Beg'd to call the attention of the Board to the necessity of having a stairs or stepladder put up in the inside Male Infirmary Ward in order ~~in order~~ that the male inmates therein may have access to the Ward over it without coming thro the outer Ward & yard. There is a Stairs in the store which he thinks will answer with a little addition.

There are six wheelbarrows and four handbarrows required for use of the Establishment as those in use are worn out.

The three handcarts require repairs new wheels &c.

The Bath in the male Probation Ward requires a new bottom.

As a member of the Agricultural Committee of this Board I have for some time omitted to visit the Farm with the view of more correctly judging of the Master's merits in the Agricultural department contrasted with its previous management and it affords me much pleasure now to be able to say I have been agreeably surprised by the superior appearance of most of the Crops at this unpropitious season generally, but with the Wheat, Oats & meadow Crops especially. Having further directed my attention to the Dietary of the classes under two years, from 2 to 5 — from 5 to 9 and from 9 to 15. I have considered the Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:— the necessity in consultation with the Master of increasing their Bread to a small extent and would respectfully suggest that class 4 would get 10 oz. class 5-8 oz. and class 6-6 oz each for dinner every day and that class 7 or under two years would get 10 oz daily.

Ordered. The increased quantity of bread allowed.

Masters Report

Having considered it my duty to call the attention of the Medical Officer to the quantity of Bread allowed to the children for dinner viz children from 9 to 15 receive only 8 oz. from 5 to 9. 6 oz. — from 2 to 5 — 5 oz and under two. 2 oz. The latter gets 4 meals a day making a total of 8 oz daily. I therefore respectfully beg leave to bring before

you a boy of each class and the quantity of Bread allowed to them for dinner - so that the Board may judge of the matter. As the condition of the poorer classes is much better outside than it has been in former years - he considered a small increase would be no inducement for parties to come into the House, particularly as it is intended for children only. As to the proposed increase - see Medical Officers Report - The Board has lately increased quantity of Bread allowed to the able-bodied men also to the Infirm Classes. He therefore trusted that they will consider the propriety of increasing that of the children as they are the only class at present in the House that may hereafter become useful members of society. The additional expence at the present numbers would be about $\frac{1}{2}$ a day altogether.

As the meadow land is fit to cut and as there are 10 statute acres under grass it will be necessary to employ a man for a few days to assist in mowing it.

In consequence of the Kitchen being whitewashed today he was obliged to give out Butter & Milk for dinner as the Soup could not be made the roof having to be cleared down.

He handed over to the Clerk the sum of £1-00 received from Anne Sackley for Cabbage, making a total of £7-00 paid which leaves a Balance of £1-15/- still due by her.

Dated 15th June 1859 } Enclosing copy of a letter addressed to the Newnham Bury Dispensary Committee in reference to an enquiry held by Doctor Hill into a charge made against Dr. Carry in the case of a man named Small deceased.

Ordered. In reference to this letter on the subject of the Guardians complaint of the conduct of Doctor Carry on the evidence taken by Dr. Hill medical Inspector - the Guardians feel called on to record their opinion that whilst the Law exonerates Dr. Carry from a neglect of duty as a medical Officer of the Union in refusing to attend a case without a visiting ticket - they regret that any Officer in the service of the Union should not have been prompted by feelings of humanity rather than by a mercenary motive in such an urgent case.

A Letter was read from Dr. Taylor Dispensary medical Officer at Iweris as requested by the Board in explanation of the case of

Patrick Costelloe driver of the mail Car, stating that he was at a loss to know what information was exactly required but that the history of his case so long as Costelloe remained in the Derna District - was just. He was not called on officially to attend him, not so much as asked by any person to visit him; but the moment he was told of the accident he hurried off to render him any assistance in his power and remained until he was taken to the nearest house - made comfortable in bed and gave directions what ought to be done for him.

He again visited him very late that evening and also early on the following day and presided for him. Then as to the question "how he disposed of the case?" he really felt unable to comprehend the question not having any power to make a disposition of him, but those to whom that power belonged used their discretion by removing him home to Enniscorthy in the middle of that (the second day) and personally he knew nothing of him since.

right of being on the list of voters by occupancy or had forfeited their right by nonpayment of Rates at the close of last year's list in July.

These parties were shown by the books to have had no injustice done to them. From the entire number we could not discover more than 4 cases of persons who having the right to be on the Register were omitted last year. This it appears to us was caused by a change of Collectors where the newly appointed ones could not give the necessary local information and we have great satisfaction in stating that we do not trace a single case to wilful or corrupt neglect of duty and we are therefore relieved from any necessity of recommending to the Board a reference on the case to the Assistant Barrister to exercise the authority which he alone possesses to control ^{and} correct abuses in such cases.

At the same time we beg to observe that the task of preparing a complete Registration and of keeping it corrected each year is one of considerable difficulty and we strongly recommend a greater attention by the Ratepayers to the provisions of the Registration Act for remedying defects by putting Lists of Voters on the 22nd July each year for 14 days, and we earnestly call on the Ratepayers to examine those lists and should any omission have taken place to give notice immediately to the Clerk of the Union who will point out the manner in which the omission may be filled up and the Register be thereby rendered full & complete each year.

In the girls school the proficiency is also low but the Mistress M^{rs} Harris who has been but lately appointed is adhering to the Official course of instruction and her pupils are evidently making progress. He shall expect a decided improvement in both schools at his

next meet.

Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded to the consideration of applications for relief from the Relieving Officers Books and admitted to the Workhouse and Fever Hospital of the Union. Nothing presented itself this day beyond the ordinary class of cases applying for relief.
