C. Orons for Building the Boundary Wall at the New Cemetery and enclosing form of Bond and Contract.

A letter dated 21st June 1850. No 34532. requesting that as Thomas Nolan collector was dead a successor would be appointed in the usual way and a Bond entered into to complete the collection on Templeshambo.

Orders. That advertisements issuing for a collector for Templeshambo to be considered on this day fortnight.

A letter dated 22nd June 1850. 34532. in reference to the request of the Guardians to assist Elizabeth Kelly to Emigrate to Canada and requesting to know to what Electoral Division she was chargeable.

Orders. That on considering she would not now be in time to go out with the party whose emigration has been sanctioned the Board do not think it desirable to send her this year.

A letter dated 26th June 1850. No 34985. enclosing Quoirs to be answered by the person who may be appointed Master of the Workhouse on the 29th Inst.

A letter dated 28th June 1850. No 31695. transmitting a form of consent to be signed by a Majority of the Guardians for the expenditure of the amount proposed for erecting the North Wing at the Workhouse pursuant to the 36th section 1 & 2nd vic Cap 36.

Orders. That the Clerk obtain the signatures of seven to the Commissioners, and that the consent be for £100. over the Tender to provide for an increase in the length of the main Building of Male School.

A letter dated 28th June 1850. No 36153. in reference to the desire expressed by the Guardians to have the new Electoral Divisions of the Union declared by the Commisrs, and that in a few weeks it is expected the Commissioners will issue such Order.

Orders. That it would be desirable the Order take effect from and after ^{the} 29th Sept. next the usual time of Audit.

Orders. That as the Agriculturist prefers the numeral figures to the Roman for Branding the Tools, a set be procured accordingly at 7 each number, and the former Order for the Roman letter which has not been used be cancelled.

The Clerk reported that the June Premium would be payable by this day week on the Original Policy for £600. and that the Board had two other policies of different date in existence.

Orders. That if the Agent will make an equitable adjustment of the Policies so as to make them all payable together he be requested to write to the directors of the sum for their sanction and payment will be made on next Saturday.

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The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his report thereon, as follows (this, on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year):—

Mr Cookman Solicitor represented to the Board on the part of Mr Martin Doyle collector, that he has been summoned to the Petty Sessions Court of Clonroche by Richd Lambert for illegally driving sheep to the Enniscorthy pound a distance of six miles instead of Clonroche a distance of about two miles from the place of seizure, and requested the Board to make an Order for the protection and assistance of the collector.

Ordered. That the Clerk send to Mr Sweetman whose signature as a Magistrate is to the Summons, a copy of the Order made by the Board on the 1st Inst. after a full enquiry into Lambert's Complaint, viz. — That considering the whole circumstances the Board cannot interfere with the collector particularly as the allegation of collusion with Shaw has not been proved — and further that as Doyle cannot on Monday next have the benefit of Attorney by reason of being seised, it would be reasonable a postponement take place to the next Petty Sessions Court day to give him an opportunity of legal assistance.

Mr Farmer brought under the notice of the Board that a necessity existed for an Assistant Schoolmaster who would assist the Protestant Chaplain in the religious instruction of the children of that persuasion and upon Consideration gave notice that on this day fortnight he will move that an Assistant Schoolmaster be advertised for qualified for the above object and that the Clerk give notice to the Guardians to that effect.

Agreeably to advertisement for Master at a salary of £60 p. ann. a Schoolmaster at £26 p. ann. and an Assistant Schoolmistress at a salary of £12 p. ann. The Board considered Tenders. There was but one for the situation of Master from George Maguire the acting Master, upon

Seconded by Mr Farmer and Unanimously Resolved. That George Maguire be elected Master of the Workhouse on the terms proposed.

The following Tenders for Schoolmasters were considered. John Jordan being examined appeared to know reading, writing, Arithmetic, English Grammar, &c. well. but on investigation it was ascertained he had been guilty of some disorderly conduct some time ago and was in Jail for same — he was directed to withdraw his Tender.

Patrik Farrell of Ballychristal School, is under the National Board, read and parses correctly, writing but muddled, appeared sickly and not a person such as advertised for.

Thomas Maguire did not appear.

Thomas Regan was well and wrote a fair hand but knew nothing of Grammar or the National System of Education, he withdrew.

