As the half year will end on Friday week it will be necessary to appoint a Committee to take stock of Clothing &c which he will endeavour to collect and have ready as soon as possible.

As the weather has now become fine and the Summer Season approaching he would suggest for consideration of the Board—the advisability of securing additional requirements for painting the doors windows & woodwork of the Establishment more particularly as it is now 2 years since they have been painted.

Ordered. Messrs. Rolger, Store and Jordan be a Committee to take stock the painting to be considered on a future day it being rather early in the Season.



The Visitors Book was read as follows,

I visited the House this day and found it exceedingly clean - orderly - and the inmates as far as I could judge contented and happy. I also visited the Schools and I think the Schoolmistress and Schoolmaster appear to be very attentive to their duties,

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk at the meeting of the Board, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in 1860)

In reference to the pauper Catherine Keating aged 20, single - admitted to the House this day, the following Certificate of the Medical Officer was directed to be placed on the Minutes,

"I hereby certify that Catherine Keating has been frequently under my treatment in the Infirmary, once for venereal disease and that I consider her to be imbecile and ought to be kept under control, she not having strength of mind properly to care herself."

Ordered, The Master having produced a Certificate from the Medical Officer that Catherine Keating who was admitted today having left the House the day before and being brought back by Mr Davis of Ennisceorthy as one in his opinion of weak mind and who should not be permitted to leave the House, she had been too on a former occasion under treatment for venereal disease - the Board Ordered, That the Master should have her attended to in the Isolation Ward - and that the case should be referred to the Commissioners, - On enquiry the Guardians find that she was brought to the Workhouse by her father who is a poor man in the division of Tombrack about two years ago stating that she would not stay with him, that she was in the habit of sleeping under the Eye of a Bridge and in the woods of Tombrack abandoned to immoral courses, The Guardians request to know under those circumstances can they refuse her discharge if again applied for.

The Clerk having produced a Form of Petition as directed last Board day it was



Ordered, That the Board are of opinion that it would be advisable to divide the subject into three separate Petitions and that the Petition on the subject of Bastardy be postponed until the Chief Secretary has brought his Bill into Parliament on that subject which the Board understand from the Commissioners he is about to do. In the mean time the Clerk will submit copies of Petitions (before being engrossed) on the subject of the removal of paupers from England and Scotland to this country, and one praying that Boards of Guardians may be given power to afford Hospital relief in the Workhouse to persons now entitled to Dispensary Relief.

Ordered, That the Clerk make out a Return of the attendance of Guardians for the year ending the 25<sup>th</sup> March 1860, and submit same to the Board at the first meeting after that date.

 and atmospheric exposure during the winter  
 I find also that the pecuniary returns continue

The following petitions to Parliament were then read and adopted.

That the Law relating to the removal of natives of Ireland who become destitute and are obliged to seek relief in the Workhouses or Parishes of England and Scotland is unjust in principle & cruel in its operation.

That the Law is also unequal as regards England, Ireland & Scotland in as much as poor persons may be removed from England & Scotland to Ireland - whilst there is no corresponding power given to Irish Boards of Guardians to remove English or Scotch poor persons in case of their being relieved in Irish Poor Law Unions.

Your Petitioners therefore pray that in any amendment of the Irish Poor Laws it may please your honorable House to provide that it shall not be lawful to remove to Ireland against their will any poor persons who after a residence of five years in England or Scotland and who having become destitute is relieved in England or Scotland but that such persons may be treated in all respects as natives of England or Scotland and as in duty bound your Petitioners shall ever pray.

## Petition respecting Medical Charities

That an extension of the Medical Charities Act 14<sup>th</sup> & 15<sup>th</sup> Vic. cap 68 which would enable Boards of Guardians to give Hospital Relief in the Workhouse to persons now entitled to Dispensary Relief - would be of great advantage to the poorer classes in Ireland, and that your petitioners humbly pray that the provisions contained in 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> Sections of a Bill introduced by Mr. Secretary Herbert on the 7<sup>th</sup> December 1857, were well calculated to remedy these defects and may be embodied in any Amendment of the Medical Charities Act for Ireland and as in duty bound your petitioners will pray.

A Note was read from the Treasurer requesting their Books to be signed by a Committee of two Guardians on part of the Board to the 29<sup>th</sup> Sept last.

Ordered, Messrs Roberts & Cullson have consented to form a Committee to do so at the request of the Board.

he expected the Board before altering his tender  
to suit themselves would have sent for him  
and he would have stated this to them,



Ordered, The Clerk to readvertise for Tenders for Bread, Flour, Oatmeal and India Meal for consideration this day week.

Mr P Murphy Guardian for Ballyhogue gave notice that on this day fortnight he will move the discharge of Margaret Kinnery and Charles Byrne from the Division of Ballyhogue and their readmission on the Union at Large.

An Application was made by Mary Canoll an inmate who is obliged to move about by a Chair that as a friend offered to take her out she would be willing to go provided she were allowed to take the going Chair with her.

Ordered, The Master to enquire what prospects she has in going out and remaining out and to report next Board day.

