The Mayor made reference to the recent demise of the late Councillor John O'Connor. He said that he found Councillor $0^{\prime} C o n n o r, ~ a s$ an old Colleague, to be straightforward and energetic in advoceting the betterment of the housing conditions of the working classes, and the interests of the working classes generally.

He moved that an expression of sympathy be conveyed to the camily of the deceased member in their bereavement, and also the meeting, at its rising, be adjourned to Wednesday next as a tribute of respect to the memory of the late member. Councillor Byrne seconded the motion, and in so doing said he regretted the event that geve rise to the proposing of the motion. Councillor $0^{\prime}$ Corrior was a truehearted Representative of the workers. The motion wes put ard wes passed unanimously. Several of the members present including the Mayor, Councillor Corish, Alderman Hanton, Councillor MoGuire, Alderman Hadden, Councillor Byrno, Councillor Carty, Councillor Kirwan, and Aldermen Kelly, took occesion to express their deep sorrow at the loss of life which had ocourred consiqeunt on the wreck of the Norwegian Ship "Mexico" on the Keeragh Rocks off the Coast of the Coumty Wexford on Friday, 20th Ultimo. On this occesion most of the crew of the Fethard Lifeboat lost their lives in an endeavour to save the lives of the crew of the ship. It was a pecularily sad occurrence, seeing that nine of the would-be rescurers were lost, while only one of the ship's crew lost his life. An earnest hape was expressed that the public would subscribe generougly to the Fund which had been opened for the maintenance of the families of those whose lives had been sacrificed by responding to the call of duty. The case of the Crew of the Tugboat "Wexford" was brought under notice. Were It not for the assistance which they had given in rescuing the marooned sailors, the diester might have been more grievious than it turned out, and it was hoped that their services would be recognized to the fullest in a satisfactory way. A vote of condolence was unanimously passed with the bereaved people of Fethard in the loss they had sustained, and attention was drawn to the praisworthy action of the No rweigan Parliament in voting 10,000 Crowns towards the Fund, and on the motion of the Mayor, seconded by Councillor Carty, it was decided to tender, through the Norweigan Minister in London, to his Government, the profound and respectful thanks of the council for this practical proof of their sympathy in the terrible loss of life which the disester involved. Attached to the kistimate of sums to be raised by a Poor Rate was a recommendation from the Finance Comaittee under date of l8th Instant, as to the making of the Poor Rate ata Rate of $2 / 2$ in the Pound.

With regard to the Estinate of Expenses to be borne out of the Splecial Rate called Rate in lieu of County Cess, there was included a sum of $£ 200$ in addition to the ordinary items of expenditure. This sum was inserted in the Estimate consequent on reports received of three Committees (a Comitte日 in respect of each Ward) that inspected att the streets of the town and reported on what was considered were very needful improvements to be carried out. These reports dealt principally with the requirements of the streets in the matter of footpaths, water channels, crossings, \&c., and to carry them into effect was calculated to involve a substantial increase in the rate. A discussion took place as to whether the sum in question should be struck out of the Estimate, with the result that it was allowed to remain in, but on the express condition that it wes to be devoted, as far as it would go, to the inprovements recommended by the Committee. A letter was read from the Superintending Engineer of post opfice Telegraphs, Treland, contaning request that the consent of the Wexford Corporation should be given to the erection and maintenance of one telegraph pole with the necessary wires, and one stay, proposed to be erecter in Rom Street, Wexford. Enclosed in the comminication was a plan of the site on which the pole was to be erected.

A Committee of two members of St. Selskar Ward, namely, Alderman Hadden and Councillor Carty, was appointed to visit Ram Street and decide if any conditions were to be attached to the consent required.

A commanication from the Under Secretary, Dublin Castle, wes read under date of
and intimated that the duty of enforcing the provisions of the Act was placed on the Borough Council, but in the opinion of the Lord Lieutenant, it was not necessary for an Officer to be specially appointed for the purpose, as the carrying out of the Act might be entrusted to the existing Sanitary Inspectors or other officer in the service of the Council.

This matter was referred to the Finance and Works Committee to be dealt with by them as they saw fit.

A circular was read from the Local Government Board No. 9848 , undar date of 25 th March 1914, drawing attention to the provisions of Section 7 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909. It showed that a Trade Board had bean established under the Act for certain branches of the tailoring trade in Ireland, and that bhis Trade Board had given notice fixing the minimum rates for male and female workers, respectively, in those branches of the ready-made and wholesale bespoke tailoring trade in Ireland in Which was carried on the making of garments to be worn by male persons. These rates came into force on the 2nd. February last, and though they had not yet been made universally obligatory by Order of the Board of Trade, Section 7 of the Act of 1909 required that local authority should not give a contract for such work to ank person who had not given notice to the Trade Board that he was willing that the rate Plxed by the Trade Board should be obligatory on him.

The contents of this circuler were noted, but it wes seen that it did not affect Wexford at the present time.

A circular letter dated 11 th March 1914, No49.M. from the Local Govenment Board was read. It intimated that the Board had had under consideration the final report of the Vice Ragal Comission appointed to inquire into the milk supply of Ireland, and were pleased to dbserve the conclusions come to by the Commission on the enforcement of the Dairies \&c. Order of 19u8. It appeared that since the issue of the Order, the standard of cleanliness in cowsheds had been raised, that the provisions of the Order did not injuire a person in the Dairy business, but, on the contrary, were beneficial to the trade. The Board observed that a most frequent ground of complaint arose from the accumulation of manure in close proximity to cowsheds, badly constructed floors, defective drainage, dirty and ill-kept walls, want of cleanliness in those employed in milking, and want of attention to the grooming of dairy cattle. The Board requested that the attention of Veterinary Inspectors should be drawn to Article 4 of the Sanitary (Veterianry Inspectors) Order 1909, and thet they be instructed to make frequent inspections and make full reports where they found that the terms of the Dairies \&c. Order were not being complied with.

This mattor was also referred to the Public Health Comittee to be dealt with as they saw flt.

With regard to the designs of dwellings proposed to be erected under the Housing Acts, the Town Surveyor stated that at the request of Mr. Deane of the Architect's Department of the Local Government Board, he (the Town surveyor) had had an interview with Mr. Deane in Dublin, and the latter gentleman had surgested that the provision made for furnishing some of the houses with dommer windows should be deleted from the Scheme, as the expense of providing thom was not attended with commensurate advantage. There were other minor modifications suggested, but this was the principal one.

The matter was fully deliberated on, and the result was that a motion proposd by Councillor Corish, seconded by Councillor Carty was unanimously adopted, viz. That as per notice duly given to members of intention to propose the rescinding of resolution included in the minutes of llth Pebruary last, such resolution be and is hereby rescinded in so far as it affocts the provision of domer windows for any of the proposed Wexford Borough Council westgate.

There was read from the County Surveyor an application for permission to connect the drains from the Sanatorium proposed to be erected at the Windmills Hill with the sewerage system of the town, and also for permission to lay on a supply of water to the Sanatorlum from the water system of the town on terms to be agreed upon.

This was a matter wilch it was thought well should be first dealt with by the Public Health and Waterworks Committees, and it was referred to these Comittees to, report thereon.

Tenders received in respect of supplying quantities of stones to be broken for roed metalling were submitted. They were from the following.

1. Williem Sullivan of Trinity Plee, Wexford, who offered to supply 800 tons at $2 / 8$ per ton.

Accompanying the tenders was a sample of the stone proposed to be supplied in each case. The samples were examined and were all found to be of suitable quality, but the two high r-priced ones were a degree of hardness more than the others, and so on the motion of Councillor Corish seconded by Alderman Kelly the four terders were accepted.

In connection with this matter there was also submitted a letter from the Balleece Quarry Company, Rathdrum, containing an offer to supply the 2000 tons required in the current year at the rate of $3 / 6$ per ton, in addition to whever the cost of the carriage of the material from Belleece would be delivered in Wexford, but these stones would be broken ready to spread on the streets, and it was decided that inquiries be made to ascertain what the full cost of the material would be.

