We would recommend the Committee to contract with some person in the town for the supply of Leeches and Drusers this has also been suggested by the Commissioners. If a supply of Leeches is kept at any Dispensary a great loss on them will take place and if a supply of Drusers is kept at each Dispensary so as to be enabled to fit each applicant there would be a very great stock required

There are some repairs and alterations wanted in the Comiskey Dispensary which are much required for the preservation of the Medicines &c. We would suggest that the Committee may allow the Medical Officers to employ a tradesman to do the repairs and alterations under their own superintendence as they cannot be done by Contract and they will observe the strictest