A Letter was read from the Gory Board of Guardians offering to pay for Patients in the Oulart Fever Hospital at the rate of 4/- a week from the Electoral Divisions of Wells, Monamolin, Bordo and Killinacooly.

Ordered, The Board are willing to take Patients into the Oulart Fever Hospital from the Gory Union on the same terms as last year namely 4/- a week subject to no deduction for conveyance to Hospital which are in fact the terms of last year.

The Board proceeded to the appointment of Chairmen for the ensuing year upon which it was

Proposed by Mr Sweetman and Seconded by Mr Carroll that the Rt Honble Lord Carnarvon be appointed Chairman for the ensuing year which passed unanimously. Mr Carroll paid a wellmerited compliment to his Lordship showing the Board

the advantages they had in having the benefit of his Lordship's supervision and care over the Establishment whilst at Castleboro.

Proposed by Mr P Doran and Seconded by Mr J Brown that J Maher Esq be appointed Vice-Chairman — passed with acclamation.

Proposed by Mr Thomas Barlow & Seconded by Mr J Doyle, Jackson that John Cullin Esq be elected D.O. Chairman which passed unanimously.

Having heard that a small quantity of Poison was found in or about the paupers' Closets there either by the Porter or the small pauper who assists him - the Master considers it his duty to report it to the Board in order the matter may be enquired into, the Porter is aware that it was to the Master he should report every thing connected with the Workhouse - but he omitted doing so in this case - consequently the subject has come under the notice of the Police Authorities and the Public before coming to the knowledge of the Master or Board of Guardians.

The Porter complained to him that the meat delivered to him on Saturday last was of inferior quality - He directed him to return it but the Contractor refused to exchange it.

Ordered. Meat Dinner allowed Easter Sunday. - Messrs. Cullon, Hore & Bolger to form a Committee for its selection. - The Master states that he has a monitor over the boys during the Temporary illness of the Schoolmaster and most of them on the land. - the Meat Contractor having been sent for gave a fair explanation. In reference to the Poison the Porter was examined and stated it was found in the Old Clothes store by a boy & Wardenmaid who had been tying up some clothing belonging to a pauper who had been recently admitted. <sup>Agriculturist's Report.</sup> That they brought the little Packet to him on which Poison was labelled - that the day after he gave it to the Medical Officer when passing thro the Hall who took charge of it.

The Medical Officer stated that on going to town he enquired at Mr. Corkes had he sold the Poison showing him the Paper, who said he did not. He then sent by a Policeman to Mr. Coopers in Slaney Street who admitted the Poison was bought there.

The Innmate from whose clothing the Packet dropt was examined - he said he bought it at Mr. Coopers for his brother who lives in the Country for the purpose of killing rats - that he had it for months in his pocket and forgot it. The Clerk is directed to write to Mr. Coopers regarding the same.

Send to the Board on this day week a copy of the entry from his Book of the Sale of a packet with poison marked on it which has been found in the Old clothes room, the same having been dropt from the Clothes of Patrick Finnott now an Innmate of this House,

Ward is desirous of going out to live with her aunt Mr. Breen - I would recommend the Board to give her clothing and her little car as she has not the use of her limbs, - she is a good shutmaker and would not be a burthen to the Rate Payers again - In the Kitchen the Pepper Mill is worn out and a new one required. - I regret to say the Schoolmaster is confined with a cold - he complains of a pain in his Chest arising from Cough or any smother. 4<sup>th</sup> April 1860. Signed. John Cullin

The Board proceeded with the admission of paupers from the Relieving Officers Book to the Workhouse and Poor Hospitals of the Union - & the <sup>cases</sup> admitted were of the ordinary class of applicants.

In reference to the Masters Report respecting the death of a poor man in 8 hours after admission to the House it was -

Ordered That the Relieving Officers be directed to furnish a report to the Board on next Thursday in the case of Daniel Connolly who died in 8 hours after admission.

Mr. Jordan brought under the notice of the Chairman the grievance he felt in his Electoral Division having been obliged to pay Law Costs for recovery of Rates and as no recovery had yet taken place - he further enquired would it not be better to stop all proceedings in the case. He was subsequently informed that the Directors of the Receiver under the Court would be compelled to pay the money.

A Letter was read from Mr. Cooper Flannery Street in answer to the letter of last week stating that the Packet marked Poison - was Carbonate of Barites in a quantity quite inert as to any injurious effect on human life but most destructive to cats and that the sale was duly entered in his Book.

A Letter was read from the Secretary of the Willaw Dispensary Committee enclosing

copy of a resolution agreed to unanimously at this Meeting on the 10th Inst. viz  
"That we consider the sum of £2... a year is not sufficient for the care taker of the Dispensary House Mr. Alice Redmond - that we are of opinion that less than £4... is not a fair remuneration for her whole time and therefore propose to the Board of Guardians that her wages be fixed at £4... a year to be paid quarterly."

Ordered The Board agreeing in the Resolution of the Committee request the Commissioners sanction to the payment of £4... per ann to Alice Redmond care taker of the Willaw Dispensary House.

The Chairman then signed the Orders and Cheques after which the Board separated.
