A letter was read from Mr. Michael Durlong Porter stating that he had been appointed by the High Sheriff to the situation of keeper of the Empress's Bridewell and which he accepted, begged the Board would have the goodness to accept his resignation.

Ordered. That in consequence of the death of Matthew Leary from whom was held the Dispensary House at Coolree the Clerk prepare a new Contract to be entered into from this date with the present owner Darby Leary, at £5 per Ann.

In respect of the complaint made regarding the Branch Dispensary House at Bree in the Glenroche Dispensary District, Mr Cliffe as Chairman of the Committee reported the House to be about 36 feet by 11½ feet, one half occupied by the family (a small one) at present the remainder or Dispensary portion being 13 feet 10 inches by 11 feet 6 inches is occupied by the Medicine, a better house cannot be procured in that locality, but at a trifling expense the inner room may be floored with boards & a fire occasionally kept in it, the outer room will be quite sufficient for a waiting room. No Committee meets at this Branch Dispensary, the expense proposed to be incurred will be £2.
