The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his report thereon, as follows (this, on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year):-

A Letter dated 19th August 1850 No 45179, in reference to a discrepancy of his pounds existing between the Clerk's return of the Balances due on the Electoral Divisions of the Union and the Sums according to the "Final Notice",

Ordered, The Clerk inform the Board he had written to the Commissioners on the subject and that when a corrected statement of the Sums due comes down the account shall be adjusted

Ordinary Business

The question of out-door Relief was considered and after much discussion whether there should be a total Cessation of permanent out-door Relief - sufficient accommodation being now in the Workhouse - the Chairman put it to the Meeting and took votes when there appeared 11 for total Cessation and 9 for partial out-door Relief - upon which the Chairman declared total Cessation carried and directed the Relief Officers accordingly.

The Board considered the reduction of the number of Relieving Officers from seven to five as allowed by the Commissioners and agreed to reduce the Salaries for each of the five Districts to £30 per Ann. The Relief Officers were called up and the arrangements announced to them to which they agreed.

Andrew Hainish being duly proposed and seconded for No 1 District was unanimously selected
Lenna O'Brien

William Fitzpatrick and W J Langford were both duly put in nomination for No 3 District and upon the Chairman taking votes it appeared 12 voted for Mr Fitzpatrick and 8 votes for Mr Langford.

The Chairman declared Mr Fitzpatrick the duly elected, upon which the Minority objected to Mr Fitzpatrick as farming 74 acres of land whilst Mr Langford had none to attend to - the Majority at the same time urging that if that fact was sufficient to disqualify Mr Fitzpatrick it would hold equally as against members of the Staff of Relieving Officers they being Farmers

John Doyle and Grant Murphy were both duly put in nomination for No 4 District, the Chairman took votes - when it appeared Mr Murphy had 11 and Mr Doyle 8 - upon which he declared Mr Murphy duly elected, the Minority objecting that Mr Murphy did not reside in the District, Mr Murphy stated he had a small farm from his brother in Kiltan and would go reside there,

William Brunker being duly nominated for No 5 District was unanimously chosen.

Notice was read from Rev Rob Barry of Kilmashall complaining out-door Relief was not given to a poor man in his Parish

Ordered that the Relieving Officer inform Rev Mr Barry that the Poor Man must come into the Workhouse all permanent out-door Relief

Ordered. That unless the Collector make a satisfactory progress within 14 days — their Books shall be taken from them without further notice and their names be proceeded against for any extra expenses which may be incurred in the Collection of the same by other Collectors to be then appointed.

A Letter was read from the Clerk of the Goryy Union stating that seven inmates in the Workhouse there from the Townland of Willmuckridge lately separated from that Union.

Ordered — that Mr Burke Relief Officer go to Goryy — take charge of them and bring them to the Workhouse here ^{upon} ascertaining they were really from Willmuckridge.

The Valuator attended and represented that in Schedule B of the sealed Order re-constructing the Electoral Divisions of the Union — is comprised numerous instances of the same Townlands in the same Division twice named and altho a portion of such Townlands lay in two Parishes — they are the property of one person — that it would be very expedient if his Valuation can be made up with the whole of a Townland together — where such is an individual Property and in the same Electoral Division.

Ordered. That the Valuator make up his Books as stated to be expedient unless Com-
-manded by the Commissioners.

A Note was read from Edward Lawlor of Newtown Barry Butcher declining to furnish any further supply of Meat to the Fever Hospital there, unless at 5 p lb altho his late Tender was at the rate of 4 p lb and now refused to perfect his Bond.

Ordered — that fresh Advertisements issue for Tenders for Meat for the Newtown Barry Hospital to be considered on the 5th September next.

The Chairman then signed the Order and Clerks after which the Board adjourned to Thursday the 29th August 1850.

That 2 Infants died offing away for want of Mothers Care, and one of old age. The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:—

The Master Reported. That he attended the Petty Sessions on the 2nd inst for the purpose of prosecuting two cases of desertion. that the punishment awarded in both cases was three month imprisonment. — That if it be the intention of the Board to convert the cottage wards into a Cow House it will be necessary to have a cross wall built, and to provide for removal of the paupers clothing now there suggested that they may be put into the rear house, and the Old women sent down to Guttle St Wars. — that the Contractor for the steps to the Dormitory out of the Infirmary yard had not yet begun to put them up.

Orders. That the Master give notice to Rigby that if he do not commence the Contract immediately it shall be rescinded.

