The Board considered the applications for relief and granted admission to the Workhouse and Street Hospitals of the Union from the Relieving Officers application and Report Book during which nothing beyond the usual class of cases ordinarily admitted took place.

A Letter was read from the Medical Officer of Out-pat Dispensary District announcing the death of John Dempsey of Blackwater a Warden for that District and requesting the Board to appoint a successor.

Ordered. That Mr. Thomas Dempsey of Monanarry be appointed a Warden in room of John Dempsey deceased.

Letters were read from Messrs. Hatchell & Devereux Members of Parliament in reference to the Petition sent by the Board for presentation to the House of Commons. The former stated that he had presented the Petition against the Markets (Ireland) Bill. — that he had read and considered the statements contained in it, assuring the Board that he will devote his best attention to the Bill in its passage through Committee and will endeavour to carry out the views advocated in the Petition.

Mr. Devereux pledged himself also to support its prayer.

The Master's punishment Book on being produced showed that Margaret Brimmon, Mary Kavanagh, Eliza Kavanagh, Ellen Keill, Mary Anne Develin, Ellen Pender and Ellen Gollohar were charged

by the Matron for disobedience in refusing to go to work when she desired them and for insolence at same time — They were brought up and examined as also the Matron at considerable length — it appearing that the beginning of a spirit of combination to disobey should be the time to cut it short. — The Board resolved for example sake to all the other able-bodied women to discharge the ring-leaders from the Workhouse namely Mary Brimmon, Mary Kavanagh, Eliza Kavanagh, and Ellen Keill and seriously cautioned the other three Mary A. Develin, Ellen Pender & Ellen Gollohar that on the next complaint for a similar offence they would be also discharged — then they made fair promises.

The Chairman soon after signed the Orders and Cheques and the Board adjourned.

That the circular Letter of the P.L. Commissioners of the 31st ulto on the subject of the Workhouse Dietaries was shown to him by the Master and he fully concurred in the general views of the Commissioners. He recommended bread and Tea for breakfast for the Infirmary Class who are all on the Hall diet as the inadvisable objection to the Hall Diet is the Stomach — therefore he would give 3/4 lb Bread and a pint of Tea for breakfast and 3/4 lb of Bread and a pint of New Milk for dinner, with respect to the addition of meat to the Soup which agrees very well with the Lunatics he earnestly recommended it, and with regard to the use of Potatoes he would not offer any suggestion on at present particularly as the Bread Dietary now in use agrees with the Lunatics so well.

Ordered The suggestion of the Doctor is approved of and the Board now adopt the Tea and Meat Soup diet — the Master to provide the Tea &c and the Meat for soup

Francis Gallagher 39 single travelling from Belfast was found sick on the road by the Police at Donfarron, was reported by them to the Relieving Officer who went out there with a Donkey and Cart to bring him to the Workhouse but he refused to come.

The Relieving Officer was allowed the cost of the car 1/8.

Saml. Rigley aged 17 from Ballyhyland was bit by a horse. Had left the House 3 mo. since - was admitted.

Budget Tobin aged 80 widow confined to bed 5 months was from Ballindaggon the Relieving Officer produced a letter from Doctor Lang in which he stated that she

was not able to be removed to the Workhouse and that he considered her to be a fit object for Out door Relief.

Ordered. The Relieving Officer is directed to visit and if he finds the woman to be in the state represented to give relief to the extent of 2/6 and to report again this day week.

From a Report circulated amongst the Ratepayers concerning the Contractors to the House. He particularly request the attention of the Master and Medical Officer to be called to the Meat supplied for use of the pauper Inmates and also the Master is requested in future to lay before the Board occasionally for their inspection samples of all provisions supplied to the House.

The Master stated in reference thereto that he never received bad meat & if the Contractor sent a coarse part of the meat he at once returned it and compelled the Contractor to supply good meat instead and that during the time of Mr. Howell being a Contractor for three years he had no occasion to return meat oftener than about three times, that he did not require heavy fat meat as such would not be suitable for soup but always received good lean meat such as he considered most answerable for the use of the Inmates.

A Letter was read from the Oulart Dispensary Committee setting forth that after the transaction of the usual business was - Resolved