A letter datad 16 th July, 1914, No. 36,959 , fror the Local fovernment Boerd was read. The Board pointed out, in reference to miputes of prooeedings of Counoil on lat. July 1G14; that in view of the Council's woceptance of the principle of the notification of Tuberoulosis it would be well thet stops should be taken fowards the adoption of Part I of the Tuberqulosis frevention (Ireland) Aet, 1906. There wes also read a letter from the Wexfor County Counoil urging the Wexfuri Urben Distriot to adopt Part I of the Act.

The Aet in question, as well as the Tuberculosis (Conditiuns of Notification) order, 1909, were also read for the meetinz. From this it was seen that the effect of the adoption of the provisions of Part I would be to make the disense of Tuberculosis of the Lung a notifiable disesse under certain canditions.

The meoting discussed the matter, but did not see its way, for the present, to decide on commencing the procedure preliminary to the adoption of the Ant, but adjourned the whole question to the next general meating to be held on 7 th September prox.

A circular from Dublin Castle dated 2and. July, 1914 wes resd coritaining a rejuest for a Return of orders under the Shops Aot, 1912, and siso asking the Counell to say from their experience what would be the best messures to sdopt to fncilitate the administration of the Act.

In response to the invitstion mambers submitted opinions an to, how the Aet itself could be usefully mmended so far as it apolied to Wexpord, as for exnmple the following osse: Publieans in Wexford were not required to. lose their premises: on the day of the weekly hall-holidny, but Ironnongers were, ail in onses where a-publican also dealt in hardware he enjoyed an undue advantage over an Iromonger. A further opinion expressed was that the Aot should be amended so as to make it compulsory on sil Classes of fraders to observe a weokly half-noliday on ane spooiflod day, but as to the working of the Aot af it was at presert framed, there was a diffioulty in ome cases of obtainipg (C): Wexford BOrovín COUnCilrequiring that a shopkeeper must not be convicted unless h 1 s premises be found open after alosing hour
for the serving of customers."
The Mayor proposed that the congratulations of the meoting should be tendered to Mr. John Edward Redmend, M. P., Por offering to plece at the dispossl of the Government the services of the Irish National Volunteers for the defence of Ireland in the present wer orisis. . Mr. Roduond's action had the spproval of Irishmon beasuse the present Lberal Government were engeged in an effort. to grent meesure of Howe Rule to this Country, and hed thus evoked feelings of friendilness from Irishmen towsrds England.

The motion was seconded by Aldermen Hanton and supported by Colmoillors Carty, MoGulre and Yemshon, and was passed unenimously.

Attention was called to the generel complaints made in the town about the increase in the price of articles of food consequent on the outbreak of the Wer. It was sald that flour and sugar had gone up in price to an unwerranted oxtent, and it was urged thet the Corporation should teke cognizerioe of syy cases of extortion with view to having thom exposed and reportod to the fropar quarter.

In the course of the consideretion of this metter, it wes pointed out thet the Governaent had given an sssurance there was no occasion for a fenio to nrise, end had taken measures to meot the emergonoy, by having an Aet of parliament passed to regralste the priens of Food.

However, there wes every sign thet the paris would be of short duration, end it whs docided that if necossary representations should be made to loosl deslers in food supolies to keep prices तown es far as possible to a nomal levalg, and to reflse eny domand mede by custoners for umssuslly large supzlios.

The discussion which arose on this subject resulted in the pasing of eresolution as proposed by Counctllor Moquile and seconded by Councillor Coffey as follows. .hath That the question of adopting Part I of the Tuberculosis (Prevention) Ireland Aoty 1908 be deferred, pending the erection of the proposed Tuberoulosis Sanitorium in Wexford.

A report was read from the Specid Public Lighting Comittee whioh was appointer on Ist December last. The Comittee hat met on sixteen occastons, Dut had held their first meeting on 5th Decomber 1913, when they hat taker tha initial step of than sppointing a oyolist as a temporary Ges Inspeotor co pour weaks at. \&l. O. O per week in order to be in a position to prove thet the complaints about the public , if Iighting were well founded. The Inspector hed received indtructions to start on his rounds at nightfall, ant to keep a record of all lamps which he found unlighted, and of all lamps showing defecient light. He cubmitted his firet report on 29th December 1915, showing that far tha previpus three weeks thepe had been pupbers or lamps in 4 O. Wextor Borough Counh cil unlighted after 11 ghting -up time fos perions ranghg from 10 minutes to one hour, and
a greater number still of lemps showing deflolent light. Thereupon the Comittee had furnished the Gas Company with a sumery of the report, but the charges conteined therein were met with an unqualified contradiction, the Company suggesting thet the Corporation would do well to undertake the work of lighting the public lamps and keeping them in order, the gas being supplied by the Compeny, and the automat 10 lighting arrangements being operatod from the Ges Works, as et .present, The Comittee could not, by ay mieans, fall in wh th this suggestion, as 1t was clear that if the Corporstion were to be responaible for meintsining the 11ghts without having any power to operate the sutomatio arrangement, there would be a divided reaponaibility whioh would lead to constant friction. The correspondence betwean the Comittee and the Directors ohed covered a period fran 5th Deor. 1. 1913, to 6.th August, 1914, and moreover, the Comittee and the Directors had met in conference on $9 t h$ June last. The upehot of all the nogoolations was that the Company offered, inter alia, to contributo sum of $7 /$ - per week for a period of six months tquerde the wages of a temporary Gas Inspector to be appointed by the Corporation at a remuneration of $14 /-$ a woek by way of an experiment, but on the condition that if the system of inspection, ahould prove unsetisfactdry to either the Corporation or the Company the Corporation should undertake the work of lighting the lamps. The Comittee were not averse to the appointment of an Inspector, but refused to recommend the appointment on the onditiond named by the Company, that is, if trouble arose the Corporation would be bound to do the lighting and the Comittee then had no al ternative, but to leavelthis point to the council for settlement.

These contained intimation that in the cases where premises were to be acquired from Mr. Gannon and from Mr. Bent for the purposes of the Housing Scheme, all legal negociations had been completed preparatory to making out the Deeds of Conveyance. He required instructions as to whether he was to hand over the purchese money and have the Deeds executed. There was nothing to prevent the Council, at the present stage, to borrow the Loan and commence building operations on three of the places selected as sites for the dwellings, namely, West Gate, H1ll Street, and the Manure Depot, but as to the plot to be acquired from the Nuns of St. John of God, the Nuns were not in a position yet to execute a Deed of Conveyance, for the reason that the plot was part of the Bolton and Scott Estate which was about to be sold to the tenants, but the Court had not seen its way to issue a Vesting order for a while longer.

As per an undertaking given by him at last meeting, Alderman Hadden read a coimunication which he had received from the Hon. Sec. pro.tem. of the Association of Irish Municipal Authorities. According to this, it appeared, the Treasury had refused to add to the Irish Housing Fund which was established by the "Clancy Act" Ireland's share (£360000) of the $£ 4,000,000$ allocated under the Housing Act of 1914 for the United Kingdom. It Was the intention of the Legislature, in passing the latter Act, to stimulate the erection of dwellings for the working classes in urbar areas, butb the action of the

interest on Housing Loans from 3 to $\%$ to $4 \%$ would have the effect of frustrating the praisworthy object of the Legislature. In the case of Wexford, for example, the increase in the rate of interest would involve an increase of about fivepence per week in the rents to be charged for the nouses.

Alderman Madden proposed that the Town Clerk should write to the Hon. Secretary of the Association asking him to be good enough to call a meeting of the Executive of that Body with a view to representations being made to the Prime Minister on the subject, as it was within the bounds of possibility that Mr. Asquith would be able to see his way to afford some relief, either in the shape of a reduction of the rate of interest, or finding a way to enable the Treasury to invest the $£ 360,000$ and apply the interest to the purposes of the Irish Housing Fund, and that the whole question be adjourned to Council Meeting to be held on and. November next to see if there would be any prospect of borrowing on easier terms that it was possible to do at present.

The motion was seconded by Councillor James Browne, and was adopted.

