Eliza Murphy 24 Single had an Infant that died yesterday, admitted on Fever

John Carter 19 Single was taken out by the Clerk nine months ago. Reported being an able bodied girl and in perfect health.

Ann Grannell 20 Widow and young child, left the house only 6 weeks since and could support herself out no longer, admitted on Enniscesty.

Margaret Reilly 20 Single left the house yesterday not having no residence to go to returned Admitted on Enniscesty.

The Masters Punishment Book was submitted to the Board from which it appeared that two girls Ellen King and Anne Byrne were reported by the Schoolmistress for Insolence and Disobedience, both were called before the Board and confronted by the Schoolmistress, after a full hearing of the case the Board ordered, That both the girls be reprimanded and as they have promised not to transgress again there was no punishment ordered.

Moved by Mr Hickley and seconded by Mr Crean and unanimously Resolved —

That the Rev J.C. Archdall be elected as Chairman for the ensuing year,

Moved by Mr Macatchen — seconded by Mr Atkin and unanimously Resolved

That Edward Carroll Esq be elected as Vice Chairman for the ensuing year,

Moved by Mr Hickley seconded by Mr Crean and carried unanimously that Mr Macatchen be appointed Secretary and Mr Atkin Assistant Secretary to the Committee for the ensuing year.

Moved by Mr Langford seconded by Mr Power and passed unanimously, That in consequence of the absence of our Chairman the Rev J.C. Archdall and the small number of members present at this meeting we deem it prudent to postpone the reconsideration of the Commissioners letter regarding the division of the District into Vaccination Stations until our Chairman be present and another extraordinary meeting be called for that purpose.

Resolved, That the Board of Guardians be requested to execute the repairs required at the St. Mary Fever Hospital as recommended by Mr Bolger in his report viz Levelling and Graveling the yard, building part of the boundary wall hanging a gate and whitewashing the Hospital and repairing part of the Ceiling.

We beg to call the attention of the Board to a small Bill of Thomas Connors furnished some time ago for repairing the roof and not yet paid,



Ordinary Proceedings.

The Board proceeded with the consideration of claims of applicants for relief in the Workhouse and Poor Hospitals of the Union.

Paul Cagley aged 60 lived in England and followed labouring work as a navvy in various places there during the last 30 years. The last place was at Liverpool and having got ill had to go for relief into the Workhouse at West Derby where he was allowed to remain for a period of 5 weeks when they discovered he was a native of Ireland. He was brought before the Board of Guardians for examination and subsequently before a Magistrate and obliged to answer on oath. He was then taken by the Relieving Officer down to the Dock & put on board the Wexford Boat with some bread & cheese and one shilling in money. On arriving in Wexford he was directed to go to Doctor Crean who said he could do nothing for him. He then came on to Galbally in this Union where he had a brother who is now very poor and after stopping with him a few days he came to the Workhouse.

The Man appearing to the Board as the wreck of a once powerful and athletic labourer was admitted to the House on the Union at Large.

Bridget Doyle aged 22 single pregnant came from Derna where she lived one month, was in Clope at Mr. Rudds for 2 months, was at Mr. Ronsomes in the townland of Dories 3 months at P. Murphy's in Lower Derna 9 months, at Knockduff Ballinduffon 12 months & for 6 months previously in the same Division with Mr. Edm. Doyle lived also for 6 months with Mr. Sutton Wheelagour Division of Roscor. Her father is Donl. Doyle Knockduff and the father of the Infant she carries is Donl. Ronsome of Dories near Derna. Admitted on Ballinduffon.

Ellen Ward aged 25 and young child — Deserted by her husband, well served Informations. Admitted on Enniscahy.

A Bill of meat supplied by Mr. Sherman for the Inmates Dinner on Easter Sunday was submitted to the Board for payment at 5¹/₂ p^r lb. upon reference to the Contract it was found to be 4 p^r lb and the Board decided they have not the power to make him any advance in price beyond his contract by which he is bound to supply all meat required by the Master at 4 p^r pound.

James Byrne of Mangon applied for the girl Catherine Sacey aged 13 years, she was brought before the Board & expressed a desire to be sent out to earn her bread to Mr. Byrne who is her Uncle. She had been two years in the School and having been examined she could scarcely read or write.

Ordered. Clothing allowed to the value of 15/- and on consequence of the deficiency exhibited by this Girl — the Guardians will on the first Thursday every month call for some of the school girls to examine what progress they are making and the master is requested to bring the matter under the notice of the Board fearing it should be omitted on the days stated.

A Claim was put forward from the Derna Committee for payment of £1 — for repairs on the Dispensary, another for 10/- for half a ton of coals for St. Barry Dispensary & from the Enniscahy Dispensary Committee for £1 — for half a ton of coals for Clondow and half a ton for Oylegate Branch Dispensaries used last winter.

Ordered. That the Clerk write to those several Committees informing them that they should make a regular requisition to the Board for repairs or supplies of any kind whatsoever and that otherwise payment must be refused.

A Report was submitted to the Board that a workman of Mr. Cronin (a Guardian) named John Darrell was unfortunately killed near Newtown Barry by a fall from a car on the 29th ult. The occurrence was witnessed by Mr. M. Hill (another Guardian) who very promptly mounted the horse and rode into St. Barry for Doctor Carey who

27 told him he would not go¹² with him unless he was just paid. Mr. Keill then went to a member of the Dispenary Committee in St. Barry and obtained a ticket with which he returned to the Doctor who said that as the ticket was not presented before 10 O'Clock A.M. he would not attend, and it was only when Mr. Keill told him that he was a member of the Board of Guardians and considered as the case was urgent he was bound to attend that he reluctantly complied.

Ordered. To be placed on the Minutes a copy to be sent to Doctor Barry for an explanation and that the attention of the Commissioners is particularly directed to the case.
