## Masters Report

He beg<sup>d</sup> to state that the timber Pump has been put up and appears to give a good supply of water altho the Contractor has not completed the work yet. — He would suggest that a Committee or some other person be appointed to inspect what has been done as he prevented the Contractor from covering the well until the work is inspected. — As the half year will end on the 29<sup>th</sup> Inst. he requested that a Committee be appointed to take stock of clothing &c as he will endeavour to have them collected and ready for inspection as soon as possible.

That as he had been more or less unwell the last fortnight and as



he omitted to apply for leave to go to the sea, he hoped the Board will have no objection to allow him to absent himself a few evenings in the week for the purpose of taking a drive into the country.

Ordered. Leave granted. A Committee consisting of Messrs Bolger & Doran were appointed to view and inspect the pump accompanied by the Master who represented to the Committee that the Stays were placed on the flat instead of on the edge — the Contractor who was also present stated that it was in consequence of the well having been lined with flat stones which would be loosened much if the Stays were placed on edge and he considered it was a better way to put them as he had done on the flat. He also undertook to keep all in good and perfect order for 12 months. In consequence the Committee recommended a payment of £8 on acc<sup>t</sup> until the whole is covered in — the Report of the Committee is considered satisfactory and confirmed by the Board.

Messrs Bolger and More were appointed a Committee to take stock on the 29<sup>th</sup> as requested by the Master and they agreed to attend.

Daniel Millwood a boy of 10 years old from Kellan whose father was a Policeman - was admitted to Dever Hospital on the Union. Relief given to him to be by way of Loan.

Mary Danell aged 23. single - Blind - left the House about 2 months ago - was admitted on the Union.

Sarah Kavanagh aged 12 was taken out to service only last week - returned as being unable to do the work she was put to.

Admitted on Kilcormack.

Don't Cagley 60. married. left the House last April was now out of employment and destitute.

Admitted on the Union.

The case of Mary Murphy as to her proper chargeability was brought under consideration by Mr. Doyle after investigation it was moved by Mr. Bolger and seconded by Mr. Doyle

That the Reporter be altered as to the chargeability of Mary Murphy by discharging her from the Loops and admitting her on the Bree & Division.

Letter read from Geo Godfrey Place Secretary to the Institution for the blind Dominic St. Dublin. Informing the Board that the 2 very sheets on behalf of Mrs. Leary and Ellen Ormond blind inmates of the Ennisenthy Workhouse were laid before the Committee who directed them to be admitted. The Committee however must ask the Guardians not to send up the girl for a few weeks as the female Establishment in Dominic St. is completely full and the new and extensive premises at Portobello altho in course of preparation for a female Asylum will not be ready until next month. The Committee will then have accommodation for more than One Hundred additional inmates. The Boy may be sent up at any time to St. Joseph's Gloucester and will be obliged by being informed of the day and hour at which he will be likely to arrive there.

Ordered. The Clerk to write again requesting to be informed as to the particulars of Clothing and Outfit required on Entrance.



The Clerk requested a week's leave of absence.

Ordered. Leave granted.

Ordered. That the list of Rates arrears, abatements and Poundages be recorded on the Minutes agreeably to the direction given to the Clerk on the 1<sup>st</sup> Inst. and we are of opinion the sums abated are irrecoverable as having been made on vacant houses, houses thrown down and where the Guardians have failed in recovering before the Petty and Quarter Sessions from Parties who were brought before those courts as occupiers or as immediate Lessors and the Guardians have been dismissed.

In England & Scotland the Law Compels a man to support his illegitimate Offspring and the Guardians think if petitions were presented from the different poor Law Unions in this country to Parliament next Session some plan might be devised to remedy this growing evil by introducing a Clause into the contemplated poor Law Amendment Act.

stated that it was owing to the quality of meal and the quantity used for Mr 2 Claf. He is strongly of an opinion that not less than 8 qrs of meal to a quart of water could make good Stabont for the Inmates.

## Masters Report.

He beg<sup>d</sup> to state with reference to the Medical Officers Report that the Stabont was not as good the last week as usual — which is owing to the quality of the meal supplied — yet he cannot attribute any blame to the Contractor as he delivered it to be equal to sample but not a description suited to this House where there is a fixed allowance, — As to the additional quantity of meal recommended by the Doctor he would be only about 4 lbs a day.



