Masters Report

Beg'd to state that since Captain Hamilton visited the Workhouse on the 11th Inst. — he had devoted the whole of his time to the duties of the House — had all the bed clothes exchanged and thoroughly cleaned in the whole Establishment. It is now in a fair condition — The passage leading from the female department into the yard and female yard in general require more attention as some of the Chambers or night buckets are emptied into the reservoir and small tank — which should be emptied into the Wagon Privies — The School children are also supplied with new frocks.

It beg'd to state that on the night of Friday the 20th Inst. there was a grievous assault committed on the Watchman who states that two thieves entered on the Terrace for the purpose of taking Wraps which had been put down for sale, and when he closed them one of them struck him

him with a stone on the head and was left senseless on the ground. He cannot tell how long he remained in that state — but for protection of the property, the Master would suggest the propriety of offering a reward for the apprehension of the parties.

It directed the attention of the Board to the boundary fence at Cosgrave's side. it is in such a dilapidated state that it affords facilities for thieves or cattle to trespass the Workhouse Farms. It therefore trusted the Board will appoint a Committee to view the fence and decide on the means of compelling Mr. Cosgrave to make good his side. the greater part of which has been taken away from time to time.

There are four or five Chimneys on the House that smoke very badly — they require Pots at top.

Ordered. The Motion's attention is called to that part of the Master's Report in reference to the emptying of Chambers night buckets &c. — The Master to make enquiry respecting the Thieves and report any information he receives to the Police. The Committee ^{Agriculturist's Report.} appointed to ~~view~~ inspect the female School are requested to view the fence and report.

Fulton and Knick examine into the state of the female School and report to the Board.