A letter was read fran the Board of Public Works under date of 28th October, 1914, No. 15,226. It contained intimation with reference to the application of the Couricil. for a loan of $£ 10,000$ to permit of dwellings being provided in the town under the Housing Acts, that the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury were not disposed to make loans at the present time except for urgentpurposes, and as the purpose for Which the loan was required did not appear to come within the category of urgent purposes, the Board were not in a position to proceed with the case. The question was considered, and in the course of the deliberations thereon, certain facts were brought under notice to show that the opinion of the Treasury as to the case not being a pressing one, was fallacious. In the first place, the town of Wexford was the most congested Urban Area in Ireland, es the population of 11,531 was housed within an area of 483 statute ares. of the 2318 dwelling houses there were no less than 260 unfit for human habitation. The unsuitability of the latter arose, in some instances, from overcrowding, dilapidation, and smallness, and in other instances there was an insuprable difficulty in the way of making the houses proper healthy dwellings because of the insufficiency of ground at the rere to allow of yards and sanitary conveniences to be provided. Furthermore in proof of the urgency of the case, there was a scarcity of employment in the building trade, and it was anticipated that distress would occur in consequence of the outbreak of the War, and and it wes unnecessary to say that an outlay of $£ 10,000$ in a town of the size of Wexford would go a long distance towards alleivating distress. Furthermore, it was out of the question to raise the proposed loan from the Benks, as no inducement short of a pronibitive rate of interest would satisfy their demands in the present uncertain state of the Money Market.
Thereupon on the motion of Councillor Coffey, seeonded by Councillor McGuire, it was RESOLVED: - That a Memorial be prepared and forwarded under the authenticity of the corporation seal ©. Wexford Borought Cotrincidth the facts of the case, and praying for the mediation of the Commissioners with the Treasury in favour
of the granting of the Loan, and that the requisite undertaking for the faithful discharge of the instalments of the loan according as they fall due, be signed and also Porwarded to the Commissioners.

The meeting was encopraged in the action it was taking in the foregoing matter by a statement made by Alderman Hadden. He said that as member of the Executive of the Association of Irish Municipal Authorities he had ascertained that Mr. Clancy, M. P. through whose exertions the Housing Act of 1908 was passed, was sanguine of succeeding in inducing the Treasury to appropriste to the purposes of the Irish Housing rund established under that Act, the share which Ireland was antitled to of the $\mathcal{L 4}, 000,000$ voted by Parliament in l914for distribution by way of Ioans for Urban housing purposes in the Unitad Kingdom.

It was brought under notice thet the Roads Board had to its credit a sum of three million Pounds which, in furtherance of the policy of the Board up to the present, was to be devoted to the work of strengthening and improving road surfaces and not the construction of new tho roughfares, or the enlargement of did ones. The Board proposed, at the present juncture, to make grants more extensively and more speedily than it hitherto had done towards improving the surface of main roads. It was suggested, in view of this fact, that it would be well for the council to formulate a scheme for the improvement of the surface of the line of roats from the New Bridge to Maudintow, that is to say, the Redmond Road, the Quays, Trinity Street, William Street, and Maudlintown, which obviously must be classed as main roads, with the object of applying for a Grant.

Arising out of this subject, attention was directed to the fact that the harbour Commissioners had prepared a scheme for reclaiming the foreshore at Crescent Quay, hoping to obtain assistance from the Roads Board towards the execution of the work. The Scheme, it appeared, had been in abeyance, from one cause or another, for about two years, and it was urged that the Council should interest itself in the scheme as far as it was legitimbtely possible.

Thereupon on the motion of Councillor Certy, seconded by Alderman Kelly, it was RESOLVED: - That a Committee be appointed consisting of the Mayor, Aldermen Hanton, Corish, Hedden, and Councillors Carty and McGuire to take such measures as they may deam fit, with the assistance of the Roads Board, towards putting the main roads in : the Borough in a thorough state of repair, and also to render any services in their power to further the efforts of the Harbour eommissioners regarding the proposed reclamation at the Crescent Quay.

With regard to minutes of 7 th Ultimo, three persons applied to be appointed as temporary Gas Inspector. These were John Power, of Talbot Street, Nicholas J. Cosgrave of George Street, and William Goodisson of John Street, all of Wexford. The applicants all seemed eligible, but Mr. N. J. Cosgrave was appointed, as 14 members voted for him, while only 3 voted for Mr. Goodisson, the other applicant receiving no support.

As the present was an opportune time in which to do the work of repairing the road sufficiency of
broken stones for the purpose had failed to furnish supplies, and it seemed useless to depend on obtaining adequate supplies locally for immediate use, it was suggested than on orier should be placed with the Balleece or Arklow Quarries for roed metelling.

The suggestion wes adopted, and the Finance ard Works Committee were suthorized to deal with the matter.

An influentially signed Memorial received through the Mayor from Lady Cory of Castle Boro Enniscorthy, was submitted. The Memorialists asked that the Council should frame and adopt bye laws governing the humene slaughtering of animals. Memorialists mintained thet unnecessery suffering wes caused in the killing of antmals for food by antiquated methods, and that all animels, before being bled, should be stunned by a humane instrument, othe $r$ than a pole axe or club. Instruments which could be operated mechanically and capable of producing immediate a effectual stunning of an animal were on sale.

The following is a copy of a Resolution from the Wexford Urban Relief Comaittee. Proposed by ME. J. S. Thompson, seconded by Mr. Edward Redmond.
" RESOLVED: - That as it is painfully evident a general scarcity of employment exists in and about Wexford at the present time, and as from inquiries made and lefinite information obtained from builders, the will be a lack of work in the building trade before the ciose of 1914, inasmuch as all existing contracts have been completed and no new contracts are forthoming, this Committee for the Relief of Distress begs respectfully tocell the attention of the Municipal Council to the expediency of raising funds with the object of starting useful public works for the unemployed in the emergency." On the motion of Councillor Carty seconded by Councillor Mofuire, it wes decided, the subject matter of this resolution having been considered, to send a copy of it to the Roads Board in support of the application to be made to that Bored for pecuniary essistence towarde the cost of the projected improvement of the surface of Main roads withir the Urban Area axt the reclamation or the foreshore at the Crescent Quay, end copy also to the Commissioners of Works to show that the representations made to the Commissioners on the subject of granting a Buildins Loan to the Counctl were in no way exaggerated.

A letter dated 27 th November, 1914, No. 54962 , from the Locel. Fovernment Board was submitted. It had reference to the proposel to put into operation the Provision of Meals (Ireland) Act, 1914, and inter alis contained the following sta iement.
"The Board would not be disposed to raise any objection to the proposal of the Urban District Couiscil to divide the funds at their disposal among the various School Authorities in the District in proportion to the necessitous childran on the Rolls, provided that Pormal recelpts are given by the Managers of the Schools for the sums so advanced undertaking that the whole amount will be disburied for food alone and that no portion will be applied or deducted for expenses of managemert, cooking, or distribution."

Thereupon on the motion of Alderman Corish seconded by Countillor Byrne, a resolution in the following terms wes duly edopted.

RESOLVED: - That whereas from inquiries made through the School Attendance Committee acting in concert with a Committee of the Corporation, this Urban District Council are satisfied that, there are, at the present time, 516 children attending schools In the Wexford Urban Area unable, by reason of lack of food, to take full advantage of the education provided for them, and have ascertained thet funds other than public funds are insufficient in amount to defray the cost of food furnished in meals under the Education (Provision of Meals) (Ireland) Act, 1914, mee, tho urbon pre ©.: Wexford, Borough Councilont boart tor

Ireland to autho mize the said Council to spend, out of the Rotes, such sum as will meet the provision of such food up to the extent of a sum producable by a Rate of a halfpenny in the Pound on the valuation of the Borough of Wexpord.

With regard to action taken on l4th October last, on which occasion it was resolved to Join with the Arklow Urban Council in an endeavour to have the present hour of deperture of the lest train from Dublin to Wexford changed, a letter from the Town Clerk of Arklow was read asking to be informed if Wednesday, 9 th December would be a day convenient to the Council to meet $M$. Coghlan of the D. \& S. E. Railway Campary, and it was ordered; -

The Mayor referred to the subject of the approaching retirement from office of His Excellency, the Lord Lieutenant. He said, inter alis, that Lord Aberdeen, during his term of Office, had shown that he was animated by a desire to advance the interests of all classes in Ireland, especially the poorer classes, for the improvement of whose condition His Excellency and Lady Aberdeen had laboured with unflagging zeal. He suggested that an expression of regret at the departure of the Viceroy and his Consort from Irelend should be pleced on record.

