Masters Report.

In reference to the Commissioners Letter of the 29th ult. suggesting the propriety of increasing the allowance of Bread to the Class 1st. I beg to state that by increasing the allowance to 14 oz it would be a great benefit to that class and as the present amount at the present price of Bread the additional expense would be only 1/4 per day—and on consulting the Medical Officer as to the use of Brown Bread he is of opinion that the White is much preferable—as the Brown would have a tendency to relax the bowels to which there is a slight disposition at present. He would therefore respectfully recommend to continue the use of White Bread as the present Dietary is working so well.

It will be necessary for the tradesmen to attend in future from 6 o'clock in the morning until 6 o'clock in the evening during the summer months.

As the weather was very mild last week he had

Sent



sent the School girls out on the Farm to pick weeds - that is one half the number in the forenoon and the other half in the afternoon.

It is essentially necessary that the Schoolmaster, Schoolmistress and Matron do pay more attention to the state of the shoes and stockings worn by the inmates under their charge as these articles of dress are not changed as regularly as they should be. Also the Schoolmaster's attention is required to the state of the shoes in general - that is - that he should make a general inspection one day in the week and see that all the inmates are properly fitted. He had long since arranged that the shoes be changed if necessary every morning up to 10 o'clock, but now after that time as it would interfere with the well working of the House.

It is also necessary that the Matron should accompany this class when going to the Shoemaker's shop for a change of shoes. The Schoolmistress was absent on Sunday night without leave from 1/2 past twelve to 3/4 past 1 o'clock.

There was a Case of Small pox admitted into the Patient Fever Hospital on the 1<sup>st</sup> of April 1844.

Agriculturist's Report.

Ordered. That the allowance of White Bread to Class 1 for Dinner be in future 14oz. The Matron, Schoolmistress and Schoolmaster were called before the Board and directed to pay attention to the shoes and stockings. The Schoolmaster's attention is particularly directed to the shoes in general. The tradesmen to attend at the hours stated and the employment of the School girls was sanctioned - the Schoolmistress was Cautioned.
