Wanted for the use of the Hospital. 2 Sweeping Brushes, 1 milk pail, 12 tin plates, 1 tin tea pot - the Hospital requires whitewashed very badly and some of the fire places require repairs - all the beds require fresh straw. It would also be necessary to employ a laborer for 2 or 3 days to clean the premises outside of the Hospital which are full of grass and weeds and when properly cleaned would require a few loads of gravel.

The Hospital is in other respects badly situated the fence adjoining the public road is in such a ruinous state (all falling down) that the pigs of the street have access to the (very) Hospital doct the nurse complains that she cannot keep a drop of clean water outside but they trample and toss about.



Read to lay before the Board the Case of Mary Shaw deceased as directed last Board day.  
Mary Shaw and husband were admitted to the Workhouse the 19th June 1856 and Registered a Protestant, which Religion she professed up to 11th Decr. 1856. on which date she had her religious denomination changed from Protestant to Roman Catholic, she was admitted to the Workhouse on the 14th March 1857 and was sent to the Fever Hospital on the 1st December 1857. Nurse Ship states that a Protestant Clergyman named Mr. Moore visited her about a week after her admission into the Fever Hospital but there is no entry of his name in the Porter's Book but he (the Master) found the name of the Rev. S. Jones on the 15 Decr. 1857 (to Mary Shaw) also on the 17th & 18th Shaw remained in the Hospital up to the 27th Jan'y 1858 when she died.  
The Nurse and Porter stated that Shaw told them she was a Protestant but they heard she changed her religion in the Workhouse.



and that they heard so before the Rev. E. Jones visited her but as she told them she was a Protestant they thought they were acting right in allowing the Protestant Clergyman to visit her. Visited the Galveston Fever Hospital on Saturday last and found the clothing correct. Condemned 1 Blanket and 1 Rug. Required for the use of the Hospital 2 Black Lead Linings 2 with pans 1 Iron Coal box 6 pint trays. 12 tin plates. 1 Gridiron. 1 frying pan. 1 tin for fat and lard the basket. The Nurse requested me to call the attention of the Board to the necessity of procuring a small clock for the use of the Hospital at present she has to give out the Medicine by guess.

The Hospital requires to be whitewashed and some of the floors require repairs. also the roof and chimneys. I think the Doctor would be able to have all done, including the whitewashing for a cost of \$100.

Took stock of clothing in the Emisecroft's Dressing Room Monday last. which I found correct. the list of these are very much worn. Condemned, 101 sheets, 38 Blankets, 37 Rugs 14 Socks 118 Garters. Required for the use of the Hospital. 30 pair Sheets, 20 Rugs.

As the Granite Curbing is set on the kitchen boiler the Board will please to have it inspected.

Ordered. The Portion respecting the Galveston Hospital to be copied and forwarded to the Hosp. Committee for their consideration and Report. Plans are to issue for tenders for the articles required at Emisecroft's Hospital. A Committee inspected the putting up of the Boilers who reported that the Contract is not completed according to Specification - the Curbing of Granite not fitted under the Flange of each Boiler - with this exception the Job seems to be done in a very permanent manner. Which being adopted the Contractor is requested to have the Curbing fitted in accordance with the Specification before being paid. and in reference to the Case of Mary Shawan examination of the Nurse and Porter of the Hospital as placed on the Ordinary Proceedings.

The Porter of the Hospital was then called and stated that Mary Shaw told him on her admission to the Hospital she was a Protestant and he had entered her as such that he is in the habit of entering all visitors in his Book when he is present - thinks he was about when the Rev. Mr. Moore visited the Hospital - heard since that Mary Shaw had changed her Religion whilst an Inmate of the Workhouse and before her admission to the Town Hospital when she died on the 27th Mch.

Ordered. That in future the description be taken from the House Register and sent to the Town Hospital with each person and if any patient requires to be visited by a Clergyman of any different persuasion from that entered on the Register the Nurse
