She was directed to take charge on Monday next and the Master to take Stock at the Hospital that day and deliver them into her custody.



Sir

I am prevented from attending the Board next Thursday being obliged to go to Woodstown on business.

With regard however to the question of turning the present Hall into a Chapel I do not see much difficulty provided the Guardians consent to the expence.

It seems that the Commissioners are in error with regard to the available dimensions of the Hall and if so this would be a ground for asking them to reconsider their Letter and allow the two spare rooms to be used as a dining Hall as the present Hall is considerably shorter than they supposed. Should they on this ground allow this to be done the expence of the alteration will be trifling — but should they object the Guardians would then have to consider the propriety of enlarging the Hall according to the plan and a builder would estimate the expence — I still think that the original proposal was one that was the simplest and least expence. I shall be at Enniscahy on the following Board day.

Ordered. Having read the Commissioners Letter and examined the plan forwarded for the formation of a Chapel & having fully considered the subject We beg to state that the Guardians some years ago converted a portion of the Dining Hall about 11 feet in length into two vestries for the accommodation of the Clergy and built a partition wall in which the Altar is placed at present, they have also caused a Communion Rail to be put up at 11 feet from the Altar with every accommodation for a Chapel which arrangement perhaps the Commissioners may have overlooked so that taking off 22 feet the space occupied by vestries, Altar & Sacristies — 28 feet only would remain for a Chapel. The adoption of their plan would cause considerable inconvenience and expence which the Guardians are not disposed to incur. The vestries, Communion Rail, Altar, Surgery, Nurses Room and Croft Walls should be all removed and similar apartments provided elsewhere which with the additional Aisles recommended to be placed at both sides of the Dining Hall as shown on plan would cost a large sum whereas the plan the Guardians propose to adopt will be only the cost of a brick partition raised to the height of the apartment. The Guardians under these circumstances propose to place a New Door leading to the mens yard opposite that at the female side with a brick partition as mentioned above and shown on the plan, leaving a space of 60 feet for a Chapel and 27 feet for a passage into male & female yards or to be used for any other purpose the Commissioners may desire, by which arrangement there would be a considerable saving of expence and much better accommodation, provided the Commissioners allow the two large rooms now vacant to be

used as dining Rooms more particularly as they adjoin the male & female Halls and as the Chapel is already complete with exception of the partition and new door. The Rooms originally designed as Schools have been long superseded for that purpose by commodious ones in the new buildings. They are no longer necessary as workrooms and should at any time an unusual pressure render them necessary for that purpose the Guardians will be always ready to provide for the contingency.

Daniel Nolan 20. - single who had been provisionally admitted from the effects of a sore foot and not being able to work. admitted on the Union.

Anty Connolly 30 single servant. pregnant. lived last year in Crane and the year previous in Marshalstown. admitted on Tinnacross.

James Keenan married laborer from Templemore - worked in Rofs with Mr Roche from 1st September 1857 to the month of June 1858. - is a Malster admitted on the Union.

Catherine Kelly 28 single a servant was confined to bed the last 18 months in Enniscorthy. had lived four years previously with Mr Robinson Bryanstown. a Certificate was produced from the Doctor and Priest that she was unable to be removed to the Workhouse. Admitted to Out door Relief for a week until next Board day the Relieving Officer to visit and report again on the question of residence next Board day.

Oliver Foley 35. single, Shoemaker - admitted provisionally - from New St with pains admitted on Enniscorthy.

Mary Oakes 16 single - her father confined to bed the last fortnight in Drogheda. - admitted on Enniscorthy.

Mary Byrne 16 - was taken out of the House last harvest by Mr Mill of Craon near Duns and hired her at 7/6 a quarter she being then an inmate of the Workhouse. the agreement was that she should be kept for a year at that rate upon which the Board gave her a new suit of clothing going out. She had been there five months and received but 8/- Mr Mill told her last week that he would pay her no more wages but that she might stop if she liked without wages.

That having further considered the necessity of providing a Chapel for the inmates the Guardians still adhere to their former proposition viz. to erect no new buildings outside but to take the Chapel of the Dining Hall — and now propose instead of a brick Partition to put up a movable sliding partition in the Dining Hall to the height of the girder, divided into 7 parts which will require to be framed, those adjoining each wall to be 3 feet in width and be made stationary, the remaining five to be made 3 feet each, four of them to act on Rollers or Pulleys and the other one to be a folding frame which will answer as a door. The space between the girder, Queenpost and Principals to be filled up with the old sashes now in store, by this arrangement there will be 33 feet by 22 for a Chapel and 32 feet by 22 for a Dining Hall in which 100 inmates can dine at once and is sufficiently large to afford accommodation to the present numbers without any additional Buildings and should the numbers increase which is very improbable the partition can be very easily removed. The Clerk to send the plan to the Commissioners for their information.
