Notices of Marriage between the parties hereunder named having been received from the District Registrar by the Clerk, were duly read at the Board this day in accordance with the 15th section of the 7th and 8th Vic., c 81.

The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No 3378 to No 3397 both inclusive by the signature of the Chairman, and counter-signature of the Clerk.

General Orders to be taken into consideration on the 3rd May and the advertisements for Medical Appliances to be of the same tenor as at present. — all Medical Officers to be called on to return their empty packages as usual.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

Masters Report

Captain Hamilton attended here on Friday last the 13th Inst. from 11 to 3:00 P.M. - inspected the concerns and inmates - examined the children in both schools and afterwards visited the Fever Hospital.

There are 12 teapots required for the use of the infirm class who are on Tea Diet and the Schoolmaster requires a Penknife.

As the Contracts will end on the 10th May next it will be necessary to advertise for meat, meat, hardware & general supplies besides Smith work &c. - He would suggest that in future when Oxheads cannot be obtained the same money value of good meat be procured instead of Coarse Shins and houghs as at present as he found the same value would make much better soap.

As it appears that some Bills have been paid without the Board's Orders attached he would

strongly recommended that some be guarded against in future more particularly as a mistake has occurred with one of the Contractors by being allowed to hold over an order for $\frac{1}{2}$ ton of Oatsmeal that should have been attached to a former Bill in which the $\frac{1}{2}$ ton was paid for. He then charged it in the next month's account in error having the Order for the half ton which he attached in the latter instance with the corresponding date to that of the former order. He signed the Bill, first seeing that it was received agreeably to the date and believing it to be correct not remembering or thinking that it was charged in the former Bill.

After much trouble in going over every item received during the last six months he discovered where the error was and sent for the Contractor who at once acknowledged his mistake stating how it occurred and will refund the amount to the Clerk when called on £6-15-0.

Ordered. The Contractor to lodge the £6-15-0 or hand it over to the Clerk to be lodged.

Agriculturist's Report.
The Visitors Book showed the following entry,

Visited the House accompanied by the Master this day and found all clean and comfortable. The inmates who were able were at their different industrial employments. He heard no complaints. He also visited the Schools and found the children clean and at their usual lessons. Both the Schoolmaster & Schoolmistress were in their places. He went into the Bread and milk stores and examined both which he found to be of good quality.

Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded with the consideration of claims for relief in the Workhouse and Poor Hospitals of the Union from the Relieving Officers Book during which the Ordinary Cases presented themselves.

The Relieving Officer as ordered at last Board day put forward an application explanation regarding the case of Daniel C. Connolly who died in 8 hours after admission to the Workhouse.

On the 5th Inst (being Board day) a woman handed him at the Workhouse a ticket signed by Doctor Gordon setting forth that he had visited Daniel Connolly of Spring Valley and that he was very ill and in much need of Infirmary Relief - She then stated that Connolly could not come to the Workhouse until 6 or 7 O'Clock that Evening - When the Board separated he left a ticket for his admission with the Porter - Connolly was admitted that evening and died in 8 hours after as reported by the Master.

Mary Walsh and illegitimate child were - after examination admitted - the father is Dominic Murphy of Colbawn late of Ballylough Kerns and the Clerk was directed to write to him that the Board will hold him accountable for their maintenance.

A Deserted Child having been brought to the Board for admission its age being 14 months - it became a question whether it was properly chargeable to the Union at Large or the Division of Enniscorthy where the child was born and deserted by its mother - the father was a native of the County Carlow.

Mr Doran Guardian for Bolaboy reported that he saw Rev. Mr. Farrell Curate respecting the boys Clifford now in the Workhouse and that he told him the matter was now in the hands of Mr. Corcoran who is now absent and who holds the will and letters of administration - that there will be some legacy coming to these children but he could not say how much.

Ordered. The Clerk to communicate with Mr. Corcoran and know from him the probable amount which will be available for the children and how soon it may be paid.

Mr Doran gave notice that on Thursday the 3rd May he will move the discharge of Ellen Woods from Ballyhusard and her readmission in the Union as the case on investigation may appear.

On Opening the Tender Box there appeared to be but one proposal for the work of painting and it being stated that it would occupy 10 months the Board would not entertain it and ordered advertisements to be issued in the general Advertiser for proposals to be considered on the 3rd May next.

