Mr Whelan appears before the Board and in reply to the question of arbitration respecting the Dugan Ward stated he would take a year's rent ending next August. he was informed that the Board considered he was treating them badly he having promised at the time of letting the store to take it off their hands whenever they did not require it, and they would not therefore consent to his proposition but left him to his own remedy he being a Guardian at the time he let it to the Board.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year).

Mr Pounder moved the consideration of the notice given on the 6th inst for increasing the salary of Mr Andrew Henrick Relieving Officer from £30. to £40 p Ann in consequence of the necessity he has to support a horse - He has to attend to four rural divisions besides the Division of Emmerthy embracing a population of 17000. to which an amendment was proposed by Mr Whitty that the question be postponed until the new Board meets with a request that they take into consideration the raising of all the Relieving Officers salaries each having to keep a horse to enable them to perform their duties efficiently.

A poll being demanded by Lordship took order when there appeared for Mr Pounder, Mr. Egan and for Mr Whitty, amendment three.

Resolved. That the salary of Mr Andrew Henrick be in future £40 p Ann instead of £30.

On the motion of Mr Whitty it was Ordered. That the Relieving Officers make out a return by this day fortnight showing the number of paupers brought before the Boards by each and the Townlands ~~and~~ they came from during the last six months.

Mr Rowe gave notice of his intention to move on the 31st April next the subject of emigrating the paupers in the Workhouse chargeable on Kildare Electoral Division.

The Chairman then signed the Orders and Adjourned after which the Board adjourned to Thursday the 27th March 1857.

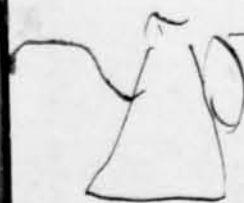

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

That having visited the House and examined into the state of the clothing of the inmates found the adult classes sufficiently clothed. In making enquiry of the adult males if they had any complaint to make of the quantity of clothing afforded to them, they expressed themselves quite satisfied with what they were provided, excepting one man, Matthew McLean from the Harrow Division who said he would like to have an additional waistcoat as he had a cold for which we referred him to the Doctor. We found that the clothes coming to the Laundry on Thursday have to remain until the following Monday exposed to the Weather in an open yard. We recommend that a shed be thrown up to protect such clothing, the cost of which should be very trifling. found the Junior class of Boys not clothed so warmly as the adults they (the Junior class) not having waistcoats and their Banagon Jackets are not so warm as those of Sincy Woodsey worn by the adults. The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

colds and coughs have been of more frequent occurrence in this class. We recommend that the Junior class be supplied with waistcoats and Jackets of Sincy Woodsey next Winter. We found on examination of statistics furnished by the Master, that the Health of the House bears a favourable comparison with the five weeks ending the 12th April last year we found the milk supplied by one of the Contractors of a decidedly inferior quality. The general state of the House orderly, visited the auxiliary Workhouse in Templeshannon found the rain coming thro the roof in places. the boys rooms unwashed for three weeks and five are sometimes put in the one bed, some of which are greatly in want of fresh straw.

The Infirm Women were sent out without proper arrangements or cleansing of the House being made for their reception which caused unavoidable confusion. we recommend that the practice of sweeping the refuse or waste straw thro a hole in the floor of the boys dormitory be discontinued as the accumulation of dirty straw underneath is unsanitary and improper.

straw in them is literally in dust — the boys are placed under the care of a padre which is not right, as the Schoolmaster or some officer of the Workhouse should have charge of them. The lower ward occupied by the infirm women was in an equally filthy state — old clothes provisions — and other articles in the beds, the young girl placed over their Ward is quite unfit for the Office. Blame is attributable to the Master for not having as he was bound to do daily or occasionally visited this auxiliary and allowing it to get into the shameful state in which it was on yesterday.

Ordered, That the Board hear with great regret the report of Mr. Burke as to the condition of the auxiliary House in Templebarrow. That they reprimanded the master in the strongest terms for his neglect of duty which however they hope from his good conduct generally will not be the case in future and direct that the House be immediately put in order and the members of Visiting Committee are requested to see it be done. That as the Commissioners will not sanction the appointment of the Wardmistress Margaret Peggion now at that auxiliary — Advertisements issue for an assistant matron at £10 a year and Rations and that the Schoolmaster who has been much to blame for not having called the master's attention to the want of straw in the Beds be directed in future to sleep in the auxiliary House.

Mr. Doran in the absence of Mr. St. Keating who was reported to be ill brought forward the motion of which notice had been given by Mr. Keating to the effect that no advance be made in the salaries of the Relieving Officers namely £30 which had been fixed in August last. And after considerable discussion an amendment was proposed by Mr. Parada viz.

That in as much as the increase of salary from £30 to £40, to Mr. Henrick Relieving Officer for Ennisceathy was made by this Board and sanctioned by the Poor Law Commissioners in the 26th Act in consequence of his being obliged to keep a horse to enable him to perform his duties and considering that he has five Electoral Divisions with a population of 17000, and that the Returns for the last six months as under show he has to attend to a number of applications greatly exceeding any other Relieving Officer — We still adhere to the opinion that £40. p. ann is only a fair remuneration for his services. Ordered, That a Committee consisting of Messrs. P. Drom and J. Keating be appointed to procure outfit for Bridget Dempsey and 1 child agreed by the Board to be sent out to Quebec, that the money agreed upon to be lodged by her late landlord has been lodged in the 5th April last.

Ordered, That costs incurred by collectors with the Treasurer without orders of the Board be charged to their respective accounts.

Ordered, That advertisements issue for tenders for a shed in Landry yard against the wall opposite the door under which to hang the paupers clothes & after ^{any} washing. Tenders to specify materials and Quantity.

The Chairman then signed the orders and the Board adjourned to Thursday the 8th May 1851.
