That owing to the Balance representing the value of Clothing at hands having risen from £797.4.8 on the 25<sup>th</sup> March 1855 to the sum of £1084.12.9 on the 25<sup>th</sup> March 1860 and having so represented it to the Auditor when auditing the accounts last June—the Clerk will have to charge a penny a day in the apportionment of that account if future until the Balance is brought down to its proper level representing as near as may be the value of Clothing at hands whenever it suits the Board to cause a valuation of Clothing to be made, the charge during those years was but 1/2 a day Ordered. The Master to make a survey and valuation soon as possible.

He is at present engaged raising the green crops. He has the carrots raised & part of the Mangold. As the hands are now so few he would suggest that the School boys be allowed out for two days in order to raise the crops in time to sow the wheat also to save the crops fearing frost might set in.

A Carpenter is required to put up maps in the boys schoolroom.

It is necessary to continue the person who is engaged whitewashing for some time longer. As he finds it impossible to procure the services of a mason - he would be thankful if any of the Guardians know of one they would engage - there would be at present a weeks work to do.

Ordered. The School Boys allowed out to assist in the Land - the Carpenter & whitewasher allowed. The Master to make further enquiries for a mason.

The Visitors Book showed the following entries,

I have pointed out some trifling defects to the Master which I have no doubt will be speedily remedied. The inmates appeared clean & orderly except one woman in the nursery who appears to me to be a fit subject for a separate Ward. The able-bodied inmates are employed & kept to work as well as the infirm of each sex who are capable of employment - there are at least two cases in the female idiot cells quite unfit cases for any Workhouse but I understand that application has been made for their removal. It is stated that regular attendance is given by the Medical Officer the young children <sup>Agriculturist's Report</sup> are tolerably well taken care of - Infirmary tolerably clean - no infectious disease. Domestic service is regularly performed - the established dietary duly observed and provisions of the quality contracted for - a complaint was made by the woman referred to in reply to question No 2 - Anne Byrne who I wish to have called before the Board. I would suggest the substitution of frocks of a warmer material than that at present in use for the girls during the winter months - there will be a saving in washing and there can be no question that such a step will be attended with benefit to the children.

In the boys school the maps are very much out of order - some object lessons and other requisites are wanted - a fire place is required in the lower male Ward - this has been repeatedly ordered.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

With reference to Mr. Cullins report as entered in the Visiting Committee Book relative to the Burial of a patient named Edw. Durrell who died in Dorr Hospital on Monday the 10th inst. — he begged to state that instead of neglect on his part he had exceeded his duty and disobeyed the orders of the Board by allowing the Dorr Key with the Corpse to any Church yard other than provided by the Board as the Order is "that no person be sent with a Corpse to any burial ground but that provided by the Guardians unless taken by their friends and that the Porter of the Workhouse and the Porter of the Dorr Hospital attend alternately and see that every Corpse be properly interred. Therefore that is since the opening of the House in 1842, the Protestant Chaplain had all the deceased protestants buried at his own expence or that of their friends but lately of the Rev. Mr. Durras he had sent

the Donkey with the corpse on two or three occasions.

The Rev. Mr. Mitchell came here about 3 O'Clock on Tuesday Evening last and reported to me the death of Eliza Farrell and stated that as Boardman's bill was not paid on the last occasion he would now have nothing to do with her interment. The Master stated to him he thought Boardman's demand was allowed and asked Mr. Mitchell to come down to the Clerk which he did when the Clerk informed him that the sum of 7/4 was allowed instead of 7/6 the amount in Boardman's Bill. The Master then consulted the Clerk as to the advisability of employing a man to make the grave and as to whether the Guardians would object or not - it being a new case the Clerk advised me to do so. The Master then told Mr. Mitchell he would send over the corpse at 11 O'Clock next morning and went to the Porter to know who he had employed the last day. The Porter told him and then sent John Grogan to employ him but it appears the man took sick and did not go to make the grave.

*Agriculturist's Report.*

At 10 O'Clock next morning the Porter sent a messenger to the master for the Donkey as usual which was sent to him and the master heard no more about the matter until one of the boys returned and told him that there was no grave made. He then sent for the Porter and directed him to go at once and have the corpse interred.

The Board will now decide as to the course he shall adopt in future with regard to the burial of deceased Paupers in distinct Churchyards.

In reference to the last person Anne Skell the Master reported that on her admission to the Infirmary she died - the man who brought her accompanied by a Policeman

and her brother were called before the Board and examined. Martin Redmond of Ballyluke being examined states that Anne Skell was in his employment the last 3 years, latterly she appeared to be very ill, he brought in Doctor Lang from Kellan who said she was affected in the Lungs. Redmond did not think she was so ill as she worked occasionally - sent for her brother (now present) to take her home as she was not recovering - on Monday last he came and recommended that she be sent to the Workhouse - she expressed a wish to go there, accordingly Redmond brought her in a car today, was in town yesterday and called on the Relieving Officers to know how he was to get her admitted who desired him to bring her in to the Workhouse, did not apprehend there was any immediate danger in removing her this morning - did not ask the Relieving Officers to visit her.

Ordered, The Board having admitted Anne Skell on her application have nothing to charge themselves with, but if an inquest be held a copy of the verdict shall be placed on our Minutes.

In reference to the Masters Report the Board had the Visitors Report Book submitted to them in which the following entry appeared -

"I regret to have to call the attention of the Board of Guardians to a case of great neglect with regard to the burial of John Farrell who died in Poor Hospital on Sunday last. The remains were brought over in the hearse



accompanied by three little boys to the Old Church yard in Trimplesham about 10 O'clock this morning and arrangements were made with the Rev. Mr. Birdsell to be in attendance at 11 O'clock, however - strange to say there was no grave made nor <sup>was</sup> person in charge and the remains had to be brought back to the Workhouse and as I was coming up here now I met the Porter going over to the grave yard with a man to prepare a grave. The Rev. Mr. Birdsell can explain how he was disappointed and annoyed by this great want of attention.
