The Visiting Book showed the following entry.

To one of the agricultural Committee of the Union I feel much pride and pleasure in being able to report on the proceedings of the Farm which as to produce in this unfavorable season far exceeds my most sanguine anticipations. I have been lately much through the midland and more southern Counties of Ireland and in no place, even the best lands - say the golden vale whether in Noblemen's or Gentlemen's Demesnes - Workhouse Farms or otherwise have I seen crops of equal value with those on this Farm. This to me is the more gratifying because of the following reasons -

1st This is my native Union

2nd Because I was the first in Ireland to broach the subject at the press of making such establishments to a certain extent self-supporting and self-educating for the poorer class those most in need of industrial training - and

3rd Because by the discipline and economy practiced on the Farm in training the little boys to work - the cost of extraneous labour is got over whilst those little boys when thus trained will be a great acquisition to the Farmers who will employ them in showing their sons how the best crops can be produced at the least possible expense. - In fact I cannot express the pleasure I feel at the great success of the agricultural department here the more especially as it is directed and superintended by a native of Smiscorthy.

M^r Flood agreeably to notice brought forward his motion respecting the justice of compelling by law the fathers of illegitimate children to maintain them and of petitioning Parliament to enact a law enabling the Guardians to effect that object and in a clear & forcible speech put forward the following form of Petition which was unanimously adopted by the Board.

"That in Ireland the fathers of illegitimate children are not in any way compellable by Law to maintain them or to contribute to their support.

"That the absence of any such law is productive of the greatest cruelty and hardship upon the mothers of such children.

"That it also tends greatly to encourage the seduction and betrayal of the weaker sex by the wicked and immoral of the male sex — the consequent dissemination of vice in both sexes and the increase of bastardy.

"That it also tends by its minimization of the paternal obligation to diminish generally the weight of that obligation.

"That it also tends to promote child desertion and child murder.

"That it also throws a great and unnecessary burden upon the Ratepayers — by far the largest classes of inmates of the Workhouse being illegitimate children and their mothers — the fathers of which children are in some instances well known and able to maintain

them — and that besides such children upwards of One Hundred under the age of twelve years who have been deserted and exposed are now maintained in the County Wexford by local Rates under the Statutes 11 & 12 Geo 3rd cap 15 — 13th & 14th Geo 3rd cap 24 and 6th & 7th William 4th cap 116. —

your Petitioners therefore humbly pray that it may be enacted that persons who may be proved by satisfactory evidence to be the fathers of illegitimate children should be compellable by law to maintain them.

Ordered. That the Clerk get engrossed Petitions to both Houses of Parliament, and submit them to the Board to be signed and sealed without delay.

He begged to call the attention of the Board to the neglect and disrespect of the Schoolmaster - first allowing the School-boys to injure some cabbage in Cullin the Contractor and when spoken to by Cullin he laughed at him, and since that allowing the boys to injure 42 heads of cabbage for which Cullin expects compensation yesterday he allowed all the boys to go where they were getting the repeat cleaned and to run away with it until he (the Master) prevented them and when he spoke to the Schoolmaster on the subject irregularity

he turned round in a disrespectful manner and said "don't bother me," and used other words that he did not distinctly hear but believes they were more disrespectful and all in presence of the inmates. It is not for the words or the manner in which they were said that he reports the case but to prevent a recurrence of such in future.

Ordered. The Schoolmaster was called in and the case investigated when the Schoolmaster promised that no cause of complaint should occur again. He was then reprimanded.

It will be necessary to procure about 4 doz of Larch poles to make a paling at Coggeshams bounds. There is a fine place required in the Male Infirmary Yard as the old store is of no use. He has a grate that will answer the purpose.

He begs to submit for inspection samples of Oatmeal and India meal also of the stuff about made from them which is not near so good food as that made from former supplies. It appears the Meal is new and does not get the same as that contracted for.

He also brought up samples of Meat delivered to day for inspection by the Board.

The Larch poles allowed, the grate to be properly fitted up.
