That we consider the present Valuation as struck originally on too high a scale, and that in addition, the present assessment of all farming produce warrants us in coming to the Resolution, that 25 Per Cent be reduced off the existing Valuation.

That Mr. Home's Motion for the reduction of 25 Per Cent off the Valuation, besides being illegal, be unjust towards many of the Landowners whose lands being let at fair value are already lower than the Rent.

This Amendment was put from the Chair and lost—only two Votes for, and thirteen against it. The Original Motion was then put and carried.

The History question next occupied the attention of the Board. The Petition of the Board of Guardians of the Community Union agreed to at their Weekly Meeting in the Board Room this day. Humbly Sheweth That your Petitioners have seen with regret and alarm a Bill lately introduced into your Honourable House purporting to be a Bill for the further Amendment of the Act for the more effectual Relief of the destitute Poor in Ireland, which in the opinion of your Petitioners is calculated if passed into a law to impede the well working of the Irish Poor Relief Act. That from the experience of your Petitioners in the working of that law in Ireland, they are convinced that the Poor Law Commissioners possess too much power and patronage and that they have exercised these powers in many instances in a manner to which may be traced the great discontent at present existing against the System.

That your Petitioners believe in place of alleging the feeling now prevailing against Poor Laws in Ireland, the introduction of the proposed Amendment conferring greater powers on the Poor Law Commissioners and changing the principle of rating will render the law still more unpopular and if persevered in will endanger the Peace of the country.

That your Petitioners are confident the Rating under the Law as now in force, is based on a just and equitable principle, the beneficial interest which Landlords and Tenants may lawfully possess in the Premises. And that any deviation from that principle will operate most unjustly by narrowing the constituency and by increasing the burdens on those least able to bear them. The Rack Renters of Ireland.

That your Petitioners object to the appointment by the Poor Law Commissioners of Valuers, - as the Guardians must be better acquainted with their capabilities and the duties to be performed in each Locality.

That your Petitioners are certain if a Poor Law Work Satisfaction in Ireland the destitute would be relieved, if Public Works were encouraged there would be plenty of employment for the People. Consequently the necessity of emigration would be diminished, and in no case might Public Money be granted from the Rates for that purpose without a Special Meeting of the Rate Payers.

That your Petitioners also to the necessity of the great Principle of Representation in all cases of Taxation by to express their dissatisfaction at the contemplated increase of Ecclesiastical Guardians. They are irresponsible to the Rate Payers and do not represent the Landlord Class who already enjoy a Plurality of Votes for the Election of Guardians. Therefore your Petitioners most earnestly implore your Honorable House not to pass into a Law the Clause 1.7.3. 16 & 17. for your Petitioners are firmly convinced from the above circumstances that if it should pass in its present form it will bring a total downfall on the whole system of Poor Laws in Ireland. And your Petitioners will as in duty bound ever pray.

One of the inmates, Robert Hutchings, applied to be discharged for the purpose of procuring Means for removing his family altogether from the Workhouse, and his reasons appearing satisfactory the Board granted his request.
