The Contractor for the pump appeared before the Board for the purpose of recommending that the timber be bound on 10 or 11 places with Iron Shearles 2 in by 1/2 in. that he had ascer- tained from the smith Bradford they can be supplied at 2/- each - on consideration it was -

Ordered. That Mr. Leacy find the Iron himself and get the shearles made and put on, for which extra work they will allow him One Pound to which he agreed.

On examination into the Collectors accounts it was found that several sums will have to be abated by the Board, in consequence of premises unoccupied at time of making the Rate, and for unrecover- able arrears on the Ballindaggon Division where the Magistrates granted decrees for only two years arrears in cases where the Immediate Assessor was rated and the property has now passed through the Landed Estates Court into other hands.

Ordered. The Clerk to write to the Collectors to furnish their lists of arrears before Thursday next and attend for putting them into the new Books also to attend the Board for explanation of those arrears which they think unrecoverable.

Masters Report

An Inmate named Myles Murphy died suddenly on Sunday night last - when reported to him by the man in charge he immediately sent for the Medical Officer who after examination of the body did not

thought it necessary to have an Inquest. He then sent word to his friends who came and had his remains interred in the family burial ground.

The deceased was an Idiot subject to Epileptic fits, he had only returned from the Fever Hospital on the 29th July last after a severe attack of Fever but still continued very weak and was consequently placed in No. 1 Infirmary diet with meat, see Medical Officers Report.

A fortnight has elapsed and the Contractor has not yet put up the pumps. He has men at work bucketing out the water for the last two days - and he stated to him this morning that he expected to have it put up by next Saturday.

He began to state that he had procured 5 stone of wool on last Fair day at 22/- per stone for which he trusted the Board will order payment. He thinks he will be able to procure 5 stone more if the Board think proper which would last about 3 months when there will likely be a change in the price of that article.

The expense of painting the Communion Rails, cleaning & varnishing the Altar and two vestry doors is 15/- the Board finding materials.

Ordered. The Wool allowed and the painting of the Altar Rails allowed.

A Certificate was read respecting the case from Thomas of Cranfield Esq. M.D. in which he also guaranteed to pay for her relief whilst in the Infirmary.

Ordered. That the Relief given to Mary Doyle of Ballynure be Relief by way of Loan.

On the Motion of Mr. Stelly Guardian for Castle Salbot Mary Murphy who was admitted to relief in the Workhouse last Board day chargeable to that Division was called before the Board and examined, when it was found that she belonged to the Division of Ballyhuskard.

Ordered. That the Register be corrected in the case of Mary Murphy by her transfer from Castle Salbot to Ballyhuskard, also as stated in the Commissioners Letter dated 7th Inst No 19975. That the chargeability of Ellen Pearce be transferred from the Union at Large and be placed on the Division of Ennisceorty.

A Letter was read from Messrs Elliott Solicitors stating that in the case of the Guardians against P. J. Colclough M. Brooming who has charge of the sale of the Estate had given consent to the payment of £12-7-10 in discharge of the arrears of Poor Rate due on the townland of Coolicarnoy and an order on the Receiver for payment but that just now he could not find where the Receiver (Mr. Corbett) was.

Ordered. That the Clerk make enquiring from Mr. Jordan the Guardian for Ballindaggon and report to the Board this day week.

A Letter was read from the Secretary of the Asylum for the Blind Dominic Street, Dublin acknowledging receipt of the Descriptive papers respecting the boy William Leary and girl Ellen Ormond which he should submit to the Committee at their meeting to be held on Wednesday the 7th Inst after which he will report the result to the Board.

A Letter was read from Bridget Kelly Wardenmaid at the Protestant Bury Fever Hospital stating that in consequence of the Head Nurse continually quarrelling with her she was obliged to give a month's notice of resignation of her Office.

Ordered. The Resignation of Bridget Kelly accepted — the Clerk to advertise for a Wardenmaid to be considered on this day fortnight.

A Letter was read from John Byrne Master Shoemaker giving notice of his intention to resign that Office.

Ordered. The Clerk to advertise for a Master Shoemaker to work 6 hours a day from 8 O'Clock in the morning until 2 O'Clock in the afternoon and instruct the boys during that time. A good Character to be given to Mr Byrne who has faithfully discharged the duties of the Situation the last 8 years.