Following on the introduction of the subject, several members, nemely, Aldermen Hadden, Hanton, Kelly, and Councillors Byrno, McMahon, and Carty joined in paying a glowing tribute of gratitude to the part taken by their Excellencies in the government of the country for the last nine years. The latter had associated themselves with every Movement calculated to raise the status of the people, whether

and beyond all this, they represented the growing body of opinion which ran in favour of a Measure of Self Government being granted to Ireland.

Alderman Hadden proposed the following resolution which wes seconded by Alderman Hent an and was passed, but with Alderman Corish dissenting.

RESOLVED: - That we, the Corporation of Wexford, have heard with deep regret of the retirement of the Marquis of Aberdeen foom the high position of Viceroy of Ireland; that we avail of the occasion to acknowledge gratefully the invaluable work dane by His Exceliency and the Marchioness of Aberdeen in initiating and furthering, during their period of Office, many movements for the practical, industrial, and social well-being of the Country, and recognize the noble, untiring, and unselfish manner in which they devoted their services to the task of raising and ameliorating the condition of the people, a task in which they have succeeded in a marked degree. That we beg to record an expression of our high appreciation of these services, and to say that in their departure from this Country their Excellencies carry with them our heartfelt wishes for their future happiness.

The Mayor read a letter which he had received from the Lord Mayor of Dublin, intimating that a meeting of representative men was to be held at the Mansion House on 5th Instant to take steps with a view to mark, in a befitting manner, the severance of the official connection of His Excellency with Ireland, and containing a request that the Mayor of Wexford would find it convenient to attend the meet ing. At the request of the members present, the Mayor was good enough to promise to attend.

Letters read from Mr. Firench M. P. amd Mr. O'Connor, Solicitor, conveyed the welcome intelligence that the Treasury had done the Municipal Council the favour to advance a Loan of $£ 10,000$ to provide working class dwellings. Having regard to the expected want of employment in the town and the difficulty experienced in obtaining the Loan because of the stringency in the Money Market at the present crisis, the Council had much to congratulate themselves on in the matter. Allusion was made to the services rendered by Mr. Firench, Mr. O'Connor, the Mayor and the Town Clerk in helping to obtain the privilege granted, and on the motion of Councillor Carty seconded by Alderman Corish, it was decided that the thanks of the meating be tendered to the individuals mentioned as having taken an active part in pressing forward the case of Wexford.

In further pursuit of the subject, the Mayor said that taking all the circumstances of the case into consideration, he beleivad that the good will of the Public Departments concerned was worthy of recognition. The amount to credit of this Fund was 2145 at presentand as sll sources of income in the current year had been collected and lodged, it would be necessary to raise a sum of $£ 400$ or so to allow the work of repairing streets to be carried on for the ensuing three months. Gentlemen, I desire to withdraw my Tender for the building of seventeen houses situated at West Gate and Hill Street, Wexford, whikh was accepted on the loth Inst. I now desire to state that the Compeny I mentioned in my tender do not take on liability for Contractors: business, hence the withdrawal of my tender of the loth Instant.

> I remain Gentlemen, Respectfully Aidan Redmond.

This letter having been submitted to the Finance and Works Committee on $24 t h$ Ulto, the Committee decided to communicate with the other two intending Contractors, intimating to them the withirawel of Mr. Rednond's tender, and asking if their offers would hold good under the circumstances until this day, when the Council would be invited to consider the situation which had arisen.

In reply, letters received from Mrs Mary $0^{\prime}$ Connor and Mr. John Browne were submitted These showed that the tenders of the two Pirms in question were still open for acseptance by the Council. A discussion which arose on the question resulted in the adoption of the following Order and Resolution.

Ordered:- That in future cases where Bonds are required in connection with Contracts intending Contractors must enclose along with their tenders a specified sum to be forfeited to the Council in the event of any tender not turning out to be bona fide; or that at least written undertakings from reliable Guarantee Societies, as to their willingness to furnish the requisite security, be furmished along with the tenders. Resolved, as proposed by Councillor MeGuire, seconded by Councillor Byrne.
at West Gate for a Sum of $£ 1020$, and of building seven houses at Hill Street for a sum of 21323 , and the tender of Mr. John Browe in respect of erecting six houses in Hill Street for 1146 , be sccepted, the tenders in question be ing the lowest in amount next after the withdrawn tenders of Mr. Aidan Rodmond, but that this acceptance be subject to the Security of the Guarantee Companies nemed by the Contractors being approved.

With reference to minutes of 13 th Jamary last, on which ocession it was seen by a letter received from the Boad of Public works that the application to the Board for a Loan of $£ 10,000$ was granted, a Deed of Mortgage to be executed by the Council in the case was submitted, and thereupon the two following Resolutions were sdopted. Proposed by Aldermen Hanton, seconded by Councillor McGuire.

RESOLVED: - That our Corporate Seal be affixed to the Deed of Mortgage of this date now read, whereby security is given to the Comissioners of Public Works in Ireland for the repayment of the sum of Ten Thousand Pounds proposed to be advanced by them to us under the Housing of the Working Classes (Ireland) Act, 1890 to 1908, and the ircorporated, amending, or extending Acts.

Proposed by Alderman Corish, seconded by Councillor Rossiter.
That inasmuch as this Council does not immediately require from the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland the total amount of the sur mentioned in the Deed of Mortgage to them this day executed by this Council, but prefer to receive the same by instalments as occasion may require.

It is Resolved, that the requisitions for each adrance shall be intimated to said Commissioners by the Chairman of this Council for the time being, countersigned by William A. Browne, Town Clerk.

And that each such Requisition shall be forwakded to the Accountant of the said Comissioners and all such advances shall be lodged to our Account as The Loan Account, in the Wexford Branch of the Nationsl Bani.

Thereupon the Deed of Mortgage was duly sealed and signed, the Comoration Solicitor boing witness to the ect.

With reference to minutes of loth February Ultimo, on whichoccasion a notice was Bccepted from Councillor McGire of his intention to move that an increase of wages be granted to the staff of workmen employed by the Council in scavenging and repairig roed surfaces because of the increased cost of household necossities as a consequence of the War, Councillor McGuire introduced the subject of his notice and moved that in order to help the Council to messure the amount of the increase to be granted, a Keturn, showing the weekly wages received by each workman for the past year be prepared for submission to the Pinance and Works Camittee.

The motion was seconded by Councillor Byrne, and adopted, but with the proviso that if any incresse of wages should be granted, it should take effect fram Thursday next, 4th. Instant.

A recomendation read from the Finance and Works Comittee under date of 17 th Ultimo,


The Sergeant had applied to the Committee to take his case into consideration, having regerd to the rise that had taken place in the price of household comendities and on the motion of Councillor Coffey, seconded by Councillor McMahon, the recommendation was adopted.

A recommendation under date of 24 th Febmary was received from the Waterworks Comiltee. It ran in favour of the wages of the Caretaker of the Reservoir being incressed from $6 /-$ to $7 /-$ a week.

Alderman Corish moved the adoption of the recommenditionn.
The motion wes seconded by Councillor McMahon and was passed, but only on a division being taken.

Alderman Corish brought under notice the case of the Caretaker of the Town Hall, in which an incraase of remuneration was called for also on the same grounds as the increases were given in the foregoing cases.

He proposed that the wages of the Caretaker of the Town Hall be increased by \&2.
a year.
The motion was seconded by Councillor Joseph Doyle and was adopted.
Councillor Rossiter gave notice of his intention to move an increase of salary in the case of the Sanitary Sub-officer, the Iurncock, and the Foerman of Works at next Statutory Meeting.

The notice was accepted.
A letter from the Secretary of the Wexford Municipal Technical Institute was read. It contained a request that the Council would receive a Deputation from the Committee of the Institute to place the views op the Comittee on the necessity of erecting a new Technical School building before the council.

The meeting decided that they would receive the Deputation with plessure on any convenient occesion.

