Masters Report

Begged to refer the Board to the Report of the Rev. E. Ferrar in which he states that the School boys make noise which interrupted the Protestant Sermons at prayers. This occurred as before in consequence of the N. Catholic Clergyman attending at an early hour — it will therefore be necessary that arrangements be made for the Protestant and N. Catholic Clergymen to attend at the same hour as heretofore say 9 O'clock every Sunday and Holiday Morning also that the Schoolmaster be directed to be more particular to prevent a recurrence of same.

Ordered, The two Chaplains are Requested to make an arrangement by which they will have Divine Service at the same hour. The Clerk states ^{that in consequence of a verbal message received from the Porter from the Master he spoke to Mr Harris several times who at length fully engaged the threshing machine for Tuesday next but he at the same time stated that wet weather might cause a loss of time which he could not account for.} The Nurse being called before the Board states that she had taken Medicine to give to a Patient in the Female Probation Ward and it was while she was so engaged that the door had been left open. 
