 supported at the Public expence should be paid  
 for under the Provisions of the Medical Charities  
 Act now embodied in the Laws for relief of the  
 destitute Poor, which having been read  
 from the Chair and put was unanimously  
 carried.

Resolved. That in the opinion of  
 this Board the Law of Affiliation as to bastard  
 children should be assimilated to that now  
 in force in England and this Board will be  
 obliged to the J.P. Commissioners to inform  
 them if they think the Government are about  
 to introduce a Bill for that purpose.

I regret that circumstances over  
 which I have no control will prevent my  
 attendance at the Board on Thursday next &  
 take an humble part in discussing the important  
 motion which Mr. Maher has given notice of  
 there is but one other Guardian in the entire Union  
 of Emiscorthy Ex Officio or otherwise whose  
 position regarding the same motion could be  
 so singular shall I say so anomalous as mine.

I vote for building a District Lunatic  
 Asylum for Wickford separating its patients  
 from Carlow - I should vote against the interest  
 not only of the Ratepayers of this Electoral  
 Division but against the interests of every County  
 Grp. Payer in the whole County Carlow yet to  
 vote against it would be against my own Con-  
 science believing I would be doing an injury  
 to every Grp. payer in the County Wickford  
 and performing an act of inhumanity towards  
 the most helpless and most to be commiserated  
 class in existence. - I mean the Poor Wickford  
 Lunatics. But "Fiat Justitia, ruat Caelum."  
 is my motto in this respect and vote for the motion.



I would if present but subject to one condition which I will glance at,

Another and a still more anomalous case will present itself relative to this Electoral Division in the event of the separation of the Wexford Sanatorium from Carlow - that is of the Maintenance of the Sanatorium Poor he paid for under the provisions of the Medical Charities Act now embodied in the Terms for Relief of the Destitute Poor. In that case the of this Electoral Division if I am right in my views should pay our quota in the shape of Poor Rates towards the support of your Asylum whilst we should also have to pay on County Crops for the support of that in Carlow together with the large sum Carlow will have to refund Wexford in the event of such separation, so escape this double taxation the Ratepayers of this Electoral Division would in my mind have a perfect right to be separated from your Union and have their Division added to that of Carlow or Wexford a circumstance which I as a Wexfordman would much regret in as far as my personal feelings lead me - however much I respect my new friends in Carlow and Wicklow I cannot entertain for them the respect I do for my old friendships in Wexford,