Patrik Callaghan of the Ballinadaggin National School, being examined was found in every respect a desirable person, would not take less than £30 p. ann.

William Murphy of Ouncernick National School in this County, examined — knew reading, writing, Grammar and Arithmetic satisfactorily, had a good character from the Rev. P. Callan of that Parish where he lived the last six years.

The Board again called in P. Callaghan and offered £20 but he required some hours of the day to teach his own children, has eight in family, but the Board could not consent unless his whole time be devoted to the duties of the situation.

Ultimately the Candidates were reduced to two. Patrik Farrell & William Murphy the Chairman took votes — Thirteen voted for William Murphy and seven voted for P. Farrell and declares William Murphy duly elected. He was called in and his election being announced to him requested a week to go home to settle his affairs to which the Board agreed, and that he shall produce testimonials from the Inspector of National Schools of his District.

Candidates for Assistant were read and candidates called up and examined.

Maria O'Keefe of the Celano National School, did not appear.

Mary Mills of Rathdrum, did not appear.

Mary McDonnell read, parsed and wrote correctly.

Had good Character, but appeared to have no experience.

Catharine Whinton of Bree, has good Character, and a fair Knowledge of the National System of Education.

Mary Ann O'Brien of Bree, attended the Bree National School also, not so experienced as desirable.

Bridget Stapleton sister to the present Schoolmistress, and acting with her for some time being examiner. Now reading, writing English Grammar, and Geography, had excellent Character.

The Chairman took votes when there appeared one vote for Miss McDonnell, one vote for Miss O'Brien, and Thirteen votes for Miss B. Stapleton upon which he declared the latter to be duly elected. She was called up and desired to continue to assist the Schoolmistress, until sanctioned by the Commissioners.

A letter from Captain R. Owen Marlfield Gorey was read in respect of Rats claimed from him as due on the lands of Blonmore requesting the Board to take no steps until he could be heard at the Board after the session.

Ordered, That the Clerk shall write to Captain Owen that the matter has been fully considered and the Rats must be paid.

The Chairman then signed the Cheques and Orders and the Board adjourned to Wednesday the 3rd July 1850.

Pursuant to notice the Board considered the changeability of Eliza Douglas and Patrick Hackett, and after considerable discussion they were ordered to be altered from Ballyhustons Division to the Union at Large.

Mr J. Howell gave notice that he will on this day fortnight move that Mary Reeves and family now charged to Castle Blis be altered to the Union at Large.

The Chairman read a letter from Mr Bates the Contractor for the Female School requesting to know the decision of the Board if they wanted any alteration in the Commission plan as to the Boundary Wall to the yard and the position

of the prison as if directions were not given he would proceed with the plan as originally laid down. The Chairman stated that he had several communications with members of the Board on the subject and had also consulted the Master and Schoolmistress, in their opinion the school yard would be of sufficient size leaving the present Boundary Wall. The Master also stated that the Building erected for the Strain House with Infirmary Ward over it was ~~very~~ inconveniently placed for classification as it gave no immediate access to the female side of the House but was admirably placed for a roomy room and that if the passage between the main Building and the Boundary Wall at the female side was shadded, it would afford sufficient room for the childrens prison and a most excellent Strain House capable of Division with a gate into the womens yard, he also remarked that his attention had been drawn to some opening in the end wall of the Main Building at that side which indicated a settlement and that the Clerk of Works considered a shed with

and Division Wall would form a valuable Buttrif to it.

The Chairman considered that the New School Room would be more cheerful and healthy by having the Boundary Wall as at present and allowing the entire angle to stand in the grounds and that by allowing the gate way to the side Wall of the womens yard to admit the strain a most objectionable passage would be got rid of and that he had remarked in a letter writ to the Wexford Workhouse that the passage into the female yard was never used. The two small and insufficient windows to the Workroom might without any danger be transferred to the School yard.

Mr Bates the Contractor having been called up the above arrangement was explained to him and he was required to examine the place and report the expense of carrying out this alteration from the present plan and to ascertain if the additional windows could be put to the Womens Workroom with perfect security to the Building.

Mr Bates having made an examination stated that the window from the School yard into the Workroom might be increased to the width of 7 feet by the introduction of a stone Mullion 2 feet by 1 foot with the centre of the open chamfer on both sides and that the present windows and sashments in the side wall would be

required on the other hand. He apprehended no difficulty or danger in doing it. That he considered the mason work required under the proposed arrangement (the end and division walls of the shed being all 9 feet thick) would be about the same as in the new range wall.

