not see anything to fault in this specimen of citrine ointment. It was indeed a little softer than usual but this is by many surgeons considered an advantage.

The specimens then which I made upon it had solely for their object to determine the quantity of Mercury which it included. This I have very carefully done and I find that 100 parts by weight of it contains 4.68 of quicksilver whereas if made according to the Dublin Pharmacopoeia—100 would include 7.7 of the metal. This ointment is therefore weaker than it should be but I may observe that Medical men in prescribing it nowadays direct it to be diluted to a greater or less extent with Lard
