AGRICULTURIST'S REPORT:

The Vice Chairman and other Members of the Committee
appointed last November attended, and brought up
their Report which having been read was ordered to be
placed on the Minutes,

Report, your Committee, appointed on the 5th November
last to enquire into the general expenditure with a view to
such retrenchment as may be practicable, consistent with
efficiency and particularly under the head of Establishment
charges, have met from week to week, and beg to present
the following report and suggestions for the Board of Guardians

Your Committee have examined the accounts under the
heads of Agriculture, Clerk's Office, and Petty Cash Disbursements
Cost of Maintenance and Clothing, Medical Department
and Salaries of ^{Medical} Officers, Treasurers Department —
they have compared the number of inmates relieved

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and
directions given thereon, as follows:—

and Cost of Maintenance for the years 1844, 1854 & 1856 with the
years of 1854-55 & 56 — the Establishment charges during
the same period with the Officers Salaries,

Under the head of Agriculture, the number of boys capable
of working on the Farm have been so diminished by the general
reduction of inmates, and the success which has attended the
instruction of a number of the more advanced in age in the
various trades both as regards the economy of the House
clothing, and providing the boys themselves with the best
prospect of future self support — that a good deal of
horse work has been required and paid for during the last
year, and probably a considerable quantity of both Horse
and Manual labour will be required in future, to cultivate
the quantity of land held by the Guardians, so as to produce
the same amount of profitable return which has hitherto been
so satisfactorily and creditably obtained, — they therefore
recommend that a portion the most distant from the House
which is now down in grass, should be set off as pasture

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners, and others, were read by the Clerk,
and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or, Orders made on them
respectively as follows):—

land by the year, and that another piece adjoining to it
which may be laid down in grass this year, should next
year be set off also with a preference to the Tenant who
takes the pasture of the present year, altogether amounting
to about ~~10~~ 12 Statute Acres — Your Committee believe that
the management of the remainder might with a view
to the best discipline and subordination be placed under
the responsibility of the Master giving him an Agricultural
Assistant who shall also act as his Clerk, — the Union of
the two offices should effect an annual saving of £20
or more — Your Committee further recommend that
hired labour on the land should only be used when absolutely
necessary to save the Corn Crops, and that the quantity of
land should be restricted so much as the School boys
shall be able to manage in green crop culture — The
other portions being gradually set off as pasture by the year
so that on any emergency as a Workhouse test, they may be
available with 3 months notice, Good Horns & hedges protected
by fencing your Committee think will be a sufficient division
for the present,

Clerks Department, The Committee having examined
the various disbursements under the head of Petty Cash and
compared the items with the orders and entries in Ledger
have much pleasure in reporting the accuracy of these accounts

and entries, — the weekly payments made thro' this account to the Master tradesmen gives it an appearance of amount larger than might be expected for Casual disbursements but the Convenience of such payments renders it Continuance desirable: — a greater degree of economy might be used in the transmission of parcels — the Carriage of seeds and other things from Dublin by Railway is very expensive, — the Committee also Consider that advertising by Newspaper insertions is expensive and in many ways nearly useless — they recommend that it shall be seldom used unless when required by law, and that placards, of which 50 at a time should be sufficient being carefully distributed and posted up, shall be used. They find that Circulars to Guardians, including the postage stamps form a considerable item of expense, and they recommend their issue to be confined to Cases Ordered by the Board — they Consider the mode in which Stationery has been sometimes supplied might be improved, and that in future a separate Contract by advertised tenders with some local parties be made for a supply of pens ink, paper, envelopes &c to whom a Board order shall be necessary.

Treasurers Department, The granting of cheques to order and so settling all payments was Considered, but your Committee did not think it necessary to incur that expense.

As to Maintenance and Clothing, your Committee examined the Master as to his diet Calculations, and made of ascertaining the weekly Cost as General Average, — Infirmary diet — and Fever Hospital diet — and any suggestions for economy. — He stated that the dietary in use was working so well he was of opinion no alteration was necessary — the average being as low as possible with the present Cost of Provisions, and your Committee believe that the various necessaries under the Masters Control are carefully managed, and that the clothing Costs little more, than the expense of the raw Material and the Master Tradesmens wages.

On Comparing the average Cost of each Pauper in the years 1844-45 & 46, with the average number annually relieved were 1707, — the clothing and Maintenance 1711 per week, and the Establishment charges £392, — with the average Cost in the years 1854-55 & 56, with a weekly Cost of 2s. and Establishment charges £470, — on an average of numbers annually relieved of 2776. — your Committee find a very trifling difference in the Cost of a Pauper's maintenance, and when account is taken that a good system of agricultural employment with some diffusion of knowledge and much improvement

improvement of discipline and conduct, has been obtained in the latter period ^{as} is evident by reference to the Masters Book of Complaints and Punishments, — and also that a widely extended system of ~~relief~~ Medical relief has been introduced. — your Committee Consider that a better economy at present exists than at any former period, but still Capable of being further applied by a watchful superintendence of the Board.

In ascertaining the average weekly Cost of patients in Fever Hospital by an order of the Board some months ago the portion of Establishment charges was added to the Cost of Maintenance which swelled the published item beyond what was fair in Comparison with other Unions, where it was not done, nor was it correct as regarded the General average — so it has been discontinued.

Medical Department, your Committee find on reference to the Minutes of proceedings during the past two years that efforts have been made by them to Concentrate the relief to Fever Patients at the Workhouse, by building an Hospital on the Workhouse grounds, where the Superintendence of the Medical Officer of the Workhouse would be a saving of expense — but the very strong remonstrance from the Electoral Division of Newtownbarrny and the neighboring District as well as from the Electoral Divisions near Orlart where the two District Hospitals, exist as well as the indisposition on the part of a number of Guardians to incur the expense of building a new Hospital — allowed matters to Continue as they were, — altho by a Resolution of the Board the Fever Hospital at Orlart had been closed and the salary of the Dispensary District increased by £10, as a remuneration to the Medical Officer for attendance on Fever patients whom it might be impossible to remove to Ennisemthy — such an arrangement would have tended to diminish Establishment charges, but would have been most unfair if not also extended to the District of Newtownbarrny — and under the circumstances, if it be not so carried out, we recommend that the Orlart Dispensary District shall be relieved from the extra salary so imposed. — your Committee believe the Establishment charges in the Medical Department might be reduced by placing the Workhouse and Fever Hospital under the charge of one Medical Officer to whom an Assistant might be appointed in periods of increased difficulty from numbers or disease or should no increase of numbers take place before the season for striking a New Date that when Considering the Estimates for next year enquiry might be made how far it would be just to reconsider the salaries of the Medical Officers, or other readjustment of their duties. — your Committee find the duties imposed by the Government on your Clerk in more numerous
