Medical Inspection, its prosperity was not considered dangerous to the general health of the inmates of the Workhouse and they therefore request the opinion of the Commissioners and that they would have a report made on the subject. The Guardians are fully aware of the insufficient accommodation at present provided for Fever Patients, and that an Hospital for 80 beds which the building they propose would supply with abundant accommodation for Inmates, Surgeon &c. in immediate connexion with the Workhouse would be most desirable and economical, but they are unwilling to add new buildings where so much vacant space is likely to exist - the present Hospital should be enlarged to double its size if adopted for future arrangements, and an outlay of considerable expense should be made on a terminable lease at a rent of £10 a year.

Ordered The Complaints have been so frequent both by the Master, Visiting Committee Vice Chairman, and the Incommodious and impossibility of Supplying elsewhere so large a quantity of bread as should be returned left no alternative to the Guardians to take any other course than the one adopted. Bread little more than three parts baked, whilst it gave the weight could not be prevented from creating heavyosity, and consequent insatiation to the Paupers, particularly the children when subdivided into small portions

The Vice Chairman read a Letter from the Chairman H. H. Combl. Lord Caron, wishing to tender his resignation as Chairman of the Board

A declaration of Owen Connors was read respecting a sum of £1.6.11 paid by him to Saml Lambet, late Collector for Sallyhallion

Ordered That the Clerk write to Mr. Walsh the present Collector, not to press for the amount, until enquiry, when he shall receive further orders

A Communication was placed before the Chair from Doctor Carte, and the consideration postponed to this day next, the Clerk was directed to write to Mr. Doyle stating the anxiety of the Guardians to have an answer from the Governors of the Old and Dispensary and Fever Hospital to their former application before making their arrangements for the ensuing year

Anne Reynolds, an inmate, applied for clothing for her son Thomas now 6 years in the Workhouse and 15 years old, to go out to a situation.

Ordered Considering the character of the boy we allow a sum of clothing to the value of £1. He having outgrown those he had when entering the Workhouse.

A Letter was read from Doctor Carey Newcomen suggesting that a few other names be added to the Hospital Committee, as he found great difficulty in getting a meeting at the proper time to examine the accounts, when sending them for payment. Also respecting an old woman Catharine Dooley admitted in Fev. and having stayed now a long time unable to leave her bed wished to report the case to the Board.

Ordered That following Officer O'Brien visit the Hospital see the old woman, and if she can be safely removed to the Workhouse with the Doctor's advice to do so.

The Tender of Thomas Derry to Supply the cloining of the Workhouse at the rate of £3 per Acre was accepted.

The Tender of Mr. Patrick Murphy to fit up the Master's Office agreeably to plan and Specification for the sum of £1.10.0 also for ceiling the Male Probation Ward for the sum of £1.7.6 was accepted, he proposed fitting up the new Press in the Clerks Office for £9.1.6 and offered to allow £3 for the old four pump, to which the Board did not agree but will allow Mr. Murphy £4.0.0 and the four Pump provided he accepts the same for fitting up the Press.

The Bonds and other Securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year):—

The Treasurer requested a Committee to be appointed to sign the Books on part of the Board.

Ordered, That Messrs. Collin and Roberts be a Committee for that purpose, and that the Clerk inform these gentlemen.