The Case of Darby Thomy admitted to Newfown Barry Poor Hospital on the 6th March was brought under the notice of the Board and Doctor Carsey was requested to state for the information of the Guardians the state of health of Darby Thomy on his admission to that Hospital if laboring under Fever or other disease.

The Chairman then signed the Orders and Cheques after which the Board adjourned.

He requested 2 Basins, 1 slop Bucket, 2 sweeping Brushes, 1 mop head, & 2 sponges.

Doctor Carris letter stated that Darby Kerry upon admission into the Mortimer Barrs Street Hospital was laboring under nervous symptoms which turned out to be an attack of acute Rheumatic fever of which he has had a relapse and is not he thinks yet fit to discharge.

Mr. Corcoran's letter stated that it was impossible for Rev. Mr. Farrell as Executor to have disposed of all the funds while questions were unsettled as to rights of landlords and others, but he paid the Legacies arrived at 21 years two thirds of the Legacies. The accounts are now ready & will be closed immediately and

the balance in his hands paid. He believed the Clifford Legacies are under 21 and Mr. Farrell will require a guarantee from some person in their interest that he will not be accountable in case he pays over the money coming to them in foot of their Legacies.

Ordered. The Chairman on part of the Board of Guardians will guarantee Rev. Mr. Farrell whenever the Legacy is paid in for use of the boys Clifford, the Emancipatory Guardians will attend to the matter the Cliffords being supported in the House at the expense of that division.

The Board then proceeded to consider the Report of the Committee appointed to examine the Provisions of a Bill now before Parliament brought in by the Chief Secretary for Ireland and Attorney General, - as follows,

Your Committee to whom was entrusted the task of preparing a Report on the Bill introduced by Mr. Cardwell, & Mr. Attorney General tending the Laws relating to the relief of the destitute poor and of Medical Charities in Ireland, beg leave to state that they feel great satisfaction in giving their approval to all its provisions. At the same time they must express their regret that some matters of great importance to Ireland on this subject have been omitted which they believe might find a place in this Bill if not made the subject of separate legislation in the present session. They refer particularly to the absence of any legislative Provision which should oblige the Fathers to pay for the support of illegitimate children whether deserted or in care of their mothers who may seek relief as being destitute, on sufficient proof before a Bench of Magistrates of their paternity and that power should be given to Boards of Guardians to recourse such relief to the child either in the Workhouse or in the hands of a nurse provided for it under the 7th Section of the Bill.

Your Committee also deeply deplore the

absence of any enactment which may relieve Irish Destitute Persons in England from the horrors of deportation such as has been described in ^{our} Courts of Justice as endured by natives of Ireland who have lived for long periods usefully and laboriously in England contributing to her wealth and paying her taxes and who with their children natives of England have been sent adrift when broken down by age or infirmity or disease because the English Law of settlement refused them an Asylum, and they impress anxiously on the Chief Secretary and the Attorney General for Ireland that the principle of the Irish Poor Law should apply to natives of Ireland who have been resident in England or Scotland for a period of Ten years or upwards employed in any trade, handicraft or Agricultural Labour and to all children of such persons born in England or Scotland, and such persons shall have a right to Hospital Relief or to relief in the Workhouse of the District when they may have become destitute and that the Guardians of such district shall have authority to enquire into the previous history of such persons and to determine a chargeability for them in any other Poor Law Union where they may have spent the greater portion of the last three years and that the Commissioners shall have the power to confirm

Michl McDonald aged 55 died apparently from the shock produced from the injuries he received which were fracture of both legs but a compound one of the left — the bone having protruded thro the flesh this case was progressing most favorably until the 14th day after the accident when he died suddenly.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

Masters Report

An Inmate named James Nolan whose case he brought before the Board on the 16th September 1858, as most refractory & disorderly not then thinking he could be detained in the Workhouse against his will, but it was afterward decided that he should do so. — He has since then on several occasions been most refractory particularly on Thursday the 3rd Instant. He forced his way thro the Detent Ward door in defiance of the man in charge and meeting with a quiet harrallop shot — he struck him a violent blow on the head — knocked him down and it appears kicked him in a brutal manner — on some of the other inmates interfering he (Nolan) seized a cast steel digging prong and attempted to stab them with it — He brought the case before the Magistrates on Monday last who declined committing him unless the

Medical Officers would certify him to be a Lunatic, he respectfully submitted that if Nolan be of that class of Lunatics or Insane Persons such as the Law contemplates should be detained in the Workhouse and who afterwards become so violent as to endanger the lives of other inmates, that he then becomes a subject for the County Gaol or Lunatic Asylum and ought to be detained there instead of in the Workhouse, more particularly as he is such as to set able-bodied men at defiance and no person in the Workhouse capable of managing him.