The following is a copy of a resolution which was adopted, as proposed by Councillor McMahon, and seconded by Alderman Corish, a similar resolution having been adopted by the Corporation of Drogheda on 17th Ultimo.
"That owing to the enormous prices of cereals throughout the world, prices not even reached during the American Civil War, and to the probable shortage of foodstuffs in the near future, we deem it our duty to call ypon the farmers of Louth, Meath, and the country generally, to imitate the tillage campaign inaugurated throughout the United States of America, throughout the self-govemed Dominion of Censde and other Countries to put more ground under cultivation, and that we believe that if the axtensive cattle ranches of Mesth and Westmesth, and other grazing courties were broken up, tilled and cultivated, that Ireland, ins sead of having to obtain her food supplies fiom abroad would have a large surplus for exportation."

The following is a copy of a resolution which was adopted, as proposed by
Counciilor Rossiter, seconded by Councillor Murphy, a similar resolution having been adopted by the

Resolved:- lst. That as the oxistence of ntive industries is essential to the material prosperity and National welfare of our Country, we respectfully call on the people of County Wexford to give the Industrial Novement that generous measure of support which they gave in the early days of the Gaelic League.

2nd. That in view of the long duration of the world war, and the shortage of food supplies owing to the disturbed state of the wheat-growing countries, we wish to record our appreciation of the action of those farmers in County Wexford Who, at the suggestion of the Clergy, Press, Public Boams, and Public Men, have sown en extra quentity of wheat, and we recommend more extensive sowinf of gra in during the Spring.
3.d. That since the seapishing industry wer in the past a plourishing County Wexford industry, we respectfully ceill on the Wexpord county council to consider th $\theta$ advisability of appointing a fishery instructor who would, by a practical course of lectures, bring under the notice of those engaged in the industry, new fishery appliances as well as facilities of transport and markets. Advertisements having been issued at the istance of the Finance en Works Comnttee inviting tenders in respect of executing sundry strustural repairs on the range of working class dwellings situate at Carrigeen and Roche's Road, it wes found that ony one tender had been lodged in response to the invitation. This was opened and found to be from Mr. John Parle, Carpenter, Wexpord, who offered to do ell the work of repairing the houses in manner specified in the specification, in consileration of being paid a sum of 252 . on the completion of the work. The estimate of the cost of the Town Surveyor in the case was referred to, and this was found to be £43. 10.0 , and on the motion of Aldermen Corish, seconded by Councillor Murphy; it was Resolved: - That the tender be accepted.

With regard to minutes of 7 th September, 1914, a letter from the County Wexford Committee of Management under the Turberculosis (Prevention) Ireland Act, 1908, wes read. It contained a Resolution of the Committee saking the Urban and Rural Councils In the County to adopt the Tuberculosis (Conditions of Notificstion) Ireland Order, 1909. The effect of the adoption of the order in question would be to add, under certain circumstances, the form of Tuberculosis known as Tuberculosis of the Lung to the list of notifiable diseases. The last occasion on which the question was deliberated on there was a resolution passed deferring action pending the erection of the proposed Sanitorium.

Councillor McGuire gave notice that he would move, at next monthly meeting the recision of this resolution, and in the event of the rescinding motion being carried, that he would propose a resolution adopting the order in question.

The notice was accepted.
The following two orders were made.
1st. That the Town Clerk write to the Local Government Board asking that the town of Wexford should be supplied with a share, measured according to population,

Canade, to alleviate want caused by the War.
2nd. That the Town Clerk write to the County Surveyor asking if any informetion hed been received from the Koads Board on the subject of the Scheme for repairing the surface of main roads within the Urban Ares, and for executing reclamation works at Crescent Quay, adopted by the Council on the 16 th December las Attached to the minutes is a copy of a printed Estimate with which Members had been furnished. As the estimated rents to be charged for the dwellings about to be erected were seen from this to be almost double what were the rants chargeable for houses of similar dimensions under former Housing Schemes, it was decided to dvaw the attention of the Local Government Board to the enormous increase in the cost of building, asking the Board to be good enough to bring under the notice of the Treasury the wisdon of relieving Urban Authorities of their indebtedness on pot of Building Loans to the extent of $20 \% 6$ of the amount of such Loens. In amking this request the Council are satisfied that the relief of lo\% on the arount of Building Losns, as promised by the Treasury, will not be sufficient Inducement to Urben Authorities to carry out Building Schemes under the Housing Acts.

The Accounts of the Collector of Borough Rate and of Rate in lieu of County Cess were produced. They had heen under examination by the Finance Committee. The Committee mde the following Recommendation.

That there be written off as irrecoverable items of Borough Rate amounting to £22. 14. 6, and items amounting to $£ 39$. 3. I $\frac{1}{2}$ in the case of Rate in lieu of County Cess, and the balarice of items outstanding, 1. e. \&4. 16. 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ and £7. 7. $4 \frac{1}{4}$ respectively be carriod forward as arrears.

The recommendation was adopted.

A Special Meeting of the Council was held this day (Pursuant to the mayor's requisition) at the Town Clerk's Office at half past seven o'clock p. m.

Attached to the Estimate of sums to be raised by a Poor Rate was a recommendation of the Finance Committee under dete of loth instant es to the making of the poor Rate at a rate of $2 / 4$ in the pound.

In reference to the Borough Fund Estimate, attention was called to an Item of £40 set down as receipts from the dust-bin service and charges for emptying ashpits. This was the full yearly revenue obtained from this source, but as the cost connecteld تith the work came to 260 a year, it was maintained by merabers that the dust-bin service which was availed of by the well-to-do classes should be made self supporting Tho result of a discusision on the matter was that an instruction was directed to be sent to the Finance and Works Committee to consider the desirability of revising the scale of charges for emptying dust-bins, with a view to these charges being incressed Thereupon on the motion of Alderman Corish seconded by Councillor Cowman it wes unamimously Resolved: - That a Borough Rate of $1 / 3$ in the Pound be hereby agreed on, being $1 /$ - in the pound for General Town Charges and 3d in the Pound for Santtary Charger.

With regard to the Estimate of Expenses to be raised by means of the Special Rate, 1. e. Rate in lieu of County Cess, it was seen that it was necessary to bring the Poundage of this Rate up to $2 / \infty$, this being the maximum poundage fixed by the special Act under which the Rate was leviable. But notwithstanding the making of a maxdmum Rate, the Estimate showed that there would still be a deficiency et the close of the year of 1448.12 .2 , unless sweeping retrenchments were made, or that a new rate under the Towns Improvement (Ireland) Act, 1854 were made to supplement the revenue to be derived from the Special Rato.

On the subject of retrenchent, attention was directed to an item of $£ 150$ inoluded in the estimete as the cost of constructing a proosed new sewer at Windmills Hill. As to this item, the meeting was reminded that it was open to them to strike it out
 Mchuire, it was decided to let the item stand and have the sewer constructed in the
ensuing financiel year.
The question then raised was how was the estimated deficiency of $£ 448$ to be provided. On due consideretion the meeting decided to reduce the item set down for general repairs by that amount, and on the moion of Councillor McGuire, seconded by Alderman Hadien it was

The meeting considered the question of striking a Rate under the Towns improvement Act 1854 for the purpose of raising a sum of 8448 in respect of repairing streets, as well as a sum of $£ 300$ as the purchase price of el even small dwellings in Trimmers Lane, together with $£ 100$ cost incidental to demolishiag some of these houses and improving and widening the street, on whi h latter subject a Cammittee report had been received as follows.

RE. TRIMMERS LANE.

The following members of the $\infty$ mittee appointed to go into this matter attended this evening. Alderman Robert Hanton, Alderman Joseph Kelly, Alderman Carty, and the Mayor. After going into the mattor with Mr. M. J. O'Connor they found that all the property required for the widening of the street and carrying out the scheme can be purchesed for $£ 300$, that $i s$ to say, all those houses on North side of lane, excopt three belonging to Mrs Sinnott, can be pruchased from Charles O'Brion Esq. for $£ 150$ free of all ground rent, and Mrs Sinnott will sell her 8 houses for £150. Five of these houses are on the south side and would not be required. They are subject to a ground rent of £l4. 19. 4 and are let for $2 / 6$ per week each- $£ 26$ per year; in other words, for the payment of $£ 300$ the Corporation carl take down eleven houses and thereby widen the stioet, and they will have on hands five houses, four of which are lot at present and bring in £26 per year, on one of which the Corporation will have to pay the head rent of £14. 19. 4 a year. The remaining house on the south side is closed, but could be repaired for a small outlay. We are of the opinion that the improvement is much noeded, and at above price can be very cheaply carried out. Wè strongly recormend it to be carried out at once. It has now been discussed by the Corporation for just ten years.

