Abie Flynn aged 25 single was in Wexford Gaol for the last 4 months and discharged on Friday last was joined in the Workhouse Provisionally — Admitted on the Union.

Ellen Lass aged 55 widow from Hospital Lane — Admitted on Carriscorthy

Budget Cakes aged 18 single lived with her father a labourer who is now not able to maintain her. Could find no employment — Admitted on Carriscorthy.

Mary Linnott aged 19 single left the House 3 weeks ago — is of weak mind. her mother lives in Blackwater — states she is unable to keep her. Admitted on Castleblissett.

The Schoolmaster applied for leave of absence to attend an examination at Wexford on the 9th & 10th to which he had been summoned by the District Inspector — He applied also to be allowed to absent himself on Monday the 12th in order to visit the School at Ballymore to which he had been recently appointed — that he should return on Tuesday morning the 13th and remain until the new Schoolmaster to be appointed shall take charge.

"Mr. Hamilton begs to call the attention of the Board of Guardians to the inattention of Mr. Alge (the Head Nurse of the Fever Hospital) to the instructions, which have been given to her on the subject of the ventilation of the Fever Wards - not only in the unoccupied wards but in those which were occupied - and in the passages the windows were all closed this fore day - the atmosphere in the mentioned wards such as must seriously retard the treatment of the Patients in it

The Premises generally are kept in an inferior manner when compared with similar Establishments - the Landrag. Purses Shaw Stairs. Passages and yards show that no attention has been paid to them.

In the Shaw Stairs there was a Dog within two of Dead and milk before it - Mr. Alge led Mr. Hamilton to believe that the dog was accidentally there whereas on further enquiry it would appear that it has been more or less kept and maintained at the Hospital for several weeks.

On Mr. Hamilton pointing out to the Porter the dirty state of the grounds of the Hospital the Porter stated that his time was so much occupied in making Pills and Compounding Medicine at the Dispensary that he could not attend to the state of the yards &c. If this statement be correct Mr. Hamilton thinks it worthy of attention

Ordered. The Board have learned with great surprise and regret that such a state of things should have been allowed to exist in the Fever Hospital - That the

Nurse is very much to blame for her great inattention and the Doctor must be also Considered blameable for not having reported her Conduct to the Board - He should not allow such a state of things to exist as "must seriously retard the Treatment of Patients" - That the Board desire to know from the Doctor the way in which he has the Porter engaged Compounding Medicine - if he thinks such employment suitable for him when it interferes with his ordinary duties - That the Board on enquiry have learned from the Porter that the Dog has been kept at the Hospital since last summer and that he has often seen the Nurses feed him - The Master is now directed to have the Dog removed at once and the Guardians Consider an investigation on oath to be necessary.

A Memorial was read from Ellen Corran an Inmate of the House the last 6 years who has become blind from sore eyes requesting to be sent to our Institution for the Blind at Liverpool

As to the ventilation of the Fever Ward, he did not like to interfere further than to request of the Nurse, which he did repeatedly to keep the windows open as much as possible particularly those of the lobby — and he generally found them open when visiting the Hospital — On the whole he began to state that he never found the Hospital so badly ventilated as on the occasion of the recent visit of Captain Hamilton — This explanation will show that it was the Fever Hospital and premises that were complained of and not the Workhouse — as the being under the Control of the Board and his supervision as Master — he is happy to state that the Workhouse and premises when visited by Captain Hamilton were in such a satisfactory state as not to be complained of by him.