Mr Wallace brought under the consideration of the Board the excessive value placed on Curraduff in the year 1848. on which he had remonstrated the Commission^{rs} with the sanction of the Board in August 1849. and which the Commission^{rs} by their letter of the 14th Sept. 1849. No 56817. gave power to the Board to alter on the representation of the Revisor.

Ordered. That the sum of £1.10.0 be substituted for the sum of £15.12.0 in the list of arrears in No. 829. Impleshanku Electoral Division and that the Collector be directed to settle accordingly. Also that the arrears on the property No. 860. which had been previously divided and notice of same given — between the

Reo^r. J. James and Mr Wallace and which now stands on the Rate Book No 559a and 860. — to be divided and receive from the parties respectively.

The Clerk drew under the notice of the Board that in the Treasurers account the sum of £85. appeared to be lodged to the credit of Ballyhoque by Mr King on the part of the late Collector J. Kelly that as that Division had lost by Kelly only £65. the entry required alteration by placing £20 of the lodgement to the credit of the Union at large for costs incurred. That he had waited on the Manager of the Bank who would not alter the entry in the manner he required.

Ordered. That to regulate the entries properly in the Treasurers account, a cheque be drawn for £85. to be placed against Ballyhoque — and then credit Ballyhoque with £65. and Union at large with £20. Mr Donovan undertaking to go to the Bank with the Clerk and have it done.

Mr Whitty brought before the Board a report he hears that clothes the property of persons not belonging to the Workhouse had been habitually washed in the Laundry of the House the last 12 Months and that Mrs Murphy now Cook and formerly in the Laundry can give information of the facts. The Board decided on calling on her for examination.

Ellen Murphy being examined stated, has been from time to time in the House since Nov: 1847. has been here for the last 15 months. has been Cook since Nov: 49. was at Laundry from May to Nov: 49. her chief employment was to count the clothes in and out and see them right. The Officers clothes has no ~~house~~ ^{house} mark. saw some white linen Coats washed which she knew did not belong to the Master or any Officer. also Childrens clothes and shirts which she was told belongs to William Martin the late Matrons brother in law. never reported it to the present Master. — told Mr McCormick on the occasion of some dispute about the washing some suit of clothes which she was allowed — that she has as good a right to have her things washed as other persons not belonging to the Workhouse. Alice Redmond told her that the week before the late Matrons death there were five of Martins shirts and two of Mrs Farrells Childrens frocks and two little white spencers in the wash — the first time she remanded them she enquired about the strange things. this was about the Commence-ment of Harvest 1849. spoke then to James Cloke — she washed for Nurse Pilkington, Miss Staple-ton and the late Schoolmaster, never for any other Officer. Mrs Shan was over her in the Laundry and she thinks must have taken these things into it.

Next Meeting of the Guardians to be held on _____ the _____ day of _____ 18 _____

James Cloke called in and examined, has been from time to time in the House the past four years. came in last 5th September 1849. from the service of William Martin, after had conversations with Ellen Murphy, spoke to her about strange things being washed in the Laundry. knew them to be William Martins. Mrs Martin, and Mary Anne O'Connell. the last time she saw them was when the late Matron was sick. saw some Childrens clothes frocks and white overalls — in general there was some clothing of either of them. knew Mrs Martins things from Mr Whelan by the mate. none of the things at William Martins except his shirts — were washed these shirts and saw them so marked in the Workhouse Laundry — is ready to swear to the truth of what she has said — when she lives at Martins none of the clothes were washed out of the House, — was not in the Laundry for about a month after she came into the House, she knew of clothes being washed belonging to Mrs Martin before she went to live with her.

Alice Redmond called up and examined, has been four or five years in the House. came last into the House before Christmas 1849. Has been generally in Laundry. when in the House was employes to wash the Officers clothes — between 2 + 3 months ago washed 5 shirts of William Martin. she received them in the presence of the Matron from James Cloke — also washed 2 Petticoats at same time and every week about that time receives things to wash amongst Mrs Whelan which she believed were not her. the childrens things

The Knees were not here, - when she gave up the shirts to the Matron she told her they were so well done she would get her a little Tea and Sugar? she never did receive any Tea and Sugar. They could not have been the Master or Assistant Masters or Porters shirts because she always got theirs from Mary Sheill and Mrs Bryan the servants of the Master and Porter, - spoke of this to Ellen Murphy - never spoke of it to any Officer of the House,

Honora Shaw called up and examined, has been in the House for more than 2 years - has been in Laundry for 12 or 14 months up to Mrs Whelan's illness, never washed for the Officers except for about 3 weeks in the summer of 49. then saw 2 or 3 little frocks which Mrs Whelan has made for Mrs Barrett's children as she told her, never knew any other strange clothes to be washed. knew of a scold between Ellen Murphy and Mrs Whelan when she heard that Ellen Murphy being accused of taking some soap told Mrs Whelan she had used more of the Union soap than she ever did.

