Sir

I have received a letter from the Clerk of the Union requesting to know why the Returns for the month ending 25th June of St. L. Barry Fever Hospital had not been forwarded as usual to the Master, I beg to state the Clerk could have told you the reason as I had written to him on the subject. I had always been directed to write out the Provision account on the back of the printed form of admissions and discharges. To make up this account I should know the date the New Contracts for supplying the Hospital commenced from, which Mr Kennedy had omitted to mention to me in forwarding the list of Contractors and the rates of prices, I therefore wrote to him to know the date (the price of many articles having changed) and then on receipt of his answer immediately forwarded the Account to the Master. There are some sums of money lying in my hands on the account of the expenses of some pay Patients in the Hospital, I wrote to the Master to ask how it should be sent in very many weeks ago and he never answered my letter, I also asked one of the Guardians to bring it in several times and he did not. I now request to be informed how I am to forward it and to whom.

The following Letter was read from the Medical Officer of the Poor Hospital at Newtown Bally.

13th July 1853

Gentlemen

I consider it necessary to make a few remarks as regards your minute of the 30th June, in the first place there is stated on the face of it as a fact a matter which I should have thought was notorious to the Officers of the House and a large number of the Guardians not to be the case viz the statement that I had the assistance of a Porter to write out their reports. In the next place I hold in my possession written directions of the Board requiring me in person to do such myself. I decline attacking my signature to any forms such as your minute submits upon very sound grounds, firstly because they are entirely unconnected with my duties as Medical Officer and secondly upon an equally rational ground viz that I could not possibly attack conscientiously my signature to any account drawn up by another party and bound for its correctness without going over it most minutely myself, and that I decline doing. Listed before you will find a number of Books which lie at this Hospital ready to be given in charge to any party you direct, I will post them up to next Saturday. I have kept in the habit of keeping the Whisky, wine, brandy, and Arrowroot locked up in the Hospital and daily with my own hand measuring out the quantity required for each day

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year)

✓ The Hospital Board which is also under my own lock and key and with which I myself stamp each Article whenever received from the Workhouse can with the Key of the Whisky Store be handed to whoever you appoint to take charge of them and they leave to add I can no longer be held accountable for clothing or any other Article in the Hospital

You will excuse my giving an opinion upon the competency of any Officer as regards duties not legitimately coming within the sphere of his Office while at the same time as a small rate payer myself I may be permitted to say that if the Board be of opinion that an illiterate man at £16 a week be competent to keep the Accounts and Books which a Master of a Workhouse has to keep and to perform a great portion of the duties he has to perform (no doubt on a smaller scale) it must be obvious that there are other salaries more fitting for reduction than those of the half-worked and ill paid Medical Men. Upon the points referred to I therefore must decline expressing any opinion as to the competency of the Porter.


