 of these are very young children, & there are two compartments in the house - the second house is occupied by two persons - I found both houses scrupulously clean & whitewashed - As the ground at the south side falls considerably from these houses where there is also a large open space in front, I am of opinion that the following alterations would make each house quite habitable - at No. 1 house (the nearer one to Gorey) the surface drain in front between the door & the road should be deepened so as effectually to carry off the rain water - at No. 2 the door leading to the public road should be built up & a larger door (which formerly was in use) on the south side opened & the shrubs & weeds cleared away from the front of both - I pointed out these changes to Mr Greene & he readily acquiesced in their value & promised to have them made at once - Should he do so I think the Sanitary Authority will have no need to interfere further in this matter -

I have in accordance with the directions of the Board examined & enquired into the condition of the water supply of Bridge Street & Anne Street Gorey. In my inspection of the locality I was accompanied by the Executive Sanitary Officer & every particular connected with the water supply was carefully investigated by us, for several weeks past during the hottest part of the summer the supply of water to the streets above named has been taken either from a filthy well at the rear of Anne Street, or from a pipe near the Gas House in a position difficult of access, with filthy surroundings & from a source that under present circumstances cannot be considered pure, there can be no doubt but that the inhabitants of Anne Street & Bridge Street are in much need of a supply of pure water - A very large supply of the purest water can be brought into the Fountain at "Tree's forge" & also to the Gas House by the repair of the water pipes & I am aware that Orders have been made by the Sanitary Board to have these repairs, as well as some other alterations & improvements connected with the supply at the Gas House, carried out as soon as practicable - A never failing supply of pure water could be conveyed from the over flow at the fountain at Tree's forge to Anne Street in a direct line should the Sanitary Board think well of doing so, but I do not recommend this work as it would be attended with very considerable expense & I am of opinion that when the contemplated repairs & alterations are effected at the Fountain & the Gas house there will be an abundant supply of water within a reasonable distance & easy access from Anne Street & Bridge Street - I have taken the liberty to point out to Mr Creighton some additional alterations at the work to be done at the Gas House which I trust will meet with the approval of the Board - I recommend that the well at the rear of Anne Street be closed up



I have to report that in accordance with an Order of the Board, accompanied by Mr Morris P. L. G. & Dr Metge the S. O of the District, I inspected the Village of Coolgreany on Thursday last & carefully inquired into all the circumstances connected with the supply of pure drinking water for the Inhabitants. I am of opinion that to afford a very large & never failing supply of the purest water within easy access of the Village it is only necessary & repair & re open the Mill Race which ran across the Street & make provision for the interception of surface drains which in two or three places contaminate the water courses. Mr Morris fully understands the nature of the repairs & the requirements necessary in this matter & should the Sanitary Board decide on adopting the recommendations in this report I advise that he be requested to point out to the Contractor the work to be done & that it should be carried out under his Superintendence. 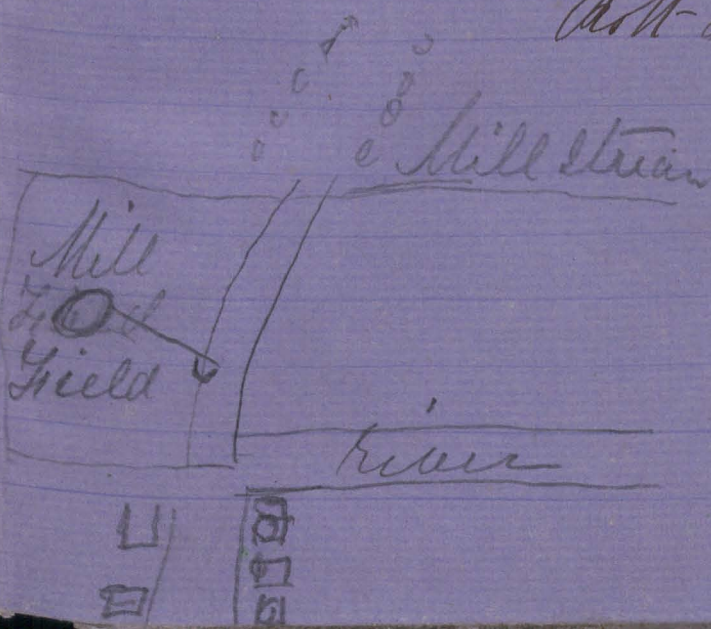

Having closely examined the Mill stream in Coolgreney, I have come to the conclusion that the cost will not exceed twenty pounds, which would not be so high, except that the filling for the large cut has to be drawn some distance, the two gullets are the next most expensive parts, I would recommend the sides to be built with lime mortar, as well as the wall at the deep cut which would require to be built with very large stones, it being about twelve feet deep, I would strongly recommend a sewer to be made from the spring in the Mill field to the road side, to be made with large tiles the distance being about seventy yards, it would require some protection so as to keep the water on the road from flowing into it, It is about midway between the river and the Mill stream proposed to be opened, There would then be a never failing supply of pure water for the village, and also for the Barrack, and the other houses adjacent, the cost <sup>will</sup> not exceed five pounds, and it would remove all the trespass from the land going to the well,

Writing, should be more carefully supervised -

Arithmetic - Simple rules not well understood in 2<sup>d</sup> & 3<sup>d</sup> classes. Frequent repetitions are absolutely necessary - Grammar not known by 3<sup>d</sup> class pupils.

The School is clean - well heated & suff<sup>ly</sup> ventilated - The pupils are clean & comfortably clad -

Female School - The answering of the pupils can be seen on the Ex<sup>n</sup> Rolls where it is fully tabulated - With one exception they have all merited promotion - Though the number in attendance is very small - a remarkable circumstance at this inclement season of the year - I think the teacher merits consideration from the Board for the satisfactory manner in which she has discharged her duty to the children - Writing - Good in one case, fair in the other.

Arithmetic - Good in all the classes. Scarcely an exception - Grammar - V Fair - Geography - V. Good in one case - Considering the ages of the children, there is a very good proficiency in needlework -