Michael Durlong Porter was called and examined, made a search for clothes at one time in consequence of summons he heard - and never saw any thing leaving the House except one small frock and a couple of shirts (which seems to have been recently made and washed) with a messenger of the Matron. Has been directed by the present Matron to examine for any clothes going in or out after being washed but has not found any.

is willing to allow the Clerk £120. per ann. for the discharge of all the duties connected with the administration of the Poor Laws - that of Returning Officers to be included and to allow him (for this year only) for the preparation of the 33 rate and Collecting Books &c. - in consequence of that duty having to be paid for by him to Assistants out of his present salary and to be no precedent in their future preparation.

Ordinary Business.

A letter was read from Dr. Sears of the Culcut Dispensary in which he states that as the Temporary Fever Hospital act is now expired, he wishes to propose to discharge the duties of the Fever Hospital in connection with those of the Dispensary at a lower than is at present paid by the Union of Gony and Limerick jointly, at the same time he holds out as an additional inducement the allegation that on the nomination of Doctor Cartan to the Culcut Fever Hospital, the Board of Guardians has in consequence been charged a sum of £20. rent by the subscribers to the Dispensary for the accommodation of the Hospital attached to the Dispensary, which rent he Doctor Sears now undertakes shall cease if the Board will make use of his services.

Resolved. That the management of Dr. Cartan in the Culcut Fever Hospital has been most highly creditable to his talents and has given great satisfaction to the Board and to the Ratepayers amongst whom his general practice has greatly increased

and under the circumstances the Board would not be justified in superseding him. That this Board cannot believe the allegation that the subscribers to the Dispensary had changed the rent (£100) on account of Doctor Cartan having been appointed to the Temporary Fever Hospital as Dr. Leard's salary of £80. had been provided independently by subscribers and Grand Jury presentments.

That the Clerk writes to the Treasurer of the Dispensary respectfully to know if Doctor Leard's allegation be correct and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Grand Jury of Guardians.

Mary Anne O'Connell appears before the Board to offer an explanation about the washed clothing having been done in the workhouse during the life time of her sister the late Matron, and stated that she never got any article of clothing belonging to herself or family washed in the workhouse with the exception of some little frocks which her sister may have washed five or six times and she believes also alters. during the time she herself assisted her sister during her illness she never had any articles washed in the workhouse nor did she hear or know of any such. she has a conversation with Mr Martin her sister also on the subject this morning and hears from her that about March last a boy named John Mack an apprentice of William Martin was going to America and in making up linen for him the late Matron offers to have some shirts mended and made up for him and a shirt of William Martin's was sent up as a pattern but no article of William Martin or of his wife or family was ever washed in the workhouse laundry. Mr Martin was

more intimate with her sister the Matron than she had been and told her that she often lent Petticoats and other articles of clothing to her which would account for their having been seen with her.

Mr O'Connell afterwards requested to know might she go into charge and on reference to the Minutes of the Board the day of her election the Chairman directed the Master to inform her not until the Commissioners sanction came down.

Moved by Mr Howlin.

Seconded by Mr Wallace and Resolved.

That the Commissioners be requested to order an Election of Guardians for the new Electoral Division of the Union before a New Rate be struck.

A Communication was read from A. C. Buchanan Emigration Agent at Quebec announcing the safe arrival there of the Emigrants sent out last July and the distribution amongst them of the sum of money sent to him for that purpose by the Board.

Mr Lane represented to the Board that a man of the name of Howlin who was sentenced by the Bench of Magistrates to three months imprisonment for desertion of his wife, is now in a very delicate state of health and that his wife is not a person of good character and some other matters connected with his desertion.

Orders. That Mr Lane be requested to represent to his brother Magistrate that the Board have no objection under the circumstances that the full term of the sentence should be carried out and that they have the concurrence of the Board in recommending

any mitigation they may think proper.

Orders. That the Master and Clerk of the Workhouse visit the Wexford Workhouse with the view of seeing the internal arrangements for storage,

The Chairman then signed the orders and cheques and the Board adjourned to Thursday the 26th Sept. 1850.
