Notices of Marriage between the parties hereunder named having been received from the District Registrar by the Clerk, were duly read at the Board this day in accordance with the 15th section of the 7th and 8th Vic., c. 81.

The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 2080 to No. 2157 both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and counter-signature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined and authenticated, from No.      to No.     , inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and counter-signature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read, to the following effect:—

That J. Moulton Collector reported to him on Monday last that a Rate payer Henry Hayden of Craumore whom he summoned to Myshall Petty Sessions for the 11th inst, had produced to him a receipt for payment of an arrear of £1.0.0 on land lately held by his brother Anthony Hayden now in America which land had recently come into possession of Henry, that he (the Clerk) had attended at the Petty Sessions yesterday and showed to the Court that the Receipt in question was one given to Henry Hayden for his own Rate of January 1851, and was not given to Anthony for his Rate, that the Name Henry and the sum 11/8 had been erased and the Name Anthony and the sum £1.0.0 inserted instead, that the Magistrates directed him for the amount and he immediately paid the Collector in Court that he the Clerk stated to the Magistrates his desire to prosecute Hayden for forgery but that they informed him it would be doubtful if a prosecution could be sustained in the absence of Anthony Hayden and the Collector Edward Nolan whom receipt it appeared to be

The Medical Officer reported in Hospital well ending 7<sup>th</sup> July 242, on House Diet 19 on Infirmary Diet out of Hospital 55, Discharged cured 37, sent to Fever and Quinary Hospital 7 Died 3, That he had to complain of the Buttermilk which was sent to the House on Tuesday last being very bad and that the Master informed him he had complained of it lately to the Guardians, that it was utterly impossible the Inmates could be kept in a healthy state while this is allowed to continue

Several Complaints have become very prevalent lately which he attributes to thin bad milk, hopes the Guardians would take some decided steps to prevent a similar occurrence

The Master Reported, That he had again to complain of the Milk supplied by Mr Sparrow sample of which he begged to leave before the Board that the Wool contractor has delivered 40 St of wool which he hoped the Board would have inspected,

Master Reported, That Judy Mahon admitted provisionally yesterday by Relieving Officer O'Brien died last night, requested to know would it be necessary to have an Inquest held on the body as the Medical Officer desires there should. That since the 1st October last he had received from the Workhouse Cows and taken on receipt and Consumption Account 13841 qts of Milk which at 5 p gal will amount to £77.0.11

That Patrick Nolan and Bridget Corrigan were prosecuted at the last Petty Sessions for deserting their families, the former was sentenced to 14 days imprisonment and the latter 2 months.

Ordered, The Guardians examined Mr Sparrow the Contractor complained of, who explained the great difficulty of getting Milk to purchase which he has been obliged to do at a considerable loss as his own arrangements had been greatly interfered with by the manner in which his supply of Milk had been set aside during the summer months, he promises to use his best exertions to provide the best Buttermilk in future

The Contractor for Buttermilk Saml Sparrow appeared before the Board and stated the difficulty of supplying a better quality of Milk, that he would however do his best in future, that it was a serious loss to be bound to a Contract to supply 100 gal per day at 3/6 per 20 gal, when he had made no preparation for winter Milk owing to the Board not having acted on the Contract for seven months

and now demanding Milk when he should go to market and purchase at a dear rate

Ordered, that if Mr Sparrow supply a good quality of Milk for the ensuing week and a good report made of it by the Master and Doctor, the Board will consider his Case on next Board day,

The Agriculturist was called up and examined respecting the Cows, stated the Distemper had completely disappeared, requested to know what could be done with the flax seeds of which he had 100 Bushels value about 10/- a bushel, and would he plant Potatoes this season with the seed grown last year about seven Bantams.

Ordered, That the flax seeds be advertised for sale in quantities from 10 to 60 Bushels, Tenders to be received on Thursday the 11th March, a sample to be left at the Farmers Gazette Office, grown from fresh Riggs seed, the Potatoes to be sold, were planted on the grounds this season owing to petty thefts when getting ripe,

Town Clerk Reporting Officer reported that Constable McEary of Moyshall applied to him on Saturday last to take care of an infant child deserted in the Townland of Craunmore in this Union, the mother had absconded and a warrant had been issued but she was not yet found, that the child was in danger of want as the poor woman in whose care it is, is unable to support it, that he made the necessary enquiry and found the statement correct, refused however to take charge of the child until he should make his report this day,

Ordered, To refer the Constable to the Magistrate at the Petty Sessions of Moyshall

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year).

