The Rev. He had also received the sum of three Pounds from the friends of Sarah Murphy for the purpose of assisting her to emigrate and hoped that the Guardians will have the goodness to grant her the additional amount necessary for that purpose.



The Hay sold by auction amounted to the sum of £35-16-0 & 11 Cocks held over for use of the animals on the Farm at the same valuation amount to £20-7-0 making a total produce of £56-3-0.

# Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded with the consideration of applications for relief in the Fever Hospitals and Workhouse from the Relieving Officers Book which were of the Ordinary class of paupers.

Ordered. That the following case be placed on the Minutes for decision of the Commissioners as to chargeability.

William Walker a dealer stated that he had resided in the Division of Edrimme for the last 9 months the state of his health preventing him from leaving it and that previously he resided off & on in the same Division for nine months - making in all eighteen months during the last 3 years - He also states that he resided out of the Union for upwards of 6 months - He did not account for the remainder of the 3 years stating that he could not as he was constantly travelling up to the end of October 1859, when his health prevented him from following his usual occupation.

Tenders were considered for making 18 forms for the new Chapel and the following accepted.

Patron Cullen to make the forms of the best white deal - scantling for framing 2 1/4 in thick, seats 12 in by 11 in wide, kneeling Boards 6 in by 12 in thick, blocks of 3 in deep under the feet of the forms and painted agreeably to specification and to do all in a proper & tradesmanlike manner for the sum of £10 - 4 - 7.

The Board then called for the Estimate of Rates for the ensuing year which was

submitted and explained by the Clerk, there had to be added a sum of £733 - due to Treasurer on the 29<sup>th</sup> September last which arose from the Guardians taking a penny in the Pound off the Estimate in the year 1857 and another penny in the Pound off the Estimate of 1858. - which told on the accounts of the last year when the Board were obliged to ask an advance from the Treasurer and this year in like manner. - The present Estimate will restore what was taken off in the years mentioned and it is expected the Board will not have recourse to the Treasurer for any future advance.




