NewtownBarry July 14th 1852

Gentlemen

In reply to your Correspondence of the 9th Inst. respecting Mary Kelly who you report died 2 days after her admission into Enniscorthy Workhouse — I beg to state that she was admitted into NewtownBarry Poor Hospital on the 18th June last labouring under light fever — She had been an Idiot since she was five years of age and never spoke during the time she was under my care. She had had an attack of Paralysis some years ago by which she lost the use of both her legs. She never refused her food while here but was in every other respect quite unmanageable. I was even obliged to force the Instruments between her teeth when I required to look at her tongue as she would

bite any person who attempted to touch her, it was very difficult to judge of her state she was so barely and it was almost impossible to feel her pulse, but I kept her in Hospital State all fever symptoms had subsided and that the Child with safety be removed to the Workhouse and be placed in the Idiot Wards which I thought the most suitable place for her for many reasons. She left this in charge of her father who I considered would take the best care of her

Extracted 5 Augt 1852

Gentlemen

As I understand that an examination
for occurring which took place between Mr
Wallace and myself is pending - May I beg
to submit the following facts - The first alter-
cation which took place between us was about
some houses in Templeshannon rated to Mr
Hawkins to whom I applied for the Rate. Mr
Hawkins told me he had given all his Estate,
property to Mr Wallace and that he ought to pay
it. I went again and again to Mr Wallace
and he persisted in denying it. Subsequently
I had several interviews with Mr Hawkins on
the matter and he finally told me he would
interfere with Mr Wallace to have it paid that
it was never paid to me and rather than com-
mence a quarrel I returned it to him in arrear.
The sequel proved that I was right for Mr Wallace
paid Mr White my successor the whole of the
arrear and I happen continually to do so. The
next time I met Mr Wallace he told me
that some of the said houses were gone to
rein - that he should get a revision of
them but did not know how it should be
done. I immediately wrote him giving him
all the information in my power and the
next time I met him in Templeshannon he
told me I saved him £20. I said I was
glad of it and asked him to be friends hence
forward or words to that effect, this surely
was not countering a quarrel, after some
hesitating which I cannot now go into we
paid his Rate for Ballycensus and soon after
came the immediate cause of his complaint
against me. The late John Georcoran was

rated for the whole of Killagally Land, he was not at that time in the neighbourhood but during his absence Mr. Alan Corcoran and Mr. Wallace divided the premises, Mr. Corcoran consenting to pay his portion if it were revised in the Receiver being ordered by the Board to do so and Mr. Corcoran paid his portion we now please to bear this fact in Recollection in that the other portion of the premises was occupied by John Dwyne who lives near Sheills Well and it was his Cow I restrained in not Mr. Wallace's — but Mr. Wallace went to the pound and released the Cow.

The Rate in question was struck the 8th Aug^r 1847, the Seizure was made the last days of August or the first week in September 1848, for in a few days afterwards I sent in my resignation. The next Rate was struck the 23rd September which shows it was at the closing up of my accounts the seizure took place and not soon after a Rate was struck as has been attributed to me.
