Masters Report

The Board will please agreeably to their former acts of kindness allow a meat dinner to the inmates on Christmas day and appoint a Committee to select the meat.

He begged to state that there was no inquest held on the body of Anne Hill whose case was reported last Board day.

He had also to report that a person named Bartholomew Cosman was admitted about 1/4 to 5 O'Clock on Tuesday Evening last who died in 10 minutes after admission. He immediately sent for the Medical Officer but the man was dead before he arrived.



The Master then reported the case to the Constabulary who it appears did not think it necessary to have an inquest held and the body was afterwards removed by the friends, he refused ~~to~~ to give the body until a Sub Constable named Jeph Magennis attended and stated I might do so,

Ordered. The Dinner allowed as usual a Committee consisting of Messrs. Gore, Bolger and Roberts to assist the Master in selecting the meat. That the Constabulary be requested to inform the Board on what authority they decided that an Inquest was not necessary in the case of Anne Mill the female who died suddenly after her admission to the Workhouse on last Thursday also in the case of Bartholomew Cosmaon who died immediately after admission to the Workhouse on the 18<sup>th</sup> Inst,

Agriculturist's Report.

In reference to the latter case namely Bartholomew Cosmaon Doctor Cranfield attended and being examined stated that he had received a ticket for Medical Relief marked urgent on Monday Evening the 17<sup>th</sup> Inst and immediately visited the Patient. He laboured under suppression of Urine Doctor Cranfield did what was necessary for him at the time - he told the people with whom Cosmaon lived that his case would be fatal and advised that he be removed to the Workhouse Infirmary the following morning.

Workhouse on the 13<sup>th</sup> Inst and died on her admission to the Infirmary, - that it appears this case was brought under the notice of the Relieving Officer the day previous to her admission they were desirous to know whether he offered her immediate admission to the Workhouse or deferred it until the following day.

Ordered. The Relieving Officer states that Martin Redmond, a farmer residing about 7 miles off was in town on his own private business but called going home on the Relieving Officer and told him he had a servant girl at home who was oppressed in her breathing - that he had Doctor Garg from Killan to visit her - that he wished to send her to the Workhouse and wanted to know how he was to get her admitted. The Relieving Officer told him to bring her in the following day & he would have her admitted. Redmond accordingly brought her in his car next morning just before the Board met. The Relieving Officer had her already on his application & Report Book & having submitted same to the Board they at once admitted her to the Infirmary.

 The amount deposited with the Clerk to be lodged with the Treasurer weekly."

The above was adopted by the Board and Mr. Burke PL Inspector who was also present improved the form of a book a copy of which he submitted and can see no reason why it should be demoted from, instead of one part he is now performing two and he therefore requested the Board to carry out their order and not impose on him the third part, as it would be nearly impossible for him to attend to it, as the situation of master calls him to all parts of the House and Farm it would be most inconvenient for him to receive the public money under such circumstances.
