The admissions to relief were mostly of the ordinary class and several to the Fever Hospital who had been admitted there by the <sup>Relieving</sup> Officer since last Board day - and respectively entered and in most cases charged on the Division of Emigrants.

James Kelly aged 52 a single man had with a sore leg was brought up by the Relieving Officer - he came recommended by one of the Guardians for Newtownbarry. Mr. Macenthen - and on examination he was found to be from the Island of Kilbrannish and was admitted on the Division of Newtownbarry.

Peter Roche aged 36 an Epileptic was admitted on the Union at Large.

Ellen Bundergast aged 20 with an Infant illegitimate whose father William Drin lived at Kennedys of Tempney lived herself at Denis Kehoe in Doherty's Lathery - at the originally from Dolobrega. - but the father being now married would do nothing for her and she could not maintain herself and Infant without coming to the Workhouse. Admitted on Cleroche.

The Case of Mary Molau admitted last Board day on Marshabstown was brought under Consideration of the Board by the Guardian Mr. Morris Redmond - and upon investigation it having been found she had not lived the whole of the 3 years previous to her admission in the Union - and not having spent 30 months in any one Class Division she was ordered to be discharged from Marshabstown and to be admitted on the Union.

Uth. to belong to the Medical Officer of the Workhouse whereas Mr. Hamilton reported that it was the property of Dr. Cranfield one of the Dispensary Medical Officers and a Guardian of the Union.

The Commissioners apprehend that the Guardians may infer from another passage in the Letter referred to that the Workhouse was reported by Mr. Hamilton as being in an unsatisfactory and a neglected state on the occasion of his inspection and they therefore take this opportunity of informing the Guardians that Mr. Hamilton has reported to them that every portion of the Workhouse promises good evidence of close attention and active supervision.

The Commissioners will instruct Mr. Hamilton as requested by the Guardians to inquire into the circumstances connected with the keeping of the Log at the Town Hospital and the arrangements

arrangements that were made for the Caring and feeding of the Animal during the time he was at the Hospital - also as to the alleged employment by the Medical Officers of the Emancipated Dispensary of the Porter to the Fever Hospital to an extent that prevented him from paying proper attention to his immediate duties at the Hospital.

With regard to the Letters of Dr. Cranfield and Goodison to the Medical Officers of the Dispensary as inserted on the Guardians Supplemental Minutes of the 2<sup>d</sup> of the M<sup>th</sup>. in which those gentlemen express their surprise that Mr. Hammett would set before the Public a statement to the effect - "that the Porter of the Fever Hospital informed him that he could not attend to the duties of the Fever Hospital yards in consequence of his time being so largely occupied in Compounding Medicine for the Dispensary" - the Commissioners desire to observe that Mr. Hammett did no more than he was bound to do in the discharge of his duty in bringing the Porter's statement under the notice of the Commissioners and the Board of Guardians; and that he is in no way responsible for his statement subsequently appearing in a local Newspaper as a part of the proceedings of the Board of Guardians.

As to the assertion of Doctor Goodison and Cranfield that they had complained to Mr. Hammett of the incompetency of the Porter to fill his situation as Porter of the Emancipated Dispensary. Mr. Hammett informs the Commissioners that there must be some mistake on that point as he was not aware until his last visit to Emancorothy that the Porter of the Workhouse Fever Hospital had anything to do with the Dispensary - nor was he aware until then that Dr. Cranfield was one of the Medical Officers of that Dispensary and that had they made any complaint to him he could safely say that he would have directed them to the proper quarters to obtain redress.

She stated the girls did the mischief unknown to her. The Agriatrust disowned it in a few minutes - the Monitor was with them at the time but she did not call to attention of the Agriatrust to what had been done. Subsequently she contradicted herself on a material point - and it was found that after the Agriatrust had drawn her attention to the damage she permitted the girls to continue it.

Ordered that Jane Donohoe be discharged from the Workhouse having forfeited all claim to be supported there.