With reference to minutes of lst Ultimo, when it wes decided to receive a Deputation from the Comittee of the Wexford Municipal Tecinical Institute, it was announced that the Secretary of the Committee had intimated that the Deputation would not attend. The Committef had re-considere's the situation and had come to the conclusion that the present would de as inopportune time to boriow money for the erection of a new Technical Insti tute, or to ask the Council to increase the amount of the subsidy paid in aid of Technical Instruction.

The question of rescinding a resolution of 7 th September last, whereby action was deferred in the matter of adopting Part I of the Tuberculosis Prevention(Ireland) Act 1908, was brought under consideration.

Councillor McGuire proposed that the resolution of 7 th September be rescinded, and that thereupon Part I of the Tuberculosis Prevention (Ireland) Act 1908 be adopted within the Urban Sanitary District of Wexford.

The motion was seoonded by Councillor Coffey but failed to be carried, as only seven members voted for and nine against it on a Division having been taken. Recommendations from various Committees were received in pursuance of and in accordence with the spirit of decision come to by the Council on lst March last regerding the Justice of granting increases of wages owing to the rise in prices consequent on the War. These were in favour of increses being given in the following cases and at the following differential rates, viz:-Labourers, $2 /-$ a week, Carters

Councillor McGuire, seconded by Councillor Cowmen, the recommendetions were adopted in globo.

A Special Committee drew attention to the fact that the work of excavating for the foundations for the new houses to be built in Hill Street was being proceeded with, but before the work of laying the foundations was gone on with, it was advisable to alter the alignment of the houses. Dear Sir,

> Road Improvement Work---Wexford Urban District.

I beg to refer to your letter of the 26 th instant, and the profiosal submitted by your Council for strengthening and surfacing certain roads in the Wexford Urban District, and for constructing a Quay wall and seotdon of new road at the Crescent, Wexford Harbour, at the total expenditure of $£ 6285$.

Before dealing further with the matter the Board will be glad to receive details of any other works of road improvement in respect of which your Council may Intend to apply for advances from the Road Improvement Fund, or to be assured that the scheme submitted is the only one which is to form the subject of an application during the financial year ending 3lst March 1916.

At the seme time, I have to inform you that the demand for labour and materials for urgent mational requirements is such, that it is extremely undesirable Por Highway Authorities to press forward any schemes which could be postponed, even although such postponement causes some locel inconvenience.

The policy on which the Board are acting at the present time is based on the need of economising public expenditure, and of deferring works of read improvement, except in cases where the work is necessary to prevent serious deterioration.

From the information before the Board, it would appear that the proposal referred to---or at least portions thereof---might conveniently be postponed, end I am directed to ask your Council to consider the advisability of taking this course. The County Surveyor, Yours faithfully, H. P. Maybury.

The meeting thereupon decided that the Collector would provide a Bond from an aporoved Btdelity Guarantee Compeny to the amount of Pifty Pounds for the fathful discharge of his duties.

The tenders, on being opened, proved to be fram Messri $N$. J. Cosgrave of 11, George Street, Wexford, and fram R. MadDonald. The former offered to act as Collector if he were paid $£ 24$ as remuneration, ant the latter was prepared to act at a remuneration of $£ 9$. O. O. Both applicants were proparod to grovide any securlty deomed necessary, and thereupon on the motion of Alderman Kelly, seconded by Councillor McGuire, R. MacDonald's tender was accepted.

Cosgrave during a period of 14 nights to see if the complaints had any foundation in fact. His report was reat, and from this it eppeared he hed commenced to inspect on the night of the 17 th June, and in the periodmentioned had found no less than 23 lamps unlighted for the whole night on an everage, as well as a number of lamps showing deficient light each night owing chiefly to defective mantles.

A lengthy discussion arose on the questionwith the result that Wednesday, 7 th Inst wes apoointed as a dey on which a Committe $\theta$ of the whole Council was to be called together to deal with the question.

A letter from the Corporation Solicitor was read intimating thet the plot of ground at Findmills Hill which fomerly belonged to the Nuns of the Convent of St. John of God had been taken possession of in behalf of the Council as a site for houses to be erected under the Housing Acts. There was no obstacle in the way of the Council commencing building operations on this plot at once. He advised that the work of laying the foundetions should be proceeded with at once, so as to keep the whole scheme of houses in process of execution. This would show the Tressury that the provision of the houses was a matter of urgency in the remote possibility of the Treasury hesitating to advance the portion of the Loen not yet applied for through the Pinancial pressure occasioned by the war.

This matter was also referred to a Committee of the entire founcil to be called together on Wednesday, 7th Instant, but it was arranged that in the meantime Mr. $0^{\prime}$ Connor was to be seen and asked if he was aware of the undertaking given by the Council to the Board of Werks that one-half of the Loan of $£ 10,000$ was to be requisitioned in instalments in 1915, and the other half not before lst January, 1916.

On the matter being discussed it was found that the cement used by her in the work wes of at least equal quality to the cement spocified, and the cleim was accordingly epproved.

An accusation was made also about rafters having been allowed to be ased in the work which were nine inches short of the length specified, but this was emphatically denied by the Town Surveyor, and the meeting took no action as they did not feel justified in proceeding on the ipse dixit of only two members.

With regard to minutes of 5 th Ultimo, on which occasion the consideration of a tender for sewer pipes was deferred, a letter received from the Secretary of the Irish Industrial Development Association was read communicating the information that glazed sewer pipes. were not menufactured in Ireland.

The tender of Mr. Glorney was then examined, and on the motion of Councillor Mciulre seconded by Councillor Coffey, it was resolved to order from the intending Contractor the re juisite number of sewer pipes $32 / 3$ per lenth, of splay junctions $3 / 6$ each and of manhole covers (3) $45 /-$ each.

The Council having contributed on lst Februnry last to the funds of the Asso dation of Irish Municipal Authorities, were invited by letter to appoint two representatives to attend the Annual Meeting of the Association to be held in Dublin on $2 l$ st and $22 n$. September 1915, and on the motion of Councillor Coffey seconded by Alderman Carty, it was decided to appoint the two members who acted as Delegates on former occasions, namely the present Mayor and Alderman Hadien to represent the Council at the meeting. A communication recelved from a Conference held in Dublin on $20 t h$ July was read. The Conference claimed to be representative of the National, Industrial, and Labour Bodies. It hed adopted a resolution egainst Consoription and asked that the Urban Council of Wexford should endorse the resolution and nominate a Delegate to a Committee to do all scts necessery to counter any attempt to bring sbout canscription. Councillor VeGuire proposed that the communication should be marked "read".

The motion was seconded by Councillor Keating, but Alderman Corish proposed that the resolution of the CorferenextordaBorough. COUMCilmer we declare we
will not heve Conscription" should be adopted.
The motion was seconded by Councillor Martin, but after discussion and a Division the proposition of Councillor McGuire wes cerried.

The advisableness of drawing the attention of the Ministry of Munitions to the Iftness of Wexford as a Centre for the production of war material was brought under notice. The establishment of a munitions factory in the town would be of great service to the working, clesses and would be the means of stopping the exodus of munition workers to England, which was a matter of daily occurrence latterly.

Wexpord had an advantage over any other town of its size in Ireland to elaim a share of the work' at the disposel of the Mintstry of Munitions. Owing to the existence of the four Firms of ironworks in the tow, there was to be had a large body of skilled mechanicel labour, and outside of that there wes to be had numbers of persons, male and femele, susceptible of being quickly trained to manufacture munitions, such es fuses, bombs, and hand grenedes. TheRe was also availeble vacant buildings, such as the Distillery and the Military Barracks capable of being conveniently turned into munition factories. Wexford also stood in a singularly good geographical position In relation to London, 8,3 the journey between the two places was capable of belng accomplished in ten hours.

Thereupon on the motion of Councillor Rossiter, seconded by Alderman Carty, it was resolved to appoint a Committee of members of the Council, with power to co-opt non-members, if necessary, to work up a case in isvour of Fexford and press it on the mitention of the Ministry of Munitions.