Heretofore the Stewage for adult females was made in a separate Boiler and they received the allowance of 7 lbs meal to the quart of water but now the numbers being so small it is all made together in the Boiler - so that they receive the same quality of Stewage as the other classes altho they are allowed less meal in proportion to the quantity of water. He begs to lay before the Board a calculation showing the proportion of meal and water allowed for each class also a sample of the meal & Stewage made from it.

As there is a large number of shoes on hands at present requiring repairs and being much wanted for all classes it is much to be recommended that advertisements be issued for carrying at least 100 pairs - the boys being so few & small are by no means able to get through the work.

As the hours have been changed for the attendance of the tradesmen he begs to submit a statement showing the hours at which the boys rise - go to work - &c viz. - they rise at 6 O'Clock a.m. - then they are occupied two hours folding their Beds - cleaning themselves - calling the Roll & at prayers - Breakfast at 8 O'Clock - after which they go to their respective trades and farm work where they remain until past 1 P.M. - Dinner at 2 O'Clock and school from 2 to 6 O'Clock - there is no change made in the female school.

As the season for ploughing land intended for grain crop is now advancing and a great deal of ploughing to be done on the farm and as the old Pony is quite unfit for such work - being so small and weak and as he had quite enough for him to do collecting green crops - carting manure &c he would suggest for consideration of the Board the necessity of procuring a good strong horse suitable for such work.

## Ordinary Proceedings.

The Board proceeded with the admission of Applicants to Relief in the Workhouse and Fever Hospital of the Union.

Anne Kehoe aged 40 and 2 children who were deserted by their father - admitted provisionally, now confirmed & admitted on Emiscorthy.

Bridget Storrmy aged 48 and James Redmond aged 16 were both admitted to Oulart Fever Hospital.

Elyw Earl aged 12 and Jas Doyle aged 40 were admitted to Emiscorthy Fever Hospital.

Tho. Jylaud & Elizabeth his wife left the Friar last July - both appeared destitute and the husband sickly - admitted to Workhouse on the Union.

Margaret Mehan aged 40 had been confined to bed 3 weeks, her husband a nailor appeared for her requesting that she and an Infant might be taken in. The Board agreed to take the wife in if he guaranteed to pay 2/- a week and give Relief by way of Loan.



David Culbert aged 27 and wife Mary same age — He had been in the Militia — and had no means of earning his bread, Admitted on the Union.

A Letter was read from the St. J. Barry Dever Hospital Committee stating that Bridget Kelly who had resigned the situation of Wardsmaid about 4 weeks ago and who had subsequently withdrawn her resignation and consented to remain — had left the Hospital altogether on Saturday last.

Ordered. Advertisements to issue for a Wardsmaid at St. J. Barry Hospital.

Tenders to supply 200 Barrels of Lime on the Workhouse Farm were considered and that from Mr. Thomas Plummer accepted at 1/7 per Imperial Statute Barrel.

The Finance Committee had under consideration a Bill put forward for a Ton of Coals supplied to the St. J. Barry Dispensary by Mrs. Conran but on reference to her Contract it was found she was bound to provide fuel and her Bill was accordingly rejected.

Ordered. Leave granted, the Master to place a Monitor in charge of the boys school.

Mr. Lacey applied for payment of a small Balance due to him for the Pump work — a Committee was appointed who proceeded to view the work, who reported it to be incomplete but directed him to be paid when the Master reports it finished.

Mr. Donovan applied for Professional assistance in the case of Appeal against the Rating on the Corvus at Ennisceorthy but the Board considering they had a clear case to defend declined incurring further expence than his own professional services on the occasion.

An Application for Out-door Relief was made by Margt. Talon of Dorrestatstown and a Certificate was put in from Doctor Stock which however did not state that her life would be endangered by removal to the Workhouse.

Ordered. Out door Relief cannot be given in this case without a fortnights notice to rescind the Resolution of the Board made to



provide against Out door Relief unless on a Certificate of a Medical Officer that removal of the Patient to the Workhouse would be attended with danger to life.

A Letter was read from the General Valuation Office Dublin pointing out the necessity for immediate attention to the revision of the existing valuation by the several Rate Collectors of the Union transmitting their lists of cases in their respective districts where revision is required. Also that all Rate Payers who require revision of their tenements should give notice in writing as soon as possible.

Ordered. The Clerk to get 100 Placards printed and forward same to the Collectors for posting throughout the Union.