That the cost of the privy remains as before and that the roofing and slating the passage of 53 feet + 11 feet in the char with the alteration of the Workroom window, and changing the Gate to side wall of the female yard and putting an arched door way and Gate 5 feet wide by 7 feet high and two doors 4+7 in the division wall and from the land to the main Street House, with one run one down pipe sufficient for the size of the Room would require a sum of £35 for which sum he would undertake to do it.

Ordered with the sanction of the Committee that Mr Bates be directed to proceed with the plans as now proposed, also as the Workroom of the new wing is likely to be used for an Infant School it is desirable that the walls should be plastered and the ceiling of it & the passage be made uniform with the Schoolroom itself also the walls back of stair case and ceiling should be rendered and plastered and also run down Boards uniform with Schoolroom, which Mr Bates proposed to do for the sum of £13.

The Medical Officer reported that having been called
in to explain how it should occur that for some weeks
the expense per head for a patient in the Workhouse Infirmary
should exceed that in the Fever Hospital, he had to remark
that the class of diseases being so very different a comparison
be properly made. In the Infirmary the expense can vary
but little and is now lower than it has ever been since
the opening of the Workhouse — He stated also that the
allowance to the Attendants on the sick is included in the
weekly charge per head and he believed was not so in
the Fever Hospital. That he could diminish the present
expense a halfpenny or so but if he did — many who are
recovering from illness would take a fortnight perhaps
instead of eight or nine days. Making it evident that even
a little better treatment is sure to diminish the numbers
in Hospital once they become convalescent, Relapses are less
frequent and an ultimate decrease in numbers & expense

The Health of the House is improving and that of the

Templeham Auxiliary Ward likewise.

Coats were returned as ill to him about the 20th June and having admitted them enquired had they eaten anything wrong — which they denied, about the 22nd, Coats laboured under strong symptoms of Typhoid and was sent to Hospital when he has since died. This now discloses that both had continued to enter a store adjoining the Duffry Gate Ward in which some Indian Meal had been mixed with Rapeseed and both eat a portion of it. The Master stated that he has gone to Mr. Parlow the owner of the Store — that he (Mr. P.) had removed the Indian Meal and that the boys must have eaten at night by some trap door unknown.

That he had the Secrecy leading from the Cemetery at rear of the Hospital opened and inspected by the Clerk of Works who was of opinion it will be necessary to have a portion of same cemented — besides a part of the Cemetery to prevent nuisances passing through the rubble masonry — there would be a Cart of Cement required for same — That having called on Miss Leary to furnish an account of the Straw Matting made at Templeham and its price — her return is 184 yards — Value £8.7.3.

That there has been received the sum of — 2.15.5 — Leaving a balance due by the purchasers Nov. — 5.11.10 — That she had since delivered to Mrs. McDonnell 83 1/2 lbs of Yarns Value £0.8.9 — and in addition 6th above she had made 55 3/4 lbs used in the Matting in the Board Room — That John Leary and James Maher — two able bodied adult boys, were admitted on Wednesday

and when about to be dropped refused to leave the House saying, that they had but just returned from Goal where they had been sent some time months ago and requested to be discharged rather than leave the clog shaft, and used threatening language going away.

That the sales of Cabbage plants for the last produce to 1.5.12 — That he had called on David Connors to view the Roof of the Kitchen and the Eve shafts — who reported the Nails in the roof fastenings the slates to be rotten and that they required to be reset and fastened on with Copper nails in consequence of the Steam continually in the Kitchen — That it was reported two boys coats & Keating the former now dead — had eaten Indian Meal which had been mixed with poison for rats on a loft of Mr. Parlow adjoining the Duffry Gate Ward, that on enquiring of Mr. Parlow he admitted such to have been on his loft unfortunately but that the boys had forced their way through a trap door which had been at the time unlocked.

Ordered, That the Clerk of Works be directed to do the Secrecy and Cemetery in Roman Cement — David Connors being examined agreed to strip and reslate the Kitchen at 3/4 per square. Copper nails to be supplied by the Board and to be ordered from Mr. Sherwood of Dublin. That whilst the Kitchen is flooring with granite the slating to be done and the Master allowed to substitute Bread for the paupers instead of Stewage.