The members of the Corporation appointed were Aldermen Hedden, Hanton, Carty, and Councillors Rossiter, Keating and McGuire.

A circular from the Local Government Board No. $65 /$ M/1915 unler date of 26 th July 1915 was read. The subject of it was the sale of food and drugs. The Board considered that the number of samples submitted for analysis by Local Authorities as a rule were too few and were restricted to too small a class of articles. The Board suggested thet Inspectors of Food and Drugs should be directed to make a varied selection of food stuffs, and showed a list of items of food and drugs suitanle for analysis. It was Ordered: - That the attention of the Inspector of Food and Drugs be called to the terms of the circular and he be instructed to take samples of all articles mentioned in the circular as being lienle to anelysis.

4th August, 1915.

Among the Bills passed this day for payment was an item of $£ 18$. 8. 2 deducted ats lest meeting from the Gas Compeny's Bill pending a decision being come to by the Public Lighting Committee. The Committee had come to the canclusion since then that a. part of this item should be left unpaid as a protest against the neglect of the Company to perform their duty, but as such part was found to be samewhat under $£ 1$. 1t wes deemed not to be worth while having any further dispute about.

Alderman Corish made allusion to the sad bereavement which had fallen on Mr. Edward Merryman, an employe of the Council. Mr. Merryman had lately received official information of the death of his son, Corporal Merryman, who was kill ed in action at the Dardanelles. He proposed that an expression of the sympathy of the Council be recorded in the case and conveyed to Mr. Merryman.

The motion was seconded by Councillor O'Brien, and adopted unanimolisly.
The Mayor, in putting it, took occasion to observe that the deceased had taken a noble part in giving up his life in defence of his Country. The question of the re-apiointment of Mr. Francis Staples as Veterinary Insfector under the Dtiries \&c. Order, 1908, was brought under consideration es his last year of office had expired on 2nd. Instant, and on the motion of Councillor o'Brien seconded by Councillor Byrne it was

RESOLVED: - That Mr. Francis Staples be re-appointed as Veterinary Inspector to assist in administering the Dairies, Cowsheds, and M11kshops Order, 1908 for one year at a salary of $£ 15$.

Keferring to minutes of 5th July last, a report from the Public Lighting Committee was read. It dealt with a report of a special inspection of the public lights made between 17 th and 30 th June last. The fas Company were duly informed of the result of the Inspection and were invited to appoint a day wereuf on to meet the Committee in conference, but to the surprise of the Cammittee the Directors refused the reouest and asked that the appointment of a Gas Inspector should be made permanent, and threatened to cesse doing the work of lighting and extinguishing unless this concession were granted. On this point the question for the Council to decide was whether there wes any responsibility on them to keep a Gas Inspector, as it seemed strange that the Council should be under the necessity and expense of seeing that they got the full measure of what they were paying for. The Company did not vouchsafe to tender any excuse for neglecting the work they undertook to perform, although it wes beyond question thet the work had been neglected. The Committee considered they had exheusted every possible means to have the work done properly. They had failed owing to the unyielding attitude of the isas Directors. They tendered their resignation, and asket the Council to appoint a presh Committee to be invested with power to consider and report on the proper means of improving the e.tificial lighting of the tow.

The Camittee also reported that the Company had given notice that it would be
 other outlay apart from a probable increase in the price of gas. As regards this
prospective increase in price the Council hed to bear in mind that they were completely at the mercy of the Company in the matter, but the Committee drew attention to the fact that the increase of pressure required to operste the automatic lighting apparatus was almost entirely responsible for the breakage of mantles and globes. After protracted deliberation of the question, the three following resolutions were adopted.

Proposed by Councill or McGuire, seconded by Councillor Kesting.
Thet the Speciel Report of the Gas Inspector covering the period from 17 th to 30 th June last be placed at the disposal of the press reporters for publication. Proposed by Councillor MeGuire, seconded by Aldermen Hanton.

That Mr. N. J. Cosgrave be appointed to inspect the public lights for the six months commencing lst October next on the same terms and subject to the same conditions 8.5 to duties and remureretion as heretofore.

Proposed by Councillor Kirwan, soconded by Councillor Kurphy.
That the Public Lighting Comittee's resignation be not accepted, but that the Committee be re-sppointed for the purpose of putting the artificial lighting of the town on a satisfactory basis, and that the Committee be authorized to co-opt a substitute in the room of any member of the cammittee who might not chose to serve as a member thereof.

Regarding the proceedings of the Council on 3 lst March last, when a preliminary report on a proposal to widen Trimmers Lane was dealt with and a sum of $£ 400$, Including $£ 100$ cost of demolishing eleven houses, wes alloceted for the purpose, \& further Committee Report and communication from the Corporation Solicitor was brought under notice. From this it appesred that on the occasion of the Cormittee furni shing their first report they had only dealt with the principal interests that had to be consulted leaving sundry other unsscertained items untouched. These latter were now found to amount to $\mathcal{L} 89$ in round numbers, bringing the purchase price of the property to be ecquired up to $£ 389$.

The arrangement to purchase on the terms specified was the result of protracted negociations with landlords and various interests cancerned, and it included a free grant of five small houses in the charge of the Executors of the late William Hayes and the free grant of a railed-in plot fronting Selskar street from Mr. F. A. B. Turner. The Committee were of opinion that the opportunity should be selzed to purchase and commence the work of demolition, seeing that the probable cost of carrying out the improvement was set down at $\mathcal{L} 700$, as per minutes of 7 th September 1ast.

The question was given full consideration, whereupon there was put to the meeting a motion as proposed by Alderman Carty seconded by Councillor Makon es follows: That the arrangement come to for the purchase of property in Trimers Lane, as outlined above, be approved of and that the property be acquired on the terms mentioned.

A division was taken, whereupon ten members voted for this motion and five ageinst it. It was declared carried.

Councillor Keating introduced the subject of two politicel resolutions received from Dublin and Limerick Corporations. These Bodies had thought well to protest against the mode in which the Defence of the Realm Act was administered in Ireland, and had asked the Fexford Corporetion to follow suit. He considered that no notice should be taken of the action of Dublin and Ilmerick in this matter, as it was prompted by antagonism to the Irish Parliamentary party.

He proposed:
That we, the Corporation of Wexford, highly approve of the action taken by Mr. Joseph Devlin on behalf of the Irish Party in their endeavours to secure a fair triel for the Irlsh prisoners recently prosesuted ard canvicted under the Defence of the Realm Act.

Further that we have the fullest confidence in the Irish Party led by Mr. John Redmond in their efforts to secure full and ample justice to all sections of their fellow-countrymen, irrespective of Creed or Politics.

This motion wes seconded by Councillor McGuire, but before it was put the copy resolutions from Dublin and Limerick were read to ascertsin the exact import of them, whereupon Alderman Corish proposed that a resolution similar to the one from Limerich be adopted.

This motion was seconded by Councillor O'Brien.
Councillor Keating's motion was put to the meeting and was carried. Alderman Corish's motion wes put to the meeting and failed to be carried,

Tenders recelved in respect of printing and supplying all the books, forms and plecards required for one year were submitted to the me日ting. They were from three of the local printing works, namely, The People office, The Free press oppice, and Jonn mention co.O. Wexford Borough Council
required to perform the work was that their employes were to be paid not less than the mintmum standard wages paid in the town as per resolutions of the council of 3 rd. July 1899 and 2nd. Warch, 1903.

The meeting went over each of the items conteined in the three tenders seriatim and marked such items as proved to be the cherpest "accepted."

The question of determining the rents to be cherged for newly-erected dwellings at West Gate and Hill Street was brought u\&der consideration. To assist the meeting in arriving nt a proper conclusion the marnbers had been fumished with copies of the Pinancial statement sttached hereto. According to this it was seen that a rent of $8 / 7$ a weekk should be charged for the four houses at west fato and a rent of $5 / 7$ a week for the thirteen houses at Hill Street, if there was to be no demand made on the Rates.

In the course of a discussion attention was drawn to a letter written by Mr. J. J. Clancy $M$. P. in December last to the Press ant to a statement mate by the Chancellor of the Exchequer on the subject of loons for dwellings in Urban Areas.

