The girls to be in readiness to proceed to Mr. Poyne by Saturday for whom clothing is allowed. The Commissioners permission is requested to extra allowance given to the Annates cleaning out the Cess Pools.

Visitors Report

Visited the House to day and found the Annates clean and orderly - the Station was employed preparing the clothes for the Emigrants - the Master was engaged on the Farm previous to my arrival - he subsequently accompanied me thro' the House which happily to day presented almost an empty appearance - and wore its usual cleanly aspect - however I think the white wash brush can be advantageously employed in the Dormitories and Day Rooms. The Infirmary is well ventilated and the necessary care and attention is evidently paid to the Patients. A large proportion of the Annates of the Home are old and infirm women.

The Committee feel that some allowance may be made for the late Nurse Eliza Brien who had no Assistant under the peculiar circumstances of uncertainty in which the Hospital was left open on the visit of the Inspector that she be paid her salary and

and remain in charge until a Successor be appointed by the Board to take charge - the Committee at the same time express their regret that the Board of Guardians propose to elect a Nurse at a lower salary than is fixed for the other Hospitals of the Union and probably therefore of inferior qualifications that the character of the Onlast Hospital for the last 7 years before its recent closure was remarkable for the short period during which the Patients remained under treatment and the very small proportion of deaths whilst the utmost economy was carried out and the Committee feel satisfied that nothing shall in future tend to diminish such a satisfactory state of things.

The Vice Chairman visited the Farm and Reported.

That he feels the greatest pleasure in stating to the Board that the Crop of Wheat is not only very fine but the quality of the Grain on the part reaped of very superior quality - that he on no former occasion saw the green crop so clean - so thoroughly well cultivated and promising so abundant a return that the manner in which the irrigation of the Cabbage plants is being managed with liquid manure is highly creditable to the Masters knowledge as an Agriculturist and to his Assistant. He would recommend that if possible an arrangement be made to sell the wheat in quantities of not less than 10 Hore to the Farmers of the Union at a price not exceeding the market value by more than 5/- a barrel when threshed and that a Subscription List be opened for persons who wish to engage it and who will make a deposit of one half the value to be forfeited if not taken such list to close on the 20th September when any quantity not engaged may be sold in the Market if the Guardians so please.

Sir

In reply to your letter I have to say for the information of the Guardians that I did receive the ticket alluded to, in it—and at that time and up to the present I have had an unusual pressure of business—engrained into her case which was of three weeks standing and not an urgent one and sent her by her husband at the time such medicine as I considered would relieve her telling him at the same time that I would visit her next day—I was prevented from doing so by illness and as I did not again hear from her I considered she was cured by what I had sent which is the fact as the woman is now quite well

I called the attention of the Guardians a few years back to the unequal division of the Dispensary District of Ennisorthy—I have very much the largest District and the worst paid Medical Officer in Ireland I had a few years ago a salary from the Fever Hospital which compensated me for the very small one I receive from the Dispensary and I have been very unjustly deprived of it. if I got fair play I should be again put in charge of half the Fever Hosp. as before and get an equal division of the Dispensary Dist. and I request the Guardians attention to it as a matter of justice
