The Medical Officer presented the following Annual report to the Chairman of the Enniscomry Board of Guardians

Sir

As a new year has just commenced I beg leave to lay before the Board A summary of the sickness and mortality in the workhouse hospital during the past, and to make some observations upon circumstances affecting the health of the entire of the inmates.

Admitted to hospital during the year 1843	368
Discharged Cured	321
" Relieved	18
" Died	32

Of the 32 deaths, 11 occurred in persons worn out by old age or infirmities, and they were transferred to the hospital that they might not die in the other parts of the house; 18 occurred in persons admitted into the Workhouse in an advanced stage of consumption or other incurable disease, and the remaining 3 took place in persons in whom a recovery might have been considered possible. Of these 3 one was a child 2 years old, from inflammation of the lungs a week or two after scarlet fever, another a child 3 years old, from pleurisy; and the remaining one a woman, from fever. This is the only death from fever since the House opened, though there were upwards of 100 cases, and many of them very bad ones, a circumstance which I attribute in a great measure to their having been well Nurse-tended. The Nurse, I consider deserves much credit for the manner in which she has kept the Hospital, and has made unpoised persons stand upon the sick, at the same time, making whatever soup and cutting up and distributing whatever meat was ordered for the entire House. I have known the best effects to result from the stimulus afforded to the Nurse of Public Establishments by an annual premium for diligence, and I have the less diffidence in suggesting an arrangement of this kind to the Board as the Wexford Nurse receives yearly 3 or 4 wages more than the Nurse of this workhouse. The death I mentioned I attributed to want of good care, it occurred before the appointment of this Nurse, and before effective measures had been taken for the attendance of the sick at night.

The 368 cases do not comprise all those that occurred in the House

during the year. At least double that number, being, of a minor character, were treated out of Hospital, though many of them at first assumed so sudden and serious an appearance that I was summoned to visit them immediately. When it is considered that the average number in the House has been about 300, the number of sick is very large, even greater in proportion than in the Dublin Unions. The prevention of illness is a matter of such deep importance, as well on account of humanity, as for the purpose of saving expense, that I will state what I consider led to the prevalence of sickness in the House, with the hope of its leading to the removal of such causes.

1. The clothing, was always short of the number of Paupers except in summer when it was not required.
 2. Lying upon beds damp and even rotting from wet.
 3. Want of proper ventilation at night and early in the morning.
 4. Want of proper cleanliness personal and otherwise, chiefly amongst the children and infants. The Nursery was generally filthy.
- The above I consider it my duty to draw the attention of the Board to, as it came under my observation almost daily throughout the past year. In doing so I beg not to be understood as attaching blame to any particular person. Indeed I consider that the fault lies with many, though in different degrees: and in some it does not proceed from any inability or disinclination to acquit themselves creditably, but from mistaken notions of their proper duties. These matters are left undone, all disowning them as their duty.

Be the officer of a Workhouse ever so good, a regular and efficient inspection by the visiting committee is necessary: it proves a wholesome stimulus even to those who fully discharge their duties.

During the past year, the want of a regular attendance of the visiting committee has been often felt, and it must be admitted that there is some excuse for Guardians who have already devoted an entire day to the Board absenting themselves for the remainder of the week, as they are generally persons whose time is valuable to themselves. I therefore take the liberty of mentioning an arrangement which would secure a regular and efficient inspection of the House without encroaching much upon the time of the visiting committee:—*N.B.*, The House is to be visited by the visiting committee at 11 o'clock every Friday, after which they might lay their report still fresh in their minds before the Board, and have almost at once removed. Moreover the visiting committee also to visit the House, at least once every month on a day and hour unknown to any but themselves.

By the latter arrangement, when it is known that a House is to be visited at an unknown time, it will be ready for inspection at all times: but if it is visited at a fixed time only, a visit will be expected at that time only.

The value of this plan I have abundantly felt in the Hospital. I also beg leave to mention that a great many abuses would be removed by either the visiting committee or the Board calling for, and inspecting the Diet Books weekly, and ascertaining whether the reports therein written have been attended to.



The Medical Officer reports that many of the Pupils have been for the last week labouring under sores and affections of the skin without ointment to dress them owing to the Lard and Suet which he applied for the the Board being refused. Also that many young children are in a very weak and almost dying state after Measles for want of proper nourishment and that as the Eggs ordered for them in the diet book were not procured, He had been obliged to buy them himself for them - also that the children are very unhealthy for want of a walk into the country.
