account ¹⁰ £1.5.6 by the Collector for arrears due on houses occupied by Stephen Foley Denis Foley and Denis Lacey - as tenants to her - that she could give evidence that neither of the above persons, occupied those houses under her for the last two years - that they were in her possession and unoccupied since November 1853

Ordered The Arrears of Rate on these Houses must be paid by the persons in whose possession they are found

A Letter was read from Miss Macintosh teacher of Sewed Work in the Workhouse calling the attention of the Board to the fact that she came to the House in August last - that since then, there has been nine weeks wages stopped at intervals from her that she cannot support herself decently on less than 10/- a week, and unless the Board will allow her the weekly salary - she shall be obliged to resign the situation and trust they would order payment of those nine weeks

Ordered The Board engaged the services of Miss Macintosh on her own terms, wishing if possible to encourage a class work if it could be made available to the future independent maintenance of pauper females. - The Board regret that it cannot be made even to cover the expenses of instruction in a school of 110 pupils the greater number of whom can work tolerably well. - They therefore accept Miss Macintosh's resignation

meeting of the Guardians tomorrow which I regret, as the Subject for consideration is of a nature to excite much discussion but I feel assured that all parties will concur that the Subject was not of the Board's choice that a centralization of Fever Hospital accommodation has been forced on us by the Local Board of Guardians in the case of Ennistown - and if the consequent examination of the Subject shows that practically the evils have not been in other Unions nor in our own case of the Clonsilla and Hillan Hospitals - as serious or calamitous as was apprehended - Mr. Collins must be discharged from any other object than that of public utility and economy and equal Justice to all parts of the Union

I think myself that the prayer of the Memorialists can be granted without entailing more than their fair share of expense on other parts of the Union - there cannot be any sound reason to refuse the Trial - and for that purpose I think Mr. Collins might withdraw the part of his Resolution which gives a date for closing Newtown Barry Hosp^l - whilst the necessary steps may be taken to build a Fever Hosp^l on the Workhouse land to accommodate 100 Patients - and for this purpose application should be made to Lord Portsmouth for an exchange of so much Land as may be necessary to give a site on land held in fee

I would further suggest that the object of the Guardians and rate payers of the Newtown Barry Dispensary District (which is, I believe, coterminous with that of the Fever Hosp^l) may be forwarded by a notice from a Guardian interested - that the Salary of the Medical Officer be increased by £25. - and for attendance on the Fever Hospital be diminished by a similar amt. - and further that the services of a Porter to the Hosp^l be dispensed with, and that the head nurse be held responsible for the duties at present done by him - In this manner the charges of the Hospital could be localized to a certain extent - leaving a very inconsiderable amt. of Establishment charges in which all parts of the Union are equally concerned - I think this arrangement should meet the wishes & receive the support of the Memorialists

As to the merits of the question I have narrowly examined the Tables and Maps submitted to me by Mr. Boone on behalf of the Memorialists - and I find by them that the Fever Hospital stands in the centre of a circle of which rather more than one half belongs to the Emmischothy Union and is benefitted by its existence. That the Fever Hospital is actually supported for the accommodation of Six Clerk Divisions in Cranmore, Caringduff, St. Mary's, Clehamon Hillmish and Passard, that the other Six Clerk Divisions should be equally served by Emmischothy and as there has not been any allegation that Fever Patients have ever been neglected in them during the past seven years, the Subscribers may be congratulated on the very few cases amongst them that require Fever Hospital relief - on the contrary, nothing can be more melancholy than the prevalence of Fever in the immediate vicinity of the Hospital, evidenced by the Statistics placed before me.