The Memorial of the Medical Officers for an increase of Salaries in the proposed Dispensary Districts was read and considered

Ordered, That the arrangements as already made respecting the Salaries of those Officers be adhered to having been arrived at after mature deliberation

Proposed by Mr Farmer seconded by Mr Hill and Resolved, That the following Guardians be a Committee to draw up a Petition to Parliament praying that the Salaries of the Doctors appointed under the Medical Charities Act be defrayed out of the Consolidated fund and fixed at such Rates as shall afford them reasonable remuneration,

Messrs. Maher, Hill, Ruddy Balger and Farmer,

A Letter was read from Doctor Coartan of Galat & Jean Hospital stating that at the request of Doctor Leard the Medical Officer of the late Dispensary then he had undertaken the duties of attending the Poor of that District comprised within this Union but was at a loss for Medicines and Medical Appliances,

Ordered, That the attention of the Commissioners be requested to the immediate necessity for perfecting the arrangements for carrying into effect the late Act of Parliament 11 & 15 Vic Cap 68, subscriptions to dispensaries having almost wholly ceased,

A Letter was read from Mr Roberts requesting to know when the Committee appointed last Board day would meet to examine into the arrears stated to be due by Earl Portmouth or Immediate Lessor

Ordered, That Notice be given by the Clerk that they meet in the Board room on Saturday next 12, October

An application was made by Mr. Ridd Collector for leave of absence for a fortnight to complete the collection of County Cess for the approaching Assizes,

Ordered, Leave given

Mr. Donan moved agreeably to notice the discharge of Michael and Mary Newes from the Workhouse of Ballyluskard and readmission on the Union at Laze

Ordered - To be charged to the Union at Laze according to their discharge in August 1851,

Ordered, That the Notice of motion by Mr. Nolan for the discharge of Artie Seary and family from the Workhouse of Killeenish be withdrawn

The Chairman gave notice that on the 14<sup>th</sup> March he will draw under the notice of the Board the adjustment of the Salaries of the Medical Officers of Clonroche & Hillan

On enquiring of the Master as to those reported to have been dirty the Master states that they were only a few that had been removed from an adjoining table after being used with Vegetable soup and thought they could not be called dirty. Called the attention of the Board to the case of two persons named Brim and Maher who had been committed to goal for theft of the Articles for having stolen clothes in their possession which were proved to be the property of the Guardians and bearing the Union Brand, and a Brand dated August 1857 when Stock was taken regularly to Commissioners orders, and that notwithstanding, the case was dismissed in consequence of there being no proof of the day on which the Articles were stolen, which would be totally impossible when there are thousands of 40,000 articles, and could not be ascertained otherwise than by taking Stock which would occupy the attention of two persons for a fortnight. That the dismissal of such a case is an encouragement to the plunder of the Union, that a pauper boy found a pair of stockings yesterday in one of the lower fields which proves that the women are still endeavouring to convey out the property and that strict attention is required in the searching of those parties, that two Cops were found on Saturday in the straw which had been emptied from the Hospital beds, it is essentially necessary that the Master attend personally when the beds are being emptied to prevent any article from being conveyed out,

Ordered, The Master's attention is particularly directed to have a greater degree of cleanliness used with the Tins and that the Vegetables be washed before being cut up, that the women shall not be employed on the more distant parts of the land unless the Agriculturist can be on the spot with them, that the Master be directed to attend particularly to the removal of the dirty straw from the beds,

It is recommended that the best Nurses who now only get the ordinary House Diet should get Supper, that a great Number of them have a very scanty supply of Nourishment for their Infants and that by giving them an additional Meal not only the quantity would be increased but greatly improved, that there is an allowance of half a pound of Bread daily with  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint of new Milk up to the age of 3 months and from that to 12 mos an allowance of 8oz with the pint of Milk, would also recommend that every infant should be weaned at the age of 12 months. On reference to the record of sickness and Mortality found that the deaths in the Infant class during the past year exceeded 100 altho the average Number in the House during that time was but 123, attributed this great Mortality to a deficiency of Nourishment with the Mothers and by way of making up for it filling the Stomach of the Infant with improper food thereby producing immediate death

Resolved, That the Clerk make an estimate for a Rate to be made for the six months ending the 29th September next agreeably to the Resolution of the Board on the 18th August last and submit same to the Board on this day next.

Ordered, That the Consideration of that part of the Medical Officers Report relating to the additional allowance proposed to be given to the wet Nurses be postponed to this day next; that the female Children be taken out to the Country by the Schoolmaster or the Assistant two days a week during fine weather and that the change of diet for the Infants as recommended from Broad to Lago be adopted where he finds same to be necessary; that the Master make enquiry of the Mess<sup>r</sup> Baldwin Kelly respecting the price of the Galvanometer for testing his Milk.

In reference to the Commissioners Letter dated 24th March 1852 No 14979 the Board recommend that the Salary of the Medical Officer of the Killan Dispensary District be fixed at £65 instead of £75. in consequence of that District having been reduced in extent by the Leap Division which has been taken therefrom and added to the District of Clonroche and which has caused the Valuation to be reduced from £13342 to £10562 whilst the District of Clonroche has been increased from £12030 to £14810, more particularly as the Medical Officers themselves have expressed their satisfaction at that arrangement.