The import of the Chancellor's statement was that under the Holis in\& (No 2) Act 1914 , the Treasury was prepared to advance ten per cent of the capital cost by way of free grent, that the interest was not to exceed 4 per cent. per annum, end thet the Loen could be repaid by way of an annuity in sixty yoars at $£ 4$. 3. 4 per cent.

On this subject the meeting decided to lefer fixing the rents pemding the recelpt of information from the Local Government Board as to whether the Comoration could reckon on obtaining the substantial concessions promised by the Chancellor.

A Committee Report on Dornestic scavenging wes read. The Cominttee pointed out that the system of domestic scavenging at present in operation in Wexfori affected only the congested portions of the town, as there were large areas where vegetaole gardehs were kept under cultivation, and where house refuse was utilized as a fertilizer. The work in connection with the system was done by the scavenging staff, according es the staff could be spared from their regular work. It consisted of emptying dustbins and ashpits. The system was of inestimable benefit from a sanitary point of view. Por year ended lst September last there had been no less than 1160 cartloads of the contents of ashpits carted away, while 184 dustbins had been emptied daily. The expense connected with the system for the year had been $£ 140$. In carrying out this work Fexford could boast of being an exception among the provinciel towns of Ireland of the same size end population as Mexford. The systam was being availet of to a greater extent dey after day, and the Comittee did not feel called upon to recommend any further development of it. The amptying of ashpits was done free of charge in cases where the valuation of premises was $\delta 3$ ard under. In cases over this valuation a. charge of $1 /-$ for each cartload of refuse taken away was made. A charge of $5 /-$ per ennum was mnde on householders keeping dustbins. The Committee recomended thet the charge for emptying dustbins should be increased from $5 /-$ to $10 /-$ a year per dustbin, and the charge for emptying ashpits be increased to $1 / 6$ per cartload.

The meting discussed the statement, especially those items which were open to argument. A long discussion took place, but it wound up in no revision being made in the figures. However Councillor McGuire proposed that the thirtean houses at Hill Street should be let at $3 / 9$ per week each inolusive of Rates, as there was no doubt that the accommodetion afforded by the houses muld not comand a higher rent from the working cless of people.

But Alderman Corish grooosed thet the rents be fired at $3 / 6$ each per week, as he considered this rent was as much as working men couli be celled or to pay for this class of house.

Councillor Martin seconded this amendment, whihh was put to the meeting and failed to be carried as only 4 voted for and 12 voted against it.

Councillor MoGuire's motion was then put to the meeting and was carried, 13 voting for and only 4 against.

On the mesting cong to the question of determining the rents of the four better-
class houses at westgate, Councirar BaOnO fosed that the rents be pixed at $7 /-$
per week per house, and in addition that the tenants be requirad too pay all rates except Public Water Rato.

This motion was seconded by Councillor Coffey and adopted unanimously.
It was ordered. Thet in the case of the thirteen houses at Hill Street the gateways between the yards and the open space at the rere be provided with gates.

With reference to minutes of 4 th Ultimo, it wes announced that tenders were invited in respect of demolishing houses at Trimmers lane and erecting a wall, but only one tender hed beon received. This wes from Kr. John Browne. Ha tenderat for demolishing the houses only in condideretion of being paid \&l27. 0. 0.

The tender was not aceeted, but Councillor Kurphy proposed that the houses should be taken down by the Town Surveyor as soon as the staff of workmen under him ware available.

This motion was seconded by Alderman Carty, but Aldermen Corish proposed as an amemdent that the work be deferred to the beginning of the next financial jear as the emount already spent in connection with the inprovement of frimers Lene had substantially exceeded the sum allocated for the purpose. This motion was seconded by Counclllor Kirwan.

The amendment was put to the meeting whereupon five members voted for and ten
ageinst it.
It was declared lost.
The motion was then put to the meeting and was carriad, nine voting for and six sgainst it.

A letter from the Gas Campany under date of llth Ultimo was read. It contained intimation thet the price of ges had been increased by twopence per 1000 cubic Peet and that the price to be charged for the public lamps fron lst october would be increased from £3. 0.9 to £3. 8. 6 per lamp per ennum.

As the increase meant an additionel outlay of a sum equiveleat to a te te of one perny in the Pound, the Mnance and Works Dominittee had dealt wd th the matter of economising, and pointed out where public lights might be ifspensed with, and on the motion of Councillor Byrne seconded by councillor Murphy, the recomendation of the Conmittee was adopted.

A printed circular from the Association of Municipal Authortties was read. The Association drew attention to the desirability of Municipaliti-s forming Local Comittees for the purpose of holding Food ant Child Welfare Exhibitions. It mppeared that according to official figures out of every 1000 children born in large Irish towns 132 died before reaching the age of one year, and it wes necessery that something should be done to check the excessive rete of ineant mortality, end It wes decided to ask Dr. Pierse, Reşlstzer of Births, $\therefore c$., to state if the infant mortality in Wexford District could be deeneत to be excessive.

Attention was drawn to the loss and Inconvenience carised to the traders of Wexpord by the eotion of the Govermment in wequisitiontng the stermshts mpexport coestm which was tha only (C): Nexford Boroughecouncilwexpord coast" was specially built for the Nexford trade, and this was a point of great importance,
and it appeared that the Owners of her, Messrs Powell, Bacon \& Hough \& Co. of Liverpool, were willing to put her on the Station again if she were restored to them This Campany, it appeared, were also willing to hire another ship, but the hiring of a ship would involve a prohibitive increase in the freightage, and it was decided to ask the parliamentary Representative for the Division and Mr. Redand M. P. to intercede with the Adniralty with the object of having the wexford Coeat" returned to the Owners.

By reason of e recent visit to Wexford of Mr. Poulter, e Ropresentative of the Department of Recruiting for Ireland, the Council were invited to give on expression * of opinion on the objects of the Depertment, nomely that of inducing men to foin the smy in the present unparalleled crisis.

The mayor submitted for adoption motion which he duly proposed in the following terms.

Thet we, the Wexforl Corporation, realising the supreme importance of recruiting at the present time, are willing to do all in our power to further the efforts of the Depertment of Recruiting for Ireland. Further we plece on record the opinion thet if the Country is to be saved from on overwhelming burden of taxaifon it is essential that further sacrifices should be made so that the War may be brought to a. speedy and successful conclusion.

This motion, wich was seconded by Councillor McGuire, geve rise to a long discussion which ended in the actoption of the resolution, ell the members presert voting in favour of it except Alderinan Corish, and Councillors D'Brian, Martin, and Murpliy.

A letter was read from the Secratary of the Harbour Board notifying that that Boerd had decided to discontinue contributing towards the cost of nine of the public lamps in the Main Street. The lamps in question were heretopore paid for in equal shares by the Corporation and the Horbour Bowi for the reason that, the lights were placed in such a position that they sorv=d the purpose of lighting the Hain Street and also the nine streets leading from the main street to the queys. The Harbour Commissioners, in the exeroise of their control over the stree ts leading to the quays, considered timt these lights might be dispensed with, so far as they were concemed. It was for the Corporation then to determine whether the lomps were essential to the effectent lighting of the Main Street.

This matter was one which had been under the consideration of the pinunce end Works domittee, and this Comaittee, after having obtained advice on the point from the Corporation Solicitor, had recommended that the lamps be retained at the ente expense of the Corporation.

The recomendation was adoptad on the motion of Aldemm Cortsh, seconded by

The births for the same period totalled 311, showing that so far as Wexford Urban District was concorned the mortality of children under the ame of yoar wasabout half whet wes asserted to be the death rate in stich cases in the large Irish Towns.

This being so, it was decifed to refar the mattor to the Wexpord Urban Brancla of the Women's National Health Association to take steps to further the holding, locally, of a Food and Child Welfer Exhibition if they thought well to do so.

An application from Mr. Goorge W. Taylor House Agent for Mr. Gennon, to be pail \&5 being a helf year's rent out of tho property aquired from kr. Garion at Westgste was reac. Special attention was drewn to this claim for the reason thet Mr. Ganmon was not tife Head Lanlord of tho property, and in arranging for the purchase of $k r$. And thet a copy of this resolution be sent to the Lords of the Admiralty, the Army Council, and all Corporations in Ireland.
