The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 2295 to No. 2311 both inclusive by the signature of the Chairman, and counter-signature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined and authenticated, from No. 427 to No. 428, inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and counter-signature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read, to the following effect:—

That the Auditor had attended on Tuesday and Wednesday and audited the Union Accounts—that he expressed his satisfaction with the state of the Union generally and particularly as to the economy observed in the Medical departments of the Dispensary Districts as compared with other Unions of the same extent & population. He noticed a discrepancy in the valuation of the Enniscorthy Division which is in favour of the valuation 14695 £. and in the Rate Book 14634 £. and requires a minute of the Board authorising the reduction for dilapidated premises, houses down and in course of erection, and vacant tenements for the difference namely 61 £. which has been ascertained by the Collector previous to making the Rate last August.

I see by the report of our proceedings on Thursday last as published in the Emiscenthy News, a slight mistake regarding what I said in reference to the St. Mary's Fever Hospital. It is stated in substance that a Resolution proposed by me at the Meeting of the St. Mary's Dispensary Committee was omitted to be inserted on the minutes of the proceedings - I stated in Emiscenthy that it was not the omission of a Resolution I alluded to but the omission of a Notice of the case of Anne Carnoy as wrongly admitted into the Hospital of St. Mary's was totally omitted on the minutes of the proceedings sent to your Board and as a consequence to the P.L. Commissioners. The Notice I allude to was

written by the Rev^d Mr. Archdall and in my presence inserted in what I conceived were the Minutes of the days proceedings at N^o 10 Bury. I would not now feel it necessary to trouble either you or myself about this little mistake in your report but fearing the substitution of the word Resolutions for Notices might be made a handle of to give the go-by to a subject to which I wished to call the attention of the Guardians and Commissioners and in doing so I wished it to be particularly understood that I have no desire whatever to give Dr. Carry any unnecessary annoyance beyond what the faithful discharge of my own duty imperatively imposes on me so far from that (in as far as I am individually concerned) I would much rather contribute my quota of his salary to Dr. Carry & all such Medical Gentlemen for keeping our legitimate patients out of the Hospital in Health than when having them in it sick. But in sickness or health I mean never to be a party who will agree to saddle a Union with the expense of keeping people in that Hospital who should be in that of another Union nor would I say so much on the subject now but finding there is an impression abroad amongst the ratepayers that some Doctors get patients into Hospital who



A Farmer named Nugent residing in the Neighbourhood of St. Mary's called on him to request admission to the Hospital for his servant maid, Anne Caroy then in Fever. He told Nugent that he thought she should be sent to Shillelough Union Hospital who replied that she decidedly refused to go there and claimed admission to the St. Mary's Hospital on the grounds of her having been but 9 mo. living out of Emmisburgh Union and that for years previously she resided in that Union — that she was before in the St. Mary's Hospital some two or three years ago. — She being extremely ill in Fever and Nugent having declared he would not keep her on his house. The case became urgent and he admitted her considering her life to be in danger. Not being well acquainted with the law of chargeability he thought it better where human life was at stake to give her the benefit of any doubt he might have entertained on the subject. If in doing so he had made any mistake he exceedingly regretted it and he should endeavour in future to guard against a recurrence of it. — That at the time of her admission Nugent did not inform him of his application to Members of the Committee & their refusal.

On Consideration, the Board cautioned Dr. Caroy that he should be more particular respecting the admissions into that Hospital in future.
