

The Relieving Officer having been called in for his explanation in this case made the following statement. That he had received a note from W. D'Arcy, Guardian for the division of the Leap drawing his attention to a woman near his place who was in a destitute state. - That he visited her immediately and found her in a poor cabin where she had lodged for two nights previously. - She was ill but able to sit up in the bed and no appearance of her being in a dying state. That he hired a Cart for her removal to the Workhouse but to his astonishment when he came to the Workhouse next morning and enquired had she come there found she had not. He then went immediately out again
