Masters Report 31<sup>st</sup> May 1860.

The Plumber attended here on Friday last examined the Pump and found about 19 feet of water in the well, about 2 feet above the surface of the water and below the working box there is a split in the Pump stick of about 2 feet in length and the Plumber could not say how far it extended under the water, this open being in the suction part of the Pump will render it unfit for work should the water sink below the defective part.

He had received a letter from Mr William Murphy Schoolmaster yesterday tendering his resignation and requesting the Board would have the kindness to grant a Cheque today for the amount due to him, £100 6<sup>th</sup> 1860. A person named Mathew Murphy admitted provisionally about 12 O'clock on Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> Inst died about 10 O'clock next morning.



He returned the meat supplied by the Contractor yesterday it being of inferior quality - he then supplied good meat.

He required 4 days mason work to repair the coping of the Outer walls and as he had mortar ready at present, it would be a good opportunity of getting them done.

Ordered. The Master to get the Pump Stock caulked and bound with a couple of <sup>iron</sup> clasps. The Clerk to advertise for a Schoolmaster at £22 per Annum. Tenders to be considered on the 21<sup>st</sup> Inst. the Mason work allowed. - The Relieving Officer to put his explanation in writing to go on the Minutes.

Relieving Officers Explanation  
With reference to the case of Matthew Murphy now deceased his wife applied to me on Friday the 1<sup>st</sup> Inst. for an admission ticket to remove him to the workhouse stating that he was in bed the last week very small. I then wrote a visiting ticket for the Medical Officer to attend him which his wife would not take to the doctor. I went direct to the Patients home with the same ticket and found the man in bed and did not consider him any way in immediate danger of death. He said he should go some place out of that. I then gave the ticket to his <sup>Agriculturist's Report</sup> daughter to take to the doctor. I visited him a second time when they told me the doctor would see him in the Evening. I called to him again when they told me the doctor saw him and directed him to the Workhouse Infirmary. I gave an admission ticket to his wife with directions for a covered car to remove him direct which was not done until next morning.

Emiscorthy May 30<sup>th</sup> 1860.

Sir

Agreeably to the request of the Board of Guardians I beg to inform them that as far as I can learn of the Character of the boy Sean who informed Captain Hamilton that he was only washed twice while in the Fever Hospital his statement is not to be relied on. He is a poor boy without parents — has been reared in a wild state — is totally ignorant of any religion and in my opinion does not know the difference between truth & falsehood. I have questioned the nurses closely on the subject and they all declare most positively that his hands & face were constantly washed — that he came into the Hospital in such a state of filth that his hair had to be cut and himself washed in a bath before being put to bed and that he also got a bath previous to leaving.

I have also been informed that it was to these Baths he alluded when questioned by Captain Hamilton — I have frequently impressed upon the Nurses the necessity of attending to the Patients personal cleanliness and have found on many occasions that the Patients hands (more particularly the males)

were in such a state from hard work and other causes that it was impossible for them to have a thoroughly clean appearance which might lead Captain Hamilton to conclude that this very necessary duty was neglected.

The Chairman then signed the Orders and Cheques after which the Board separated.

That he would not be discharging his duty if he did not again respectfully call the Board's attention to the appropriation of the Lower Ward to the use of the Idiots, and the Infirmaries as by the Infirmaries is deprived of two important Wards. — for the Ward immediately over the one about to be given cannot be used for the sick with any serious disease owing to the great uproar and noise under them — which would interfere with their effective treatment and endanger life. — In his report of the 16<sup>th</sup> May last he pointed out that the Idiots could be accommodated with dayrooms over their own Wards with little expense and no inconvenience. — He should remind the Board that very shortly there will be ample accommodation in the Lunatic Asylum now about being built for all the inmates confined in our Idiot Wards.

Masters Report

Be<sup>d</sup> to state that he had the partition dividing the large Ward in the Infirmary completed also the door put up & all other alterations



necessary for the purpose of converting the room on the ground floor of the Infirmary into a day-room for the Female Idiots - but that he had not yet removed the Patients from the Ward. The total Cost will be £10.0

The probable cost of erecting a Ward for the accommodation of diabolute Characters would be about £13.0.0 - The Ward to be 16 feet by 12 with a loft at the height of 9 feet. - The ground floor to be laid with good hard bricks or tiles. - It will be also necessary to erect a fire Place and other necessary requisites for a dayroom. - all of which will be included in the Specification. - Should the weather take up the ensuing week it will be necessary to employ a man to assist in moving the material.

Patience Kehoe aged 3 months child of Margaret Kehoe admitted on the 14<sup>th</sup> Inst died suddenly on Sunday morning last the 17<sup>th</sup> - the child was in a delicate state of health when admitted.

Mr. Andrew Carby has delivered 8 fawn wheels and one black reel for which he expects the sum of £1.1.6 and 3/6 carriage - please to have them inspected.

#### Agriculturist's Report.

Ordered, The Patients to be removed in accordance with the Resolution of the Board the Master to advertise for tenders for the alteration, & mowers to be employed - a Committee consisting of Messrs. Gore, Timmott, & Graham inspected the wheels and approved of the work.

In reference to the case of the child Kehoe - The Medical Officer explained that he died suddenly in the Dormitory when with his mother. - That he had carefully examined into the Circumstances - also the child and found no marks of violence. - believed the child died from natural causes & that an Inquest was not necessary.

I visited the House this day and found every thing carried on in a satisfactory manner and no complaints made with the exception that the Nurse in the Female Ward called my attention to the great and serious inconvenience that will attend the placing of patients over the rooms now undergoing preparations for the reception of Idiots - a Clap that must of necessity be a cause of great & frequently dangerous annoyance to the Patients over head who will by this new arrangement be placed within hearing of the Idiots. I am aware that the new arrangement in the Infirmary has the approval of the Commissioners but notwithstanding I think it right to call the attention of the Board to the very decided inconvenience that will be the result of the proposed change.


