## Ordinary Proceedings

Mr Doyle guardian for Bree gave notice that he will on Thursday the 28<sup>th</sup> Inst. move that Bridget Redmond and child be brought up and examined in order to ascertain her proper chargeability, she being now charged on Bree which he believes to be in error.

On examination into the Collectors accounts and finding no lodgment had been made this week it was Ordered. That such



Masters Report

Mr. Ponder sent word both by  
 the Clerk and Porter to stop drawing water  
 from the Millstream and stated that it inter-  
 fered with the working of the Mills—that  
 the weather was so dry there was not water  
 to turn one pair of stones. He regretted  
 to state that he could not comply with  
 Mr. Ponder's request and had to continue  
 drawing the water—that is—for use of the  
 inmates only as they could not do without  
 food. He therefore trusted that the Board  
 will adopt means to afford a sufficient  
 supply of water independent of that got from  
 the millstream.

He had completed harvesting the grain  
 crop with the exception of about one Road  
 of wheat which was sown in Spring and



will not be fit to cut for a few days. There are about 60 Barrels of wheat and about 50 Barrels of Oats. He would suggest that it be threshed as soon as convenient as the House is in great need of straw - the beds not having been changed for the last two months and they require a regular clearing out.

There were no Board Orders filled last Board day for 2 suits of clothing then granted.

Mr. O. Blakey, proposes taking out a boy named Joseph Pender aged 14 and charged on Wilbrush & Division.

Ordered. To employ the threshing Machine and the Board have a proper supply of water under consideration today. The Auctioneers Bill of sales of Hay was submitted to the Board and read. It amounted to £60.19.6 and was very satisfactory - the amount had been all collected and lodged with Treasurer.

that they carefully examined the Wards, Kitchen, Nurse Rooms &c and found all in a perfect state of good order & cleanliness except the Kitchen Floor, that the House has been thoroughly repaired and is now in good working condition - newly painted, whitewashed, floors newly tiled - slating made perfect, chimneys rebuilt and carpentry repairs well done. They had called the Trademans before them and compared their Bills with their Contracts and recommended the Board to discharge their accounts viz

The Committee appointed last Board day for the purpose of procuring an efficient supply of water to the Workhouse attended on Tuesday last and visited that part of the building where the Well and Cistern are placed - the Contractor from Wexford had his men raising the old timber pump.

The Committee visited the Infirmary where a supply of fresh water is much needed particularly for the Sick Wards. They also visited the new well near the Mill Race where it is expected good water may be had if means were used to take it up.

On their return to the Board room the Committee proceeded to business and called up the Contractor who was closely examined on each particular of the proposed Hydraulic Works, after which they entered into the following report and directed it to be submitted to the Board's consideration this day.

Your Committee having met and had an interview with Mr. Smiott and inspected the timber Pump & raised from the well - beg to state that the timber Pump appears to be sound, one of the parts has a split and was repaired and if again used will require some further repairs.

The Committee think it would be for the advantage of the Union to erect a pump of a better construction and requiring less labour and that a double action <sup>force</sup> pump that would cost probably £50.- should be got for the purpose whereby the present kitchen room would not be required and a Contractor should give an engagement for 3 years and it would not require repairs for many years.

Your Committee have examined the manner in which the Infirmary is now supplied with water. The Master reports that the recourse of females to the men's yard for the purpose of getting water is very objectionable. The Doctor also reports the necessity of a better supply of water and particularly for the use of a shower bath for the Female Wards. The Committee have therefore consulted your Plumber Mr. Smiott who states that a Cistern may be set in the Infirmary Kitchen immediately over the Bath Boiler which being supplied by an iron pipe from the main Cistern would give water in the kitchen and a pipe outside in the yard to a shower bath - the entire cost of this would not exceed £18.- and your Committee recommended its utility.

They have also examined the well near the Mill Race and ascertained that there is not any connexion between them - the water in the well now stands on a higher



level than the surface of the Mill Race, should the Guardians decide to erect a Force Pump at the House - they suggest that the master be allowed to have the present well pumped out - sunk about 10 feet and one of the timber joints of the present pump sunk in the well for the summer supply of the House in dry seasons and on the land. your Committee would postpone this extra work but the present is the proper and most economic season for such work - this expense should not exceed £3-

## Visitors Report

I have visited the Farm today with  
 the view of seeing how far my anticipations re-  
 garding the crops as noticed in my last report  
 would be borne out and I am happy to say  
 those anticipations were not only fully borne  
 out but exceeded, especially in the Corn  
 crops now so well harvested and in the hay  
 crop so profitably disposed of. - Dry as  
 the weather was when my last Report was written  
 - I had little idea of such drought continuing

## Visitors Report

As no boys now remain in the School but those of very limited capacity and require-ments a high standard of intelligence cannot be expected but nevertheless they evince a very fair acquaintance with the principles of the work they have been engaged in on the Farm. Their industrial training continues to be carried out in the most systematic and efficient manner.

The Farm management continues to be conducted in a most creditable and satisfactory manner. The green crops notwithstanding some partial failures (obviously the result of the unfavorable summer) are on the whole the best I have seen in this district of Country, and the clean and perfect manner in which their after culture is carried out is most praiseworthy considering that it is performed almost exclusively by pauper labour. The scene of busy industry which I witnessed on my arrival here today was most gratifying. I will recommend a gratuity for the half-year ended 31<sup>st</sup> March last.

That on the 9<sup>th</sup> Inst a little girl  
came to him stating the woman  
to be very ill in a Cabin in Wood-  
lane that he immediately went



to visit her and found her in a destitute condition and at once brought her in a car to the Workhouse and gave her a ticket of admission.

## Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded with the admission of paupers to relief in the Workhouse and Fever Hospitals of the Union.

Mary Finnes came before the Board with a child aged 3 years for admission to the Workhouse, the child was left with her by Bridget Kavanagh who stated at the time that she was its mother and gave her five shillings desiring her to wash some clothing for it and take care of it until she should come again - it was now six weeks since that occurred but the mother had not come according to promise and it appeared she had deserted the child altogether.

Ordered. Admission refused until the Relieving Officer makes further enquiry.

William Leary aged 16 and Ellen Ormond aged 17 both blind inmates of the Workhouse were brought up by the Master. They were examined by Captain Hamilton and the Board. Both were desirous to be sent to an Asylum for the blind. One was charged on the Ennisworthy and the other on the Castle - Talbot Division.

Ordered. The Clerk to write to the Secretary of the Institution for the blind, Dominic F. Dublin and submit their Prospectus to the Board for consideration on this day fortnight.

Mr. Jordan Guardian for Ballindaggin informed the Board that a sum of money had been received by two brothers outside the Workhouse from their mother in Canada to bring them out to her, that they had a younger brother named William Doyle aged 9 yrs an inmate of this House, that they would take him with them if the Board assisted in paying the expense of emigration.

Ordered. A sum of £4.10/- is considered sufficient to send out the boy under charge of his brothers to Canada and the Commissioners are requested to sanction such Outlay.

Tenders for putting up a Timber Pump in the Workhouse Well were considered and that from Mr. Peter Lacey accepted for the sum of £12. Mr. Lacey to give security for doing the work in a proper and efficient manner, and provided the proper number of Red Pine Stays be put in - the work to be finished by this day fortnight.

A Order was read for putting up a Pump in the well on the Farm but owing to its contiguity to the Mill Race the consideration was postponed.

The Board soon after separated.