Mr. Henry Roche called here on Tuesday last and handed him the sum of One Pound to defray the expense of Michael McDonnell who died on the 5th Inst. - lying then 15 days in the Workhouse. The Master refused to take it at first as McDonnell was not admitted to relief by way of Loan - but Mr. Roche still persisting he should take it - and stating that it was not to save expense McDonnell was sent here but in the hope of saving his life - the Master took the Pound.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

out the Resolution of the Board long since adopted of dividing the two large Wards over the Shot Wards as it is impossible to classify properly and preserve the sick inmates from exposure to Fever and other infectious diseases. If not done, in this division the Shots can have dayrooms with little or no expense or inconvenience for if the lower wards were appropriated to their use it would be depriving the Infirmary of two Wards on the ground floor which are used for the reception of accidents that cannot be removed to the upper Wards without much inconvenience and danger.

Ordered, To be considered on this day next.

Masters Report

Reg^d to state that he brought the case of Nolan (as reported last Board day) before the Magistrates on Monday but as the Medical Officers

could not give a Certificate of Insanity such as to justify the Magistrates in committing him under that head they then tried him for an assault and sentenced him to two months imprisonment.

It appears the Contract for glazing was not gone into on the 3rd Inst and as the Painter has commenced the work it will be necessary to consider the Tender for glazing in order that all broken panes be put in before the windows are painted.

He had received a Letter from the School-master stating that his health is somewhat impaired but that he is not yet sufficiently recovered so as to resume his duties, and requested the Board will be good enough to grant him another fortnight's leave of absence to recover his health. See Doctor's Certificate attached.

Ordered. Leave granted for another fortnight.

Punishment Book showed an entry in which Bep Smith was charged by the Schoolmistress with coming in the presence of the Children and making use of the grossest and most insolent language to her without the least provocation.

Ordered. Enquiry having been made Bep Smith was ordered to receive such punishment as the Medical Officer will allow.

Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded with the admission of paupers to the Workhouse and Fever Hospitals of the Union.

After reading the Clerk's report Mr. P. J. Plaherty appeared and stated that on receiving the instructions of the Board he made application to Mr. Corcoran and ascertained that there was a sum of £11.2.2 coming to the boys under the will of their Uncle - that the fund left by him to discharge the Legacies was not equal to the sums devised and that a rateable proportion had to be deducted from all the legacies to which they asserted.

Ordered. That Mr. Plaherty Solicitor lodge that amount with Treasurers which has been subsequently done - that the Board assist the emigration of the boys Clifford to New Zealand where their Paternal Aunt & her husband are immigrating to - that agreeing to the terms of her proposal the Board are willing to grant a sum of £16.0.0 for outfit passage & clothing - the boys to be got ready as soon as possible and sent to meet their Uncle and Aunt at Liverpool - that a Committee consisting of Messrs. Hore, Roberts & Cullon be appointed to carry out the order of the Board - the Clerk to write at once to Mr. Lynght their aunt informing her of what the Board has done - the Board perfected a receipt for the sum lodged by Mr. Plaherty exonerating the Executors Rev. Mr. Donnell from any future claim that could be made by the boys in respect of the Legacy in question.

Mr. Donovan attended and handed in the Lease of the Oulart Dispensary House to be perfected by Richard Britton & the Board but Mr. Britton not appearing the Lease was given into custody of the Clerk until next Board day.

A Letter was read from Doctor Brewell explaining the case of Hyland who was admitted last Board day - He entered the County Infirmary on the 30th and stayed only 5 days leaving at his own request.

The Board proceeded to open tenders and samples for Clothing and after some consideration it was moved by Mr. Bolger and seconded by Mr. Doyle - That the samples of Drize at 4/ a yard be taken from the three proposers in equal quantities as required.

Amendment moved by Sir J. Power - Seconded by Mr. Smeaton - That the best material of Drize at that price and of the same shade be taken from one Contractor only.
